Groom Will Be Next Mayor For Myrtle Creek

The forthcoming resignation of Myrtle Creek Mayor Winston Hudelson will leave a vacant position on that city's council, Wednesday, Mayor Hudelson explained how the council will go about filling the position.

According to the Myrtle Creek city charter, the person who holds the position as councilman - at-large automatically steps into the mayorship. The mayor and the councilman-at-large may reside in any of the three wards in Myrtle Creek.

The other six members of the council come from the wards in which they live. As the mayor explained, two are elected from each ward.

Present councilman-at-large is J. D. Groom. When he takes office as mayor sometime in January, he will recommend candidates for his former position. The city council will then approve one of the nominees or reject all.

Mayor Hudelson, who was councilman-at-large, before assuming the mayor's post a year ago, is resigning because he is moving to a new home which is located outside of the Myrtle Creek city limits.

Portland Woman Is Winner Of Pillsbury Bake Contest

NEW YORK — Mrs. Henry Jorgensen of Portland, Ore., Tuesday won the \$25,000 annual cooking prize of the Pillsbury Flour Mills with a recipe for an easy-to-make sweetroll.

Mrs. Jorgensen's prize recipe was for what she called "ring-a-lings," described as "a no-knead sweet roll made with a twist of the wrist."

Pillsbury spokesmen said it is "a nut-filled roll featuring a simple way to fill, cut, twist and curl the dough so that the full flavor is locked into every bite."

In all, more than \$100,000 in prizes were handed out during the three-hour awards luncheon party. They included both cash and electric equipment from General Electric, co-sponsor of the contest. Each contestant automatically wins an electric range and mixer.

11 Men Safe After Vessel Springs Leak, Sinks At Sea

MIAMI, Fla. — Eleven men whose 104-foot motor vessel sprang a leak and sank in the storm-tossed Atlantic 75 miles northeast of Miami arrived here safely Thursday after a dramatic rescue by a Coast Guard plane and a tanker.

"We're lucky to be alive," said Capt. William C. Alvers of Miami, who was plucked from a lifeboat with ten others after two hours of battling against giant waves.

"It was so rough we nearly swamped a few times," Alvers said. "But the morale of the men was fine. We kept busy rowing and telling jokes. We were rescued before we got to the sinking stage."

The motor vessel *Monster*, owned by the Thompson Construction Co. of St. Petersburg, Fla., sank three miles west of Great Isaac Light in the Bahamas Wednesday night. Two hours and 35 minutes after she sent her first SOS, all hands had been rescued by a passing tanker.

The monster sent its SOS at 7 p.m. that water was pouring into the engine room.

A Coast Guard plane immediately winged out from Miami and all vessels in the vicinity were asked by radio to proceed to the scene of the wreck. At 8:23 p.m., the plane sighted the wreckage and buzzed overhead, dropping flares.

The Tanker, Robert C. Tuttle, en route from Philadelphia to Port Arthur, Tex., was the first to reach the scene. By 9:35 p.m., she had taken all 11 men aboard. Five miles off Miami Beach, the men were transferred from the tanker to a Coast Guard cutter.

When she went down, the *Monster* was on the way to the Bahamas to build mooring dolphins for the U.S. guided missile program.

Detroit Trying To Get Along Without Papers

DETROIT — Detroit is trying to get along without its three regular daily newspapers, but it isn't easy.

The stereotypes strike that has paralyzed the presses of the Detroit News, The Detroit Times and the Detroit Free Press ended its second week Wednesday.

Most people have turned to stepped-up radio and television news, or to four or eight-page local emergency papers.

The struck newspapers have continued collecting local news through a jointly operated local newsmen. They provide it to radio and television stations without cost.

Swamped by a windfall of local advertising, the stations have canceled for local shows punctuated with commercials.

Retail stores, without newspaper advertising, report Christmas business falling short of anticipated record levels.

Advertisers are turning to other media. A foreign language newspaper switched to English pages. A strike-born union newspaper and "throwaway" shopping guides have appeared.

Out-of-town newspapers and all kinds of magazines sell faster than usual.

Federal and state mediators reported last night at the end of a 2½-hour bargaining sessions tentative agreement had been reached on all points except wages.

Publishers' representatives made a wage offer and the union agreed to consider it.

Mediators said the two sides agreed to meet again upon call but no specific time was set.

Under their old contract which expired at midnight Nov. 30, stereotypes got \$3.68 an hour for a 37½-hour day work week and \$3.33 an hour for a 35-hour-night week.
