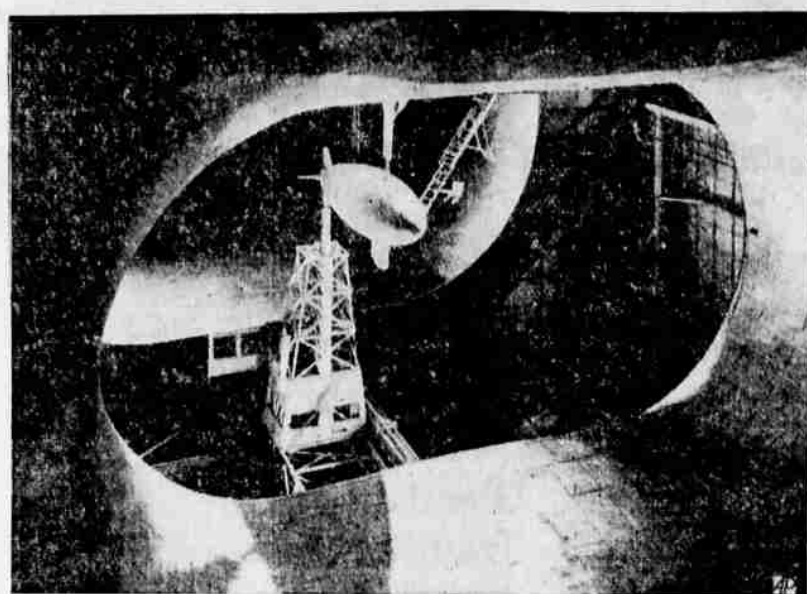

Cut In U. S. Money Aid To India Is Restored

WASHINGTON — The State Department was reported Monday to have restored a 10-million-dollar cut in aid to India which had been ordered by Foreign Aid Director John B. Hollister.

Secretary of State Dulles is understood to have directed personally that the aid be re-instated, partly in response to appeals from U.S. Ambassador John Sherman Cooper in New Delhi.

Cooper is reported to have protested the cut in a series of dispatches, contending it dealt a serious blow to the prestige of the United States to reduce aid funds previously authorized by Congress.

In a report on the livestock situation, the department said it appears now that production of meat animals for the next few years is likely to continue at high volume and the supply of meat to consumers to remain abundant.

Trademarked "Lucite" and "Dulux 100", the new finishes retain their luster three times longer than conventional auto paints, the company said. It asserted that both paints hold their color and gloss so well that once they are in general use, washing from time to time will remove road film and restore the original luster.

The new paints are being used to a limited extent by several manufacturers on 1956 models, duPont said.

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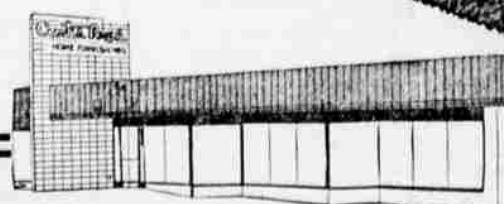
