World Of Baseball Honors Connie Mack

PHILADELPHIA — Connie Mack, born during the Civil War when baseball was but a twinkle on the American horizon, is 93 today.

And for the Grand Old Man himself it was a happy day indeed. Several thousand telegrams and letters have poured in from friends and well-wishers, young and old, who love the sport in which Mack — born Cornelius J. McGillicuddy — was a pioneer.

Some of the greetings came yesterday when Mack celebrated the big day at the suburban Bryn Mawr home of one of his sons, Roy. The festivities took place then to permit Mack to mark the occasion with newsmen and photographers.

Just three days ago Mack left Presbyterian Hospital after a checkup. He had fractured his hip in a fall 2 1/2 months ago. His physician said that injury and the fracture from another fall are mending well.

Mack managed the Philadelphia Athletics for 50 years and won nine league pennants and five World Series before the A's departed for Kansas City.

There was a twinkle in his eyes yesterday — he still has a magic memory for names — when a card arrived from his bat boy of 50 years ago, Fred Haynes, of Los Angeles.

A greeting came from Bobby Shantz, now with Kansas City and the last of Connie's incredible list of great southpaw pitchers. There also was a card signed by the entire class of School No. 10, Detroit, and another from the Board of Aldermen of North Brookfield, Mass., an area that Mack left in 1905.

When it came to blowing out the candles on the big birthday cake topped by a white elephant, the symbol of the A's, Connie signaled to his son Roy for assistance.

As his son helped, Connie looked up at the press photographers and newsmen, the quiver of a smile playing across his lips.

"God bless you all," he said, "and merry Christmas, merry Christmas everybody."

Washington Teams Lose In Exhibition

Dynamic Robin Freeman, a little man among basketball's giants, is poppin' em through the basket at a pace that could put him among the game's all-time scoring leaders.

The 5-10 All America from Ohio State has whipped home 241 points in seven games for an average of 34.4 points a game.

In one of the outstanding performances on last night's card, Freeman allied 31 points as Ohio State wallowed Washington's Huskies 94-73. The victory was the Buckeyes' sixth against a lone loss to eighth-ranked Vanderbilt.

This prolific point production was nothing new for Freeman. Last year he reached an average of 31.5 in 13 games before he was sidelined for the season with injuries and illness. At that, his game average was the fourth highest on record.

The all-time standard is held by Frank Selvy of Furman, who hit for 41.7 points a game two years ago. Darrell Floyd, also of Furman, is next with 35.9 followed by Dick Wilkinson of Virginia with 32.1. Floyd was tops last season.

Washington, coached by Tippy Dye who was Ohio State pilot a few years ago, started off in front and with five minutes to go in the first half led the Buckeyes, 31-24.

But Freeman teamed with Jim McLaughlin and Frank Howard in a rally that put Ohio State ahead, 44-39, at halftime. The closest Washington came in the second half was 63-60 at the midway point.

Two rookies, Bruno Boin with 21 and John Tuft with 19, led Washington scorers.

Only Brigham Young among the nation's top 10 teams saw action last night and the Cougars were set back for the second straight night, this time by Wake Forest 86-80.

Colorado A & M upset Colorado 60-38 when Rich Gregory tipped in a rebound with only 4 seconds left to play. Colorado led 19-9 midway in the first half and 56-51 with four minutes remaining in the second.

Then Gregory and Jack Bryant got the Aggies rolling. For the favored Buffaloes it was their third straight loss.

Tulane moved in front of Washington State in the opening seconds and rolled it up to win 91-52. State managed only five field goals and 18 points in the second half.

Tulane led 30-13 after 10 minutes and was in front, 50-34, at halftime. Larry Beck and Ed Steele scored 16 points apiece for the Cougars. It was WSC's sixth loss against one win. The Cougars move to Mobile Ala., Friday to play Spring Hill.

Southern California took an early lead and marched easily to a 65-59 conquest of Dartmouth in the first game of a double header at San Francisco's Cow Palace. In the windup, Stanford beat Santa Clara 62-55.

And the Quantico, Va., Marines won their own Christmas tournament for the second straight year by routing Mt. St. Mary's of Maryland.
