Administration Asks Stepped Up Foreign Assistance

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Dulles announced Tuesday the administration wants to step up its foreign aid spending by 200 million dollars next year, and will ask Congress for a \$1,300,000,000 appropriation.

All of the contemplated increase in spending would be for economic help—a field in which Russia has recently shown great activity.

He added:

Alluding to this, Dulles said the United States "seeks no monopoly in rendering economic assistance," but declared "it would seem unna-

ture for the Soviet rulers to provide economic aid to other peoples than the peoples they already rule are themselves in dire need.

"We hope that Soviet economic aid is not offered as a Trojan horse to penetrate, and then take over, independent countries."

Dulles told a news conference he regretted very much a misunderstanding which he said had given congressional leaders the impression the program to be submitted in January would be about the same as that voted this year.

Dulles said the new money request to be laid before Congress will cover both military and economic aid and that the jump of about \$2,200,000,000 over this year's program is to be explained in large part by the need to keep the pipeline of military supplies full.

The actual spending on foreign aid for the fiscal year beginning next July 1 is planned at \$4,400,000,000—leaving 500 million dollars

in reserve. The military spending rate would stay at about \$2,500,000,000, the same as this fiscal year, but the economic aid would be upped by 200 million dollars to about \$1,900,000,000.

Dulles said that 100 million dollars of the proposed increased foreign aid would be a special presidential fund for use in the Soviet-threatened Middle East.

The contemplated request for \$1,300,000,000 more than was appropriated for foreign aid in the last session of Congress, and is larger than many of the legislators had anticipated.

In response to questions, Dulles said:

1. He knows of nothing on which to base optimism about a quick peace between Israel and the Arab nations.

2. He regards Russia's veto of Japan's application for United Nations membership as aimed to get bargaining advantages at London peace talks between the two countries.

Returning to the contemplated foreign aid program, Dulles drew a distinction between appropriations and spending, explaining the actual expenditures will be only 200 million dollars more than the present fiscal year ending next June 30.

Vessels Search North Pacific For Barge Crew

KIDKAK, Alaska — Coast Guard and Navy vessels searched the North Pacific Tuesday for the four-man crew of the barge Seahorse on the faint hope the men may have escaped in a lifeboat when the barge sank during a weekend storm.

The Coast Guard said the tug Pawtucket reported the Seahorse sank in Gulf of Alaska riptides off Pt. Gore early Sunday while being towed from Kodiak to Cordova. Pt. Gore is at the tip of the Kenai Peninsula.

Searchers found one wrecked lifeboat from the Seahorse but the barge was known to have carried a second motorized lifeboat which had provisions. No trace was found of the second lifeboat.

Rexford Peters of Kodiak was the captain of the barge and Arlo Kice of Seattle was the engineer. The other two crewmen were not identified.

The Seahorse, owned by the Kodiak Aleutian Salvage Co., had been doing dredging work at Kodiak. Peters, a captain in the Army Transportation Corps in World War II, was well known in Alaska.

Commercial TV began here Sept. 22 in competition with the government-owned British Broadcasting Corp., which has no morning shows and no advertising.

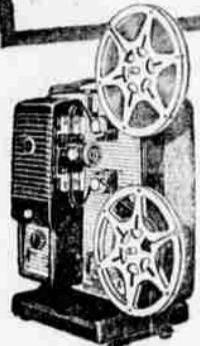

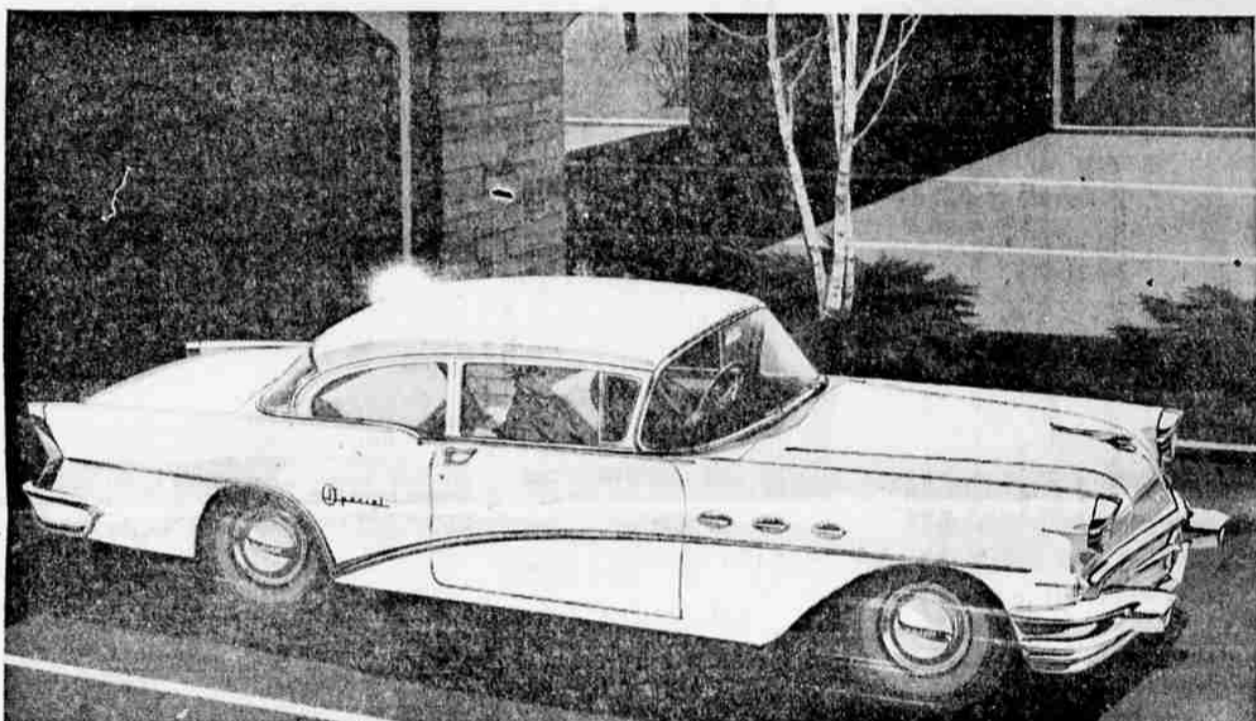
