Seattle Squad Edges Loyola

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — The four favorites moved into Wednesday night's semifinal round of the All-College basketball tournament here, but not before several were scared by surprise showings of the underdogs.

The Oklahoma Aggies, seeking their 12th title in the 20-year history of the tournament, set themselves up as prime favorites with the finest performance of the first round in putting down up-start Texas Tech, 65-47, Tuesday night.

The Aggies meet Oklahoma City University, the 10th ranked team nationally, while No. 1 seeded Seattle plays Tulsa in Wednesday night's semifinals. In the afternoon consolation round, Loyola of the South met Idaho State and Texas Tech clashed with Pennsylvania.

OCU beat Penn 74-62 in the first round while Tulsa nudged Idaho State 60-59 and Seattle edged Loyola 74-70.

Tulsa got the big scare of the first round, losing a five-point lead with two minutes left in its game to a smooth-handling ball club from Idaho State.

Seattle had only a 71-70 lead over Loyola with 55 seconds left in their tournament-opener but added three points for insurance. In the first 15 minutes of the game, the lead changed hands eight times before Seattle moved ahead 36-30 at the half.

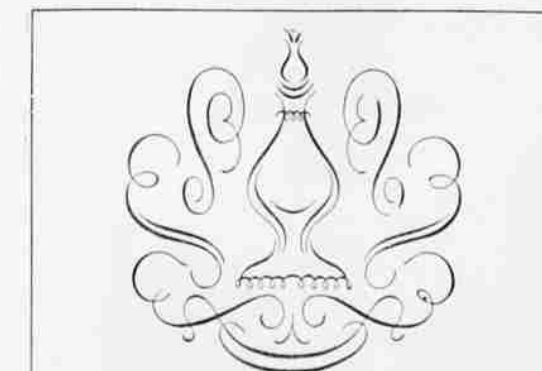

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Pitt's Negro Fullback Readies For Extra Pressure From Tech

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Bob Grier, Pittsburgh's 190-pound senior fullback, said today he could take the extra pressure he faces in the Sugar Bowl if his knee holds up.

While the whole Pitt squad shares the stress of meeting Georgia Tech in a bowl game, Grier has two others he must absorb alone.

He knows he will become the first Negro to take part in a Sugar Bowl game and he knows he may have little relief in his unexpected role as starter.

"I think everything will be all right," he said. "If my knee stands up in practice and during the game. Everybody down here has been nice. And I don't believe any of us are too nervous about the way we'll play."

Grier inherited the starting role yesterday when regular fullback Tom Jenkins, pulled a cartilage in his knee during practice.

Dr. W. K. Smith, the team physician, said Jenkins would be out "if we had to play today."

"He may come around before next Monday, but we're not too encouraged," he added.

Coach John Michelosen planned no strategy changes after learning Jenkins may not be available.

"Grier is a good boy," he said. "In fact, he's a better runner than Jenkins. The running game may be stronger and the defense not quite as sharp with the switch. He's not quite the linebacker and blocker that Jenkins is, but he's improving there."

And Ralph Ciper is available too. We moved him over from halfback to help Jenkins out after Grier hurt his knee. He hasn't had a lot of experience at fullback, but he has ability."

Michelosen ordered a heavy scrimmage today for the second session in a row.

West Gridders Train Secretly

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The West planned a secret workout Wednesday in final preparations for Saturday's Shrine football game.

West Coach Jess Hill said he was not really worried about spying but was taking no chances on any spectator inadvertently tipping his plans to the East.

Tuesday marked the end of double workouts for the West. The team worked mainly on passes. Stanford back Bill Tarr, out two days with a slight leg injury, returned.

The East ran through routine practice, working on a little of everything.

Assistant Coach Stu Holcomb indicated the East is planning on using some players as offensive specialists—particularly Ray Lemek, Notre Dame guard, and John Breidice, Boston University end. The game is being played under free substitution rules.
