Russell Paces Dons To Victory, 65-58

Memo to Marquette coach Jack Nagler:

If you're going to ambush somebody, pal, don't send 'em an engraved invitation.

Nagle, who jumped into national collegiate prominence last season with the Warriors, didn't let a few much to the imagination as he indicated he thought his boys were a match for San Francisco and All-America Bill Russell. He allowed as how the Warriors, if they could give the 6-10 Russell a go under the boards, might spring an upset when the Dons carried their 29-game winning streak and No. 1 ranking into the DePaul tournament at the Chicago Stadium.

Marquette almost pulled it off last night. But in the end, it was San Francisco by 65-58. Russell was the Santa guy — he had it in the bag.

There was an upset at the Stadium, but host DePaul pulled it off, knocking over previously unbeaten and sixth-ranked Duquesne 63-64. The Blue Demons, who lost to Kentucky by one point at week's start, dumped in 10 of 12 free throw attempts in the final 4 minutes.

San Francisco qualified for the "title" game of the tourney against DePaul as the Dons opened their eastern tour with a second-half surge led by Russell. Duquesne was the fourth casualty of the week among the top 10 teams, but the only one to misfire last night. Utah, No. 3 battered Idaho State 69-53; Dayton, No. 7 took care of 14-rated Cincinnati 66-57; and Brigham Young, No. 8, leveled Colorado — conqueror of fourth-ranked Iowa this week — by an impressive 70-53 count.

Mississippi and Texas will meet in the Blue-Gray final at Montgomery, Ala., tonight. Of Miss outlasted Eastern Kentucky 95-92 as Jack Adams hit 38 points. Once-beaten Texas handed Auburn its first defeat 83-76 after trailing by 14 at the half.

In a trio of upsets, Nebraska, after losing three of four, surprised UCLA 71-65; Middlebury gave Harvard its first defeat 36-46 and Connecticut beat St. Joseph's (Pa.) 71-66.

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Oaks 80, Hornets 77

Full-court pressing in the fourth period, Camas Valley's wild-scoring Hornets almost caught up with Oakland before dropping an 80-77 decision to the Oaks Friday night at Camas Valley.

The losers outscored the Oaks 31-17 in the final eight minutes of action to fall three points shy of tying, the closest they got. Camas Valley started the fourth period trailing by 17 points, 63-46.

Bobby and Chester McClellan, Byron Baker and Gary Spencer led the ball-hawking assault with Baker finally totting up 19 points for the final half. He led scoring for the game with 29.
