

Pebble Beach Tourney Next For Champion Of LA Open

LOS ANGELES — Lloyd Mangrum, his bank account fattened by \$6,000 off his fourth victory in a Los Angeles Open, has served a warning to his brother professional golfers that he is back in sound physical shape and aiming at further conquests.

Mangrum made it a start to finish triumph in winning the Los Angeles fixture, beginning with two straight 66s, then a 68 and a 1-over-par 72 that was good enough to stand up at the windup of the 30th annual event Monday.

Crosby Meet Next
The one-time National Open champion, who matched the late, great Mac Donald Smith in winning this one four times, plans to play in Bing Crosby's big clam-bake at Pebble Beach this weekend.

Lloyd's 72 gave him a 72-hole total of 272, breaking by one stroke the tournament record here set in 1938 by Jimmy Thomson at a comparable Griffith Park Municipal course.

He held a 5-stroke lead over Tommy Bolt and Jerry Barber, beginning the round, and five over Bolt and six over Barber after the first nine.

Barber Gets 70
Barber wound up with a 70 for 275 and Bolt, with two steady but fruitless straight par 71 rounds,

at 276. The one-stroke difference was worth \$1,000. Barber collected \$3,200 second prize, Tommy \$2,300.

The rundown behind the top three: Cary Middlecoff, a 70 for 277 and \$1,800; Dutch Harrison and John Barnum, 73s for 281 and \$1,400 apiece, and Gardiner Dickinson, 71, and Jim Ferrier, 70, for 282 and \$1,050 each.

For Gene Littler, the 1955 winner and all but forgotten man of this one, a 72 for a 1-over-par 285, a tie with Lionel Hebert and \$335 apiece.

CHURCH TEAM WINS

The North Roseburg Church team dropped a 99-84 basketball game to the Eugene E.U.B. team in a free-wheeling contest at the Riverside gym Friday night. Quarter scores favored the winners 27-18, 51-40 and 71-64 as both teams hit better than 50 per cent of their shots from the field.

High scorers were Eugene guard Paul Bryant with 36 and center Richard Minkler with 30. Center Mal Bolen tallied 28 for Roseburg and guard Tommy Blythe scored 18.

The Eugene team is defending Oregon-Washington district YMCA Church leagues champion.

Helfand Hies Rout Of Guild

NEW YORK — With the Boxing Guild of New York in full retreat, Julius Helfand, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, is concentrating his fire on the Monday night fights.

Yesterday he ordered the commission counsel William P. Thomas to prepare charges against promoters Tex Sullivan and Willie Gilzenberg and their London Sporting Club, which runs the televised Monday fights at St. Nicholas Arena, "on the Maryland situation and other matters."

Law Violated?
Last week Helfand said he intended to investigate to see if the St. Nick's promoters violated the law forbidding association with known criminals when they tried to move to Baltimore, effective Jan. 23. The attempted move was nullified by Maryland Gov. McKeldin, who forced his commission to reverse itself.

St. Nick's will be in business at the same old stand for at least one more week, however. A middleweight match between England's John L. Sullivan and New York's Tony Johnson has been approved for Jan. 15. Other matches may be approved, pending a final decision on the investigation, provided the managers sign affidavits they have severed their guild membership.

It was Helfand's Jan. 16 deadline for managers to quit the guild that forced the St. Nick's promoters to try to move to Baltimore when they could make no New York matches. Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, broke the deadlock Friday when he sided with Helfand against the guild.

The guild, groggy and broken in spirit, postponed a meeting scheduled for last night by its board of directors. Instead, a session of the full membership has been set for Wednesday. Although many managers perhaps a majority of the 69 members — will quit the ship, the guild probably will continue to operate, according to a source close to the situation.

Local Junior Archers Hold Lead In State

One new leader, the Eugene Cascadians, forged to the top of the Oregon Indoor Archery League standings with the conclusion of match two and release of results from Secretary Earl L. Ulrich of Roseburg.

The Roseburg junior team retained its lead in the junior standings over the Salem Redwings in a two-team race by scoring 1,630 match two for an over-all total of 3,222.

The Cascadians moved to the head of the men's free style standings from their second place berth of last week. They overtook the Kokeel Archers who now have a 3,562 total to Eugene's 3,535 total.

Leading the men's instinctive standings are the Salem Redwings with a 5,112 total while the women's leader is the Portland Sylvas with a 4,822 total.

Individual leaders are Lois Pin-tarich of the Portland women with a 680 match score and a 673 average, D. Fuller of the Cascadians with a 751 match score and a 751 average in men's free style, D. Terrell of the Sylvas with a 694 average and match score in men's instinctive and Delbert Killingsworth of the Redwings with a 556 average in the junior division.

SC Coach Calls For Action In Stopping Game Incidents

LOS ANGELES — Episodes such as the penny-throwing that brought a forfeit in last Saturday's California-Southern California basketball game at Berkeley demand drastic administration action, says Coach Forrest Twogood of USC.

Unless such administration action is taken in controlling fans, a serious and perhaps "calamitous" incident awaits basketball, he said.

"I think it is an administration problem and a serious one," Twogood told the weekly meeting of basketball writers Monday.

Referee Al Lightner forfeited Saturday's game to Southern California which led, 77-64, with 3 minutes 15 seconds to play. Earlier he had been struck in the eye with a penny and spectators were warned against repetition of the coin throwing. When the tossing continued, Lightner called the game. He said such actions threatened players with injury.

Twogood said, "I'd like to go on record now in saying there was no animosity between the players, and I'd like to exonerate Pete Newell (California coach) from any blame in the incident. If all the rooting sections, including Southern California's, conduct themselves in the same manner as the boys out there playing the game, there will never be any trouble."

Dons Continue At Top Of College Hoop Lead

The San Francisco Dons, who will be seeking their 38th consecutive victory tonight against Santa Clara, still are the nation's best college basketball team. But Dayton isn't far behind.

That's the opinion of the sports writers and broadcasters who participated in this week's Associated Press poll.

Among 118 ballots, the Dons picked up 94 first-place votes and 16 seconds. Dayton drew 12 firsts and 76 seconds.

On the basis of 10 points for first place, 9 for second, etc., San Francisco piled up 1,145 points and Dayton 1,028. Each team is unbeaten in 11 games.

North Carolina State, upended by Duke Saturday night, dropped down a notch to third place with one first and 692 points. Duke's surprise triumph moved it from 11th to 6th.
