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Public Power Group Will Not Oppose Power Co. Petition

WASHINGTON — An attorney for public power groups said Friday they will not oppose the Idaho Power Co.'s petition to intervene in an impending court fight over Hells Canyon Dam sites. The National Hells Canyon Assn. and other groups asked the federal Circuit Court of Appeals Nov. 28 to review a Federal Power Commission order licensing three dams proposed by the power company in the Snake River along the Idaho-Oregon border. They advocate a federal dam in Hells Canyon, which would be flooded by the three smaller projects. Lucien Hilmer of the law firm representing the public power groups said they would not oppose an intervention petition filed recently with the court by the Idaho Power Co. The company said in its petition it has started construction of one dam which under the FPC license must be completed in 36 months and that power from the project "is vitally needed" in an area faced with "an impending disastrous shortage." The FPC is expected to submit the record of a year-long hearing in the Hells Canyon case to the court late this month. Then, following a conference of attorneys, the court is expected to set dates for the filing of briefs prior to the hearing of arguments.

Dulles Appeals To Britain Not To Relax Trade

PARIS — U.S. Secretary of State Dulles was reported Friday to have appealed to British Foreign Secretary MacMillan in an effort to halt a British move to relax Allied trade restrictions on Red China. The British reportedly advised the Americans they might be compelled to ease the restrictions soon because of strong political and business pressures at home. Possibility of such action has worried the American administration because it would spell the loss of an important bargaining counter in current discussions between U.S. and Red Chinese representatives in Geneva. Informed diplomats said Dulles asked MacMillan to take no quick action before the whole tangled question can be discussed at the highest level—presumably by President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Eden when they meet next month in Washington. Dulles was understood to have sent MacMillan a letter on the subject from Washington, then followed up during talks the two have had here during the current NATO council meeting. The informants did not disclose the outcome nor what MacMillan replied to Dulles.

Typhoon Ruth Narrowly Misses Iwo Jima Island

TOKYO — Typhoon Ruth Saturday narrowly missed the island fortress of Iwo Jima and roared on northeast along a 600-mile wide swath of the Pacific. The much-feared storm was located Saturday 140 miles east of Iwo by the U.S. Air Force, still packing winds of up to 115 miles per hour. Two's last big typhoon hit with 170 m.p.h. winds which leveled 99 per cent of the air forces installations above ground. Air Force spokesmen said Ruth was moving northwest at 40 m.p.h. and by 3 p.m. Sunday would be several hundred miles away from Iwo.

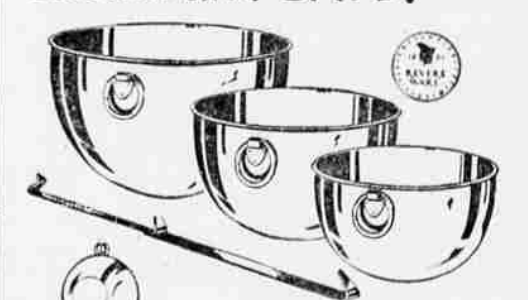
Kefauver Hasn't Listed Oregon For Primary Entry

PORTLAND — Backers of Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn) said Friday they have received no word from the senator as to whether he will enter the May presidential primary in Oregon. Kefauver announced earlier in the day that he would be a candidate for the Democratic nomination. He won the Oregon primary in 1952 by an overwhelming majority. He was the only active candidate then although the names of Adlai Stevenson and Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas had been placed on the ballot. Jack Bain, Multnomah County commissioner, who managed Kefauver's 1952 Oregon campaign, said he planned to talk to the senator on the telephone Friday night. Monroe Sweetland, Democratic national committeeman for Oregon, said he received a telegram from the senator Thursday night announcing the Kefauver candidacy but that it did not disclose Kefauver's plans for Oregon. Sweetland said "it is difficult to say at this time" whether Kefauver and Adlai Stevenson will be opposing candidates in Oregon in May. He said he personally favors a Democratic ticket of Stevenson for President and Kefauver for vice president.

Sen. Magnuson's Bill To Double Small Loans

SEATTLE — Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash) said this week he will introduce a bill to double the small business loan fund in order to make sure enough money will be available to aid Pacific Northwest firms which were hard-hit by the November freeze. He said the present law sets a ceiling of 25 million dollars on disaster loans by the Small Business Administration while requests already have been made for 42 million in disaster loans from various parts of the country. "In order to be sure that local businessmen get relief, this ceiling will have to be doubled," the senator said, "and I plan to introduce the necessary action just as soon as the session opens." He said the 3 per cent SBA loans would be needed chiefly by our businessmen and possibly holly growers.

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Phenix City Gets Special Citation For Crime Attack

New York — The fight of Phenix City Ala., to drive out entrenched crime, vice and corruption won it a place among 11 communities named Friday as "All-America Cities." The other 10 announced by the National Municipal League and Look Magazine, co-sponsors of the annual citations, are: Bellevue, Wash.; Bloomington, Ill.; Cambridge, Ohio; Grand Island, Neb.; Joliet, Ill.; Port Huron, Mich.; Reading, Pa.; Riverside, Calif.; St. Paul, Minn.; and Savannah, Ga. Honorable mention went to El Campo, Tex., and Fort Collins, Colo. In Phenix City, 769 indictments were returned to crush a crime syndicate preying on troops stationed at nearby Ft. Benning, Ga. Bellevue, east of Seattle across Lake Washington, was chosen for meeting problems of expanding population. The 11 communities cited were selected from 22 whose spokesmen presented arguments in Seattle last summer before a "jury" headed by George Gallup, league president.

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Mother's Love For Son Example Seen In Court

NEW YORK — Example of a mother's love: Her 24-year-old son punched her in the face and split her lip but she went to bat for him in court. The son, John Foley, appeared Friday before magistrate Louis Kaplan, charged with assault in the beating on Thursday of his mother, Mrs. Margaret Foley. Mrs. Foley, her face still swollen, pleaded that the charge be reduced to disorderly conduct so her son would not have a criminal record. In granting the request, and sentencing Foley to six months in the workhouse, Kaplan commented: "Shameful, disgraceful."

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
