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Famed French Actress Dies Following Illness

PARIS (AP)—Mistinguett, French music hall star for half a century whose legs were once among the world's most famous, died Thursday after a two-week illness. She was 82.

The noted entertainer died in her sleep at her brother's home in suburban Bougival. She suffered a paralytic stroke while spending the Christmas holiday there and subsequently developed pneumonia.

Soviet Union's Expedition Sights Antarctic Land

LONDON (AP)—Moscow Radio reported today that the leading ship of the Soviet Union's expedition to the South Polar regions had sighted the Antarctic continent.

The Soviet expedition is one of a number from various countries preparing Antarctic bases for scientific observations during the 1957-58 International Geophysical Year. A U.S. Navy force already has established bases at McMurdo Sound and on the Ross Sea ice shelf.

Appeals Court Upsets Conviction Of Red Leader

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U. S. Court of Appeals Thursday overturned the conviction of Louis Weinstock, a Communist Party leader, on a charge of lying to the Subversive Activities Control Board.

Weinstock was convicted in District Court here early last year of falsely denying the existence since May, 1948, of a "United May Day Committee" in New York.

Weinstock said in a sworn statement filed with the SACB that while there was no "United May Day Committee" since 1948, there had been a "United Labor and Peoples' Committee for May Day." He made the sworn statement in connection with a proceeding brought by Atty. Gen. Brownell to require the United May Day Committee to register as a Communist front.

Weinstock received a sentence of one to five years. At the time of his trial here he was under a three-year sentence in New York under the Smith Act. He was among the secondary party leaders convicted in New York of conspiring to advocate and teach the overthrow of the government by force and violence.

The appeals court divided 2-1 in holding Weinstock's statement was not "material."

The majority, in reversing the conviction outright, said District Judge Henry A. Schweinhaut, who presided at the trial, should have directed a judgment of acquittal of Weinstock.
