

Veterans Service Office Has Been Popular Place

The new Douglas County service office for veterans proved popular in its first four months of existence. Don Frear, veterans' service officer, shows.

The office was set up last August. Through the end of November, Frear conducted 842 interviews with veterans seeking aid in one form or another.

In the first month, there were 196 calls for assistance; 159 in September; 137 in October and 220 in November. In November, Frear added, 52 claims were approved. They ranged from hospitalization to business and home loans.

The service officer announced applications for two benefits for disabled veterans are being taken by him now.

Veterans who are 40 per cent or more disabled may apply until April 1 for county property tax exemptions. Such veterans may claim exemption of the first \$1,500 of assessed valuation of property. Old exemptions are continued on the tax rolls, Frear pointed out.

and only applications for veterans claiming exemptions for the first time need be made.

Veterans disabled by 25 per cent or more may make applications for special angling and hunting licenses for 1955. Each type of license normally costs \$4, but veterans may purchase them for 50 cents each, or \$1 for both, by applying at his office.
