Decision On Reserve Center Is Month Away

WASHINGTON (AP)—A decision on the location of a 100-man Reserve Army Training Center, to be built at Milwaukie, Ore., probably is at least a month away, a Defense Department official indicated Saturday.

Franklin G. Floete, assistant defense secretary, advised Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of the House Armed Services Committee that no decision will be made until an Army representative from Washington has investigated various alternate sites.

This, Floete said, "should be accomplished by about Feb. 1."

The Floete letter was made public by Rep. Norblad (R-Ore.) at whose request Vinson had inquired into the Milwaukie controversy.

The congressman and other members of the Oregon delegation—at the request of Milwaukie residents—have protested a 6th Army recommendation the armory be built in a 5-acre section of the former Kellogg Park Housing Project. They contend this tract could be better used for industrial purposes and that more suitable alternate sites exist for the armory.

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Barbara Hartle Granted Parole

WASHINGTON (AP)—A parole, effective Feb. 1, has been granted Mrs. Barbara Hartle, former top Pacific Northwest woman Communist who renounced the party and became one of the government's chief witnesses in its prosecution of subversives.

Mrs. Hartle, formerly of Seattle and Eugene, Ore., will be released Feb. 1 under a U.S. Parole Board order announced Friday. She will have served one third of her five-year sentence for a Smith Act conviction at the federal women's reformatory at Alderson, W. Va.

She and four other persons were convicted at Seattle Oct. 10, 1953, of violating the Smith Act by conspiring to teach the violent overthrow of the United States government. An unsuccessful appeal was taken to a higher court.

Mrs. Hartle, a former Eugene, Ore., waitress, is the first person granted a parole after conviction under the Smith Act. She had gone "underground" at the time of her arrest.

Actor James Stewart Nurses Wrenched Back

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Actor James Stewart was nursing a wrenched back today, his studio said, after being dragged 50 feet in a parachute harness during the filming of "The Spirit of St. Louis."

The actor was pulled over rough ground when a battery of wind machines, producing a blizzard, caught his parachute. Stewart, playing the role of Charles Lindbergh, was supposed to have bailed out and landed in a snowstorm.

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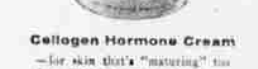
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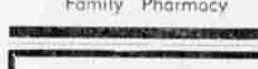
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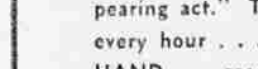
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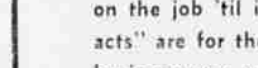
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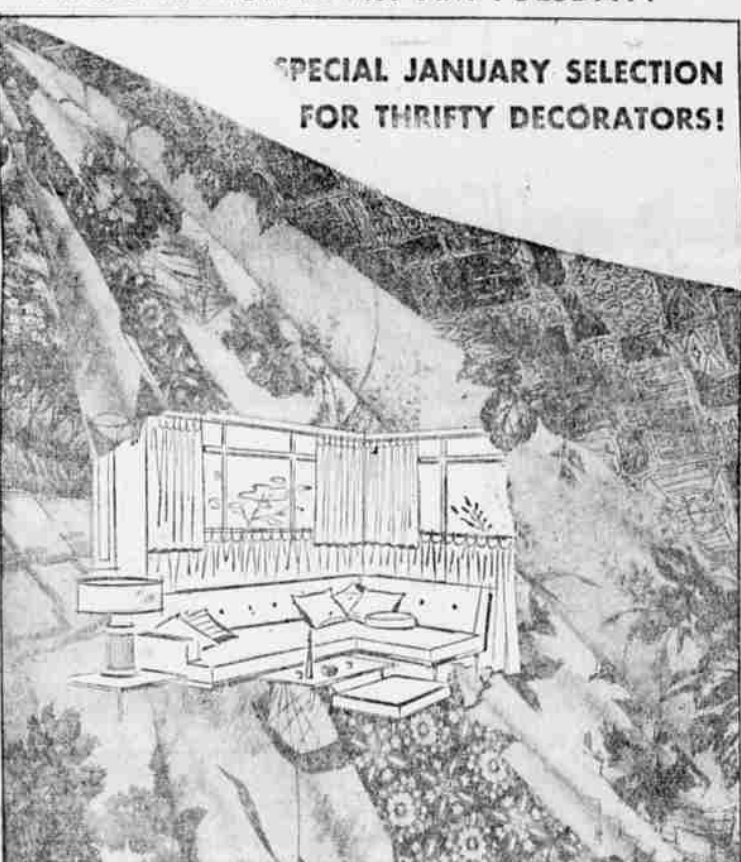
