Standard Ins. Co. Awarded Contract

SALEM — Standard Insurance Co., Portland, has won a contract to provide mortgage cancellation life insurance for veterans who have farm and home loans made by the State Department of Veterans Affairs.

Harry S. Dorman, state finance and administration director, said the veteran borrowers can get the insurance for only 28 cents per month on each \$1,000 of insurance. The amount of insurance would be the amount of the unpaid balance on the veteran's mortgage.

If the veteran died, his nearest survivor would receive the home mortgage-free.

Fourteen insurance companies submitted bids, and Standard's was low.

The plan will become operative when 75 per cent of the veteran borrowers sign up for the insurance. The borrowers will receive application forms and explanatory material next month.

There was a rash of such affairs last spring after the Meier & Frank Co. store bombing. There was one Monday at Roseburg.

While it was assumed at Roseburg the threat was a hoax, perhaps by a student seeking a day from classes, there will be no study time lost—the day will be made up either at spring vacation or at the end of the year.

Last spring several Portland students were caught and admitted phoning bomb threats. They lost their school credits for the year, had to pay a share of police and fire department call costs, and were put on probation.
