French Troops Scale Hills To Rescue 12 Men

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP)—Two thousand French troops scaled hills within sight of Algiers Wednesday in an attempt to rescue a French officer and 12 men abducted by rebels 48 hours before.

They recovered three of the captured men. All were still living but their bodies were heavily slashed by rebel knives. They were rushed into the city by ambulance.

Officers would not say immediately whether those rescued were some of the seven Frenchmen of the six Algerians seized by the rebels from a hilltop post 20 miles from Algiers early Monday.

Strong French forces pushed deeper into the broken mountain country of Debel Bou Zegza whose crowning peaks can be clearly seen from the streets of Algiers.

Warrant Officer Held As Driver Of Getaway Car

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP)—A chief warrant officer with 21 years' service was held Wednesday as the driver of the getaway car in a 17,500 Army payroll theft here Dec. 14.

He was identified by the Army as C. W. O. Hubert S. Martin, 40, of Seattle, Wash. An Army spokesman said Martin was eligible for retirement last year but elected to remain in the service.

Army investigators said Martin first denied, then admitted driving Sgt. Donald F. Moller, 37, of Detroit, and Eva Maria Hladik, 24, a Frankfurt bar girl, to Cologne after the theft.

The warrant officer told the investigators that Moller paid him 7,000 marks (\$1,696) to drive him and his friend to Cologne, 110 miles northwest of here, in a rented automobile.

Moller was arrested Tuesday in a Copenhagen hotel. He was returned to Frankfurt by plane Wednesday handcuffed to an Army plainclothes man.

Both Martin and Moller were arrested after police seized and questioned the German woman three days ago in Dusseldorf. They said \$3,500 of the missing money was found in her hotel room.

She told police that Moller had caught a plane to Denmark under a false name and was planning to go to the United States.

The Army said that charges against both Martin and Moller were being prepared.

Moller was assigned to pick up the payroll at an American Express office here. He drove off after tricking two German assistants to get out of the car.

An Army spokesman said that Martin, who served with Moller in Japan, was picked out of a police lineup here by the German woman after he originally denied he was involved.

Brazil's President Sets Flying Trip To U. S.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP)—Brazil's incoming President will set out on flying visits to the United States and Europe next week in quest of foreign capital for his country's ailing economy.

President-elect Juscelino Kubitschek, who takes office Jan. 31, is slated to confer in the United States with President Eisenhower, Secretary of State Dulles and U.S. financial leaders.

The following week he will push on to Europe, trying to drum up trade in Britain, France, Italy, West Germany and Portugal.

Experiment On Rats Indicates Role Of Diet In Pregnancy

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—A rat experiment which indicates that diet plays a powerful role in maintaining normal pregnancy and insuring live births was reported Wednesday by two University of California researchers.

Female rats deprived of their protein, potassium, vitamin B-1 or vitamin B-6 in the first few days of their pregnancy lost their litters.

But when one of two female sex hormones was added to their food they yielded live births—even though any one of the four supposedly essential substances was missing from their diet.

The researchers, Dr. Marjorie Nelson and Dr. Herbert M. Evans, of the university's Institute for Experimental Biology, concluded that the dietary deficiency interfered with either the production or release of these same hormones by the mother rat's system.

The hormones involved are progesterone, which plays a special role in maintaining pregnancy, and estrone, a substance responsible for some of the normal attributes of the female.

Presumably the administration of the extra hormones permitted a release of a reserve supply of protein or other dietary essential from the mother's body to the unborn rats, but the experimenters said this has yet to be proved by laboratory evidence.

Tests are under way to determine how the dietary deficiency interferes with the natural hormone system. The researchers said they were not yet sure whether the diet defect acted upon the ovaries, which normally produce the hormones, or on the pituitary gland, which puts out substances that promote the production of the hormones by the ovaries.

Wholesale Food Prices Dip Slightly This Week

NEW YORK (AP)—Wholesale food prices as measured by the Dun & Bradstreet index dipped slightly this week, reaching the lowest level in 5 1/2 years.

The index moved to \$5.95 from \$5.97 a week ago. It was the lowest since June 12, 1950, just before the start of the Korean War. A year ago, the index stood at \$6.75.

The index represents the total cost of one pound of each of 31 foods in general use.

Up this week were wheat, rye, oats, hams, cottonseed oil and lard. Lower were flour, corn, lard, butter, milk, cocoa and eggs.
