5 More Precincts Added In County For May Primary

There will be five more precincts in Douglas County when voters go to the polls May 18 in the primary election, according to County Clerk Charles Doerner. In addition, one precinct has been renamed.

Four of the new precincts are in the Roseburg area. The other is in Reedsport, where Wade's Flat precinct was renamed Dean's Creek. Wade's Flat now is partly inside the Reedsport city limits.

In Roseburg, North Brown precinct has been sliced into three new precincts. The designation "North Brown" now includes that part of the old precinct south of the river and east of Broccoli Street. Orchard precinct lies west of Broccoli and south of the river. That part of the old North Brown precinct lying north of the river now will be known as Huerfano precinct.

Edenhower East No. 1 precinct has been split, the north half becoming Newton Creek precinct. It includes all the new housing in the area, plus some surrounding area.

Green precinct also has been split. That part lying west of the old highway and south of Happy Valley Road between the river and Kelley's Korner now will be known as West Green precinct. The rest will continue to be designated Green precinct.

In Reedsport, the Reedsport No. 2 precinct has been divided to make Reedsport No. 4. The move was necessary because of recent annexations.

Winchester Bay was extended to include the populated section just west of the Reedsport city limits.

INJUNCTION SUIT FILED

**PORTLAND** — An injunction, aimed at preventing construction of Portland's proposed eight million dollar sports center in downtown Portland, is asked in a suit filed Friday by a group of East Side businessmen.

They plan to refer the matter of site selection to the voters in the May primary election.

Earlier this week, the Portland Exposition-Recreation Commission selected the downtown site for the proposed center.

Six Agencies Representing Civil Defense In County

Six agencies representing the Federal Civil Defense Administration are in Douglas County surveying flood damage and aiding residents apply for disaster funds.

County Civil Defense Coordinator Gen. J. T. Pierce said Charles H. Beal, Federal Civil Defense engineer, is working with state CD and highway officials since President Eisenhower declared 14 western Oregon counties disaster areas.

Gen. Pierce said information about rehabilitation assistance for individual and private losses may be obtained from the following agencies:

American Red Cross: Will assist in private and individual losses. The amount of assistance depends on the need and each case will be reviewed separately. Persons in need may contact the Douglas County chapter at 814 SE Lane Ave., Roseburg. Telephone numbers are OR 3-3255 or OR 2-3008.

Small Business Administration: Grants non-secured, 10-year loans at 3 per cent interest to individuals or small businesses. Inquire locally at the Red Cross headquarters in Roseburg or write to the head office at Old U. S. Courthouse, Portland, for information.

Federal Housing Administration: Liberalizing terms and extending time of payments for homes and improvements. Inquire by writing to head office at 827 NE Oregon St., Portland.

Veterans Administration: Liberalizing terms on homes of veterans affected by the flood. Contact VA officers at the Veterans Hospital in Roseburg or write to the regional office, Lincoln Building, Portland.

Farmers Home Administration: Will grant loans to farmers for various types of losses. Write to head office at 209 SE Fifth Ave., Portland.

U. S. Dept. of Commerce: Priorities for materials to rebuild small industries and small businesses. Write to Room 217, Pioneer Post Office Building, Portland.

Ben Irving, head of the Douglas County Water Survey, will be featured speaker Jan. 12 at 8 p.m. at a meeting of the South Douglas Conservation Assn. The meeting is scheduled at the Myrtle Creek school cafeteria, according to the Myrtle Creek Mail.

Main item of discussion on the agenda will be the recent flood and results of a survey now being conducted by the association. It has asked individuals and businesses to help it in obtaining a true estimate of damage.

Information requested by the association are estimates of personal property damage, hours of work lost from jobs in dollars, extra labor necessitated by the flood, and stock or building losses.

Anyone with this information is asked to send it on a post card to R. E. Buhl, Kelly, secretary of the association, Myrtle Creek, or to Glenn Riddle, president, at Riddle.

At its Jan. 12 meeting, the association will also elect a new slate of officers for the 1956 year.
