Administering Of Laws On Elections Pondered

SALEM 6P—The Legislative Interim Committee on Elections decided this week to sponsor legislation to let the secretary of state oversee administration of election laws by county clerks.

The bill will be introduced at the 1957 Legislature.

The committee also agreed to sponsor bills giving the secretary of state full responsibility for administration of election laws at the state level, giving similar powers to county clerks at the local level, and providing for appeal boards in the state and counties.

Sam Haley, legislative counsel who drafts bills, said interim committees should have their requests ready by July 1.

Damage To Eye Charged In Accident Damage Suit

Charles Welch is suing Charles McDaniels for \$15,000 general damages for the alleged disfigurement of her left eye in a traffic accident on Highway 42 near Temple last Sept. 3.

She charges McDaniels with negligent driving in a circuit court complaint. The injuries were a cut near the eye and a bruised eyeball, she states.

SECTION 32-2414, O.C.L.A.—Every person owning or keeping any dog over the age of eight (8) months within the State of Oregon shall, not later than March 1st of each year or within thirty (30) days after he becomes owner or keeper of such dog, procure from the clerk of the county in which said person resides a license for such dog by paying said license fee and provided further, that if said person fails to procure such license within the time as herein provided, the County Court may prescribe a penalty in an additional sum not to exceed \$2.00 for each dog. Such license fee shall be the only license or tax required for the ownership or keeping of a dog within this state, and no city or town or municipal subdivision thereof shall impose any further license fee for dogs. Provided, however, that cities of one hundred thousand (100,000) or more population may prescribe and impose a license fee which shall be in lieu of the license fee herein required. The County Assessor and his deputies forthwith shall report to the Sheriff all dogs that they shall find that are not licensed as herein provided, together with the owner or keeper thereof.

LICENSE FEES—Male \$2.00; Female \$3.00; Spayed Female \$2.00. If licensed before March 1st of each year, if licensed after March 1st, add a penalty of \$1.00 and after June 1st, a penalty of \$2.00 to each license fee when paying or remitting for a dog license, except a dog just purchased or reaching the age of Eight months, the license then being due within 30 days.
