

Duck Hunter Killed By Accidental Shot

KLAMATH FALLS — Edgar Goerlitz, 33, Montague, Calif., was fatally wounded in a hunting accident just across the state line in California Sunday.

Goerlitz, who had been duck hunting with a companion whose name was not learned, was brought to a Klamath Falls hospital where he died some two hours after the shooting.

Sheriff A. B. Cottar of Siskiyou County, Calif., said Goerlitz apparently bumped into his companion and his gun discharged, wounding Goerlitz in the back.

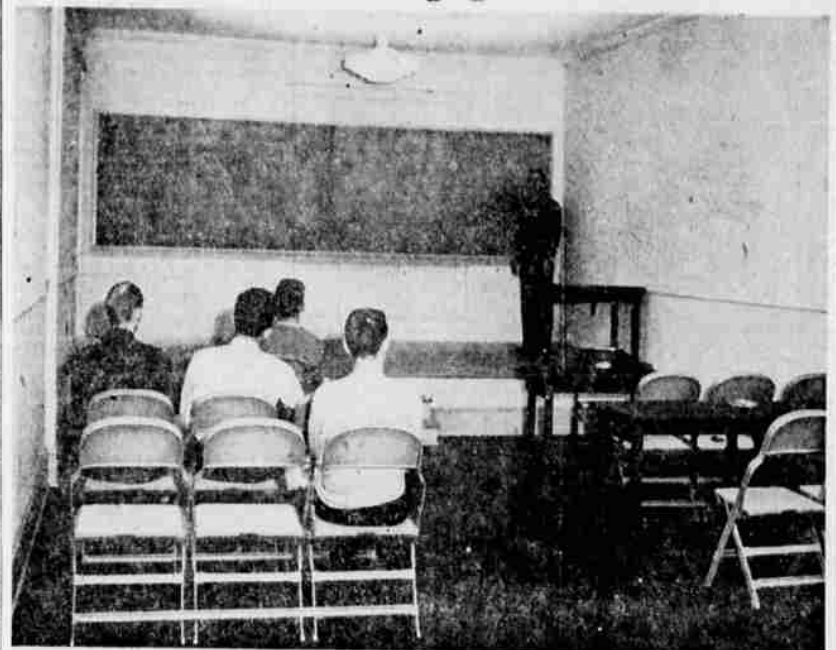
The dinner is one of many to be held by Republicans over the country marking the end of three years of the Eisenhower administration.

Old Soldiers' Building Sees Some Change

The old soldiers' mess hall on the Veterans Administration grounds in Roseburg would never be recognized as such.

Building 23, built in 1893, once served as kitchen and mess hall for the soldiers' home, predecessor of the VA Hospital.

Now, after complete renovation, it houses two Army Reserve units, one Air Force Reserve unit, Co. 1, 3rd Batt., 413th Inf. Reg., 104th Div., Det. 1, 643rd Station Complement Unit, and the 9415th Air Reserve Squadron. The Air Force unit moved in this month, the Army in September.

It cost about \$19,000 to remodel the entire interior of the building and get it ready for the reservists. It's modern throughout — flooring, lights, walls, and so forth.

There are separate offices for the Air Force and Army sergeants assigned to the units here, with supply and storerooms. Two large classrooms take most of the space on the main floor. In the basement, a rifle range is being set up.

Located near the Naval Reserve quarters, reservists now can find plenty of parking room. A drill field for the Army is planned next to the parking lot.

Starting the first week in January, the Army units will meet each Thursday at 8 p.m. and the Air Force squadron will meet at the same time on Wednesday. The Air Force unit does not meet in December, July and August. The Army units hold 48 training sessions per year.

The public is welcome to stop at the new headquarters and see what the old mess hall looks like. The address is 1614 W. Harvard Ave.

Water Potential For Coast Cities To Be Re-Studied

The maximum amount of water potential available to Reedsport and Winchester Bay areas will be given immediate re-study.

Reedsport City Council members have authorized expenditure of \$2,000 to find out the potential available to the area from Clear Lake, reports the Port Umpqua Courier.

Council action followed requests from the Green Bay, Wis., Pulp Co., which had indicated interest in locating an alderwood plant in the area. The plant would require four million gallons of water daily.

The rated potential of Clear Lake has been assumed to be about 10 million gallons per day. City Manager Al Rear of Reedsport said it might not be more than 3½ million gallons. That figure is about enough for a doubling of the area's population, the city manager pointed out, but not enough for industry, without extensive improvements in dams and storage at the lake.

It was also noted that the sandy soils of the lake area might prevent any increase since this might cause pressure openings.

Although the Wisconsin company had offered to pay half the price for the re-study, the Reedsport paper said.

Council declined to accept the assistance. The Council's stand was made so as to not commit the city to the Green Bay project, the newspaper said.

Bonebrake Re-elected To Head Agricultural Stabilization Committee

J. F. Bonebrake, Melrose, has been re-elected chairman of the Douglas County Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Committee.

County ASC delegates met recently to elect officers for the coming year. Named to office were the following persons:

Bonebrake said the county handbook of conservation practices would be mailed in January to all farmers and ranchers on the ASC office mailing list.

He pointed out that the county committee was interested in helping farmers. Under the agricultural conservation program, the government offers assistance to farmers and ranchers. It amounts to approximately 50 per cent of the cost of carrying out a practice (up to the personal limit of \$750), he said. The ASC committee works to do everything possible to conserve, improve and better utilize soil, water and timber resources of the county, Bonebrake concluded.
