### Greenberg, Cronin Eyed For Honor

NEW YORK (AP) — It's voting time again for baseball's Hall of Fame and it may be that Hank Greenberg and Joe Cronin this year will make the coveted list. Greenberg, now general manager of the Cleveland Indians, was one of the American League's greatest righthanded sluggers in his playing days as a first baseman with Detroit. In one year he walloped 58 home runs. Cronin, in his heyday a topflight shortstop and in a career of the Washington Senators, also is in the front office these days as general manager of the Boston Red Sox. Last year when Joe DiMaggio, Ted Lyons, Dizzy Vance and Gabby Hartnett were enshrined, Greenberg and Cronin ranked 5th and 6th in the voting by 10-year members of the Baseball Writers' Assn. Greenberg was named on 157 ballots, 32 shy of the required 189 of 75 per cent of the 251 ballots cast. Cronin was named on 115. The veteran scribes will vote for players, active at some time during the years 1930-50, inclusive. A new rule provides that a player to be eligible must have been retired as a player, manager, coach or umpire in organized baseball for at least five years. Previously a player needed to have been retired for only one year, even though serving as manager, coach or umpire. Retired players, in addition to Greenberg and Cronin, who failed to receive sufficient votes last year included Ed Roush, Hank Gowdy, Hack Wilson, Lefty Gomez, Tony Lazzeri, Red Ruffing, Zach Wheat,

Ross Young, Kiki Cuyler and Chuck Klein. The deadline for voting this year is Jan. 23. The ballots will be counted a few days thereafter.

### Coaches Prepare Senior Bowl IIs

MOBILE, Ala. (AP)—The natural rivalry of Paul Brown and Buddy Parker was never more apparent than today as they went about preparing opposing squads for Saturday's Senior Bowl game. Both had the air of men with the will to win. Both have virtually dominated pro football during the past six years. Brown's Cleveland Browns have won six straight divisional titles and three world championships. Parker, although his Detroit Lions fell from the peak this past season, won three divisional championships in five years and two world titles.

The major difference noted in their coaching of the Senior Bowl was that Brown devoted most of the early practice to individual tutoring of the players while Parker turned more to drills featuring team play. Brown worked his South quarterbacks, both Hardy of Kentucky and George Herring of Mississippi Southern, repeatedly on a handoff or pitchout. Parker put his offensive and defensive units together early and turned loose his quarterbacks, Jerry Reichow of Iowa and Jim Hahuska of Wisconsin.

Both coaches turned largely to pass patterns in yesterday's work-out and Reichow and Hahuska looked a bit more effective than Hardy and Herring on their aerials.

### Ameche Makes AP All-Pro Team; Van Brocklin, Shaw 'Mentioned'

NEW YORK (AP) — Alan (The Horse) Ameche, bull-driving fullback of the Baltimore Colts, was the only rookie named to The Associated Press 1955 All-Pro team which included three members each from the National Football League champion Cleveland Browns and Los Angeles Western Division titleholders.

Ameche, the league's ball carrying champion, received 26 of the 40 votes cast in the annual balloting by Associated Press member paper football writers and AP staff men.

The former Wisconsin powerhouse earned the nomination by rolling up 961 yards in his first season, 194 of them in his first game.

Although they finished a half game behind the Rams for divisional honors, the Chicago Bears placed four players on the 22-man two platoon squad. They included end Harlon Hill, guard Stan Jones and tackle Bill Wightkin on the offensive eleven and middle guard Bill George on the defensive team. Pittsburgh was the only team that was not represented on either squad.

Otto Graham, who came out of retirement to lead the Browns to their second straight championship won the quarterback post in a romp, getting 28 votes to eight for Green Bay's Tobin Rote. It was the sixth time on the All-Pro team for the 33-year-old former Northwestern great who promptly retired again after scoring two touchdowns and passing for two

more in Cleveland's 38-14 title triumph over Los Angeles. Other Browns voted on the AP "Dream Team" were offensive tackle Lou Groza, the place-kicking specialist, and Frank Gatski, the indestructible center. Rams named were guard Duane Putnam on the attacking unit, and Andy Robustelli and halfback Willard Sherman on the defensive group.

Here's how the offensive eleven shapes up: In the line are ends Pete Pihos of Philadelphia and Hill, guards Putnam and Jones, tackle Groza and Wightkin and center Gatski. The backfield consists of Ollie Matson of the Chicago Cardinals, Frank Gifford of the New York Giants, Ameche and Graham.

The defensive team consists of ends Gene Brito of Washington and Robustelli, tackles Art Donovan of Baltimore and Bob Toney of San Francisco, middle guard George, linebackers Joe Schmidt of Detroit and Roger Zatkoff of Green Bay, backs Bob Dillon of Green Bay and Sherman and safeties Jack Christiansen of Detroit and Emlen Tunnell of the Giants.

Players given honorable mention included: Offense — Tackle, Roosevelt Brown, Giants; quarterback, Norman Van Brocklin, Rams; George Shaw, Colts. Defense — Guards, Les Richter, Rams; linebackers, LaVern Torgeson, Redskins; halfbacks, Don Paul, Browns.

### Dayton's Bill Uhl Showing Spark

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Dayton's third-ranked Flyers have themselves a 10-game winning streak at the moment, but more important, seven-foot Bill Uhl has shed his sleeping giant role and matured into a full-fledged goal in college basketball.

Time was when the big fellow wasn't much more use than a five-foot guy standing in a step ladder. He had height but couldn't move. But last night Big Bill moved with relative ease as the unbeaten Flyers ran away from Duquesne 68-52. Uhl had 23 points, all but three from the field, and grabbed 24 rebounds.

All was not butter and honey among the top-ranked teams last night. Maryland, playing possession ball, upset seventh-ranked George Washington 66-41. And tightly regarded Spring Hill of Mobile, tumbled previously undefeated and 12th-ranked Memphis State 69-45 with a fantastic closing drive in the title game of the Senior Bowl Tournament at Mobile.

George Washington, which hadn't been choked off with less than 50 points since 1950, couldn't get the ball away from Maryland. The Terps just played catch and dared the Colonials, who had averaged 82 points a game in building a 9-1 record. Memphis State seemed headed

for an 11-0 record, leading 63-48 with 7 minutes left in its bid for a second straight Senior Bowl crown. But then Spring Hill went off on a tear, striking for 21 points while State got just a field goal. State attempted a freeze with a 2-point lead and less than 3 minutes left, but Spring Hill twice stole the ball and Ed Tibbets pumped in the clincher from under the basket with 40 seconds remaining. Gene McGuire, who scored the tying points, was high with 27.

Elsewhere, Vince Yockel scored 30 points as Clemson defeated Miami (Fla.) 98-96 in the Senior Bowl consolation game. Western Kentucky wiped out a 3-point deficit and Ohio Xavier unbeaten record 75-73 with Montrose Irland sinking two free throws for the clincher with less than 2 minutes left to edge the Ohioans. And tall, talented St. Louis breeder past Loyola of New Orleans 110-79. Tulane, led by Cal Grosscup—making his first appearance after transferring from Purdue—smacked Georgia 72-56 in a Southeastern Conference game.
