She will get a chance to double her money next week when she returns to CBS' The \$64,000 Question, or she may elect to stop with \$32,000. If she misses the next question she will get a Cadillac.

Mrs. Morris was asked to identify where in Dickens' works certain events of his own life were reflected. Without hesitating she gave this information:

A family with which Dickens lived while his father was in Marshalsea Prison was the model for the Garlands in "The Old Curiosity Shop."

Church To Seek Funds For Extension Program

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The Congregational-Christian Church, which has already made one radical departure from its "congregational" principle to carry out a nationwide church extension program, appeared likely today to make a second break and set up a centralized fund-raising system for church-affiliated colleges.

The church is built on completely independent congregations, with no national organization. A group of "home boards" in New York exercises only a sort of clearing house function.

Faced with a financial emergency, the Congregational-Christian College Council, meeting here this week, has appealed to the home boards for support.

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Frozen Foods, Canners Planning Move To Merger

PORTLAND (AP)—The Northwest Frozen Foods Assn. and the Northwest Canners Assn. are going to merge.

The frozen food group has approved consolidation, proposed by the canners last week. The groups include many of the same members and have similar objectives.

The new organization will be called the Northwest Canners and Freezer Assn. It will represent about 65 member firms from Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The companies have a combined annual production of 553 million pounds of packed foods.

A joint directorate will guide the two groups until organization details are settled.

A. R. Hrabka, Dayton, Ore., will be president of the frozen foods group. Other officers: A. E. Symons, Snohomish, Wash., vice president; E. M. Burns, Portland, secretary-treasurer.

New directors are Elton Lasselle, Sherwood, Ore.; Arthur Reiling, Hillsboro, and Clyde Farquhar, Tacoma.

Case Of Leprosy Among U Of W Students Found

SEATTLE (AP)—A case of leprosy among University of Washington students was disclosed Tuesday, but the university and public health authorities made it clear there has been no danger to other students.

The victim was found late in December to have the disease. He is presently being treated at the Public Health Service Hospital here.

The university said the 23-year-old unmarried student was not a native of the state, but would make no further identification. He had been living in an apartment off the campus.

In reassuring parents of other students, Dr. Richard Handschin, acting director of the Division of Communicable diseases of the Seattle-King County Health Department, said:

"Contrary to common belief, leprosy is one of the least contagious of all infectious diseases. It is contracted only through intimate per-

sonal contact over a long period of time. No conceivable contact here would produce other cases."

The ill student is believed to have contracted leprosy while living abroad.

Bank President Sees Warnings

PORTLAND (AP)—C. B. Stephenson, president of the First National Bank of Portland, told the Chamber of Commerce in his annual business forecast talk that some warning signs are appearing.

"A prudent person," he said, "should keep an eye out for unexpected danger in the economic weather."

Business likely will be good in 1956, he said, although possibly not as good as last year. Tightened housing credit, cut-back plans of automobile manufacturers and farm prices he saw as warning signs.

Consumer buying will pull the country through any rough spots, he predicted, adding that reliance

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Series Of Earthquakes Rattles England Area

LEICESTER, England (AP)—A series of minor earthquakes rocked houses and buildings over a 20-mile area of the English Midlands Tuesday.

Alarmed inhabitants telephoned police as their houses swayed for 10 to 15 seconds at 12:15 a. m. PST. Low rumbling accompanied the tremors.

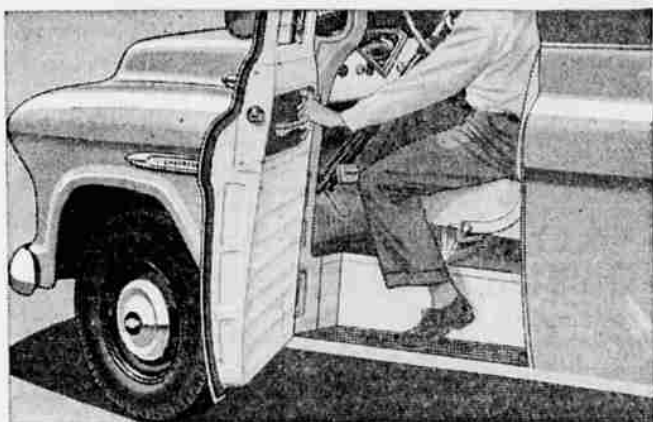
Seismographs 100 miles away in London picked up the quakes, which were still being felt three hours later.

No damage was reported. Scientists reported that a bigger earthquake "in the Pacific or even farther away" was responsible for the English disturbance.

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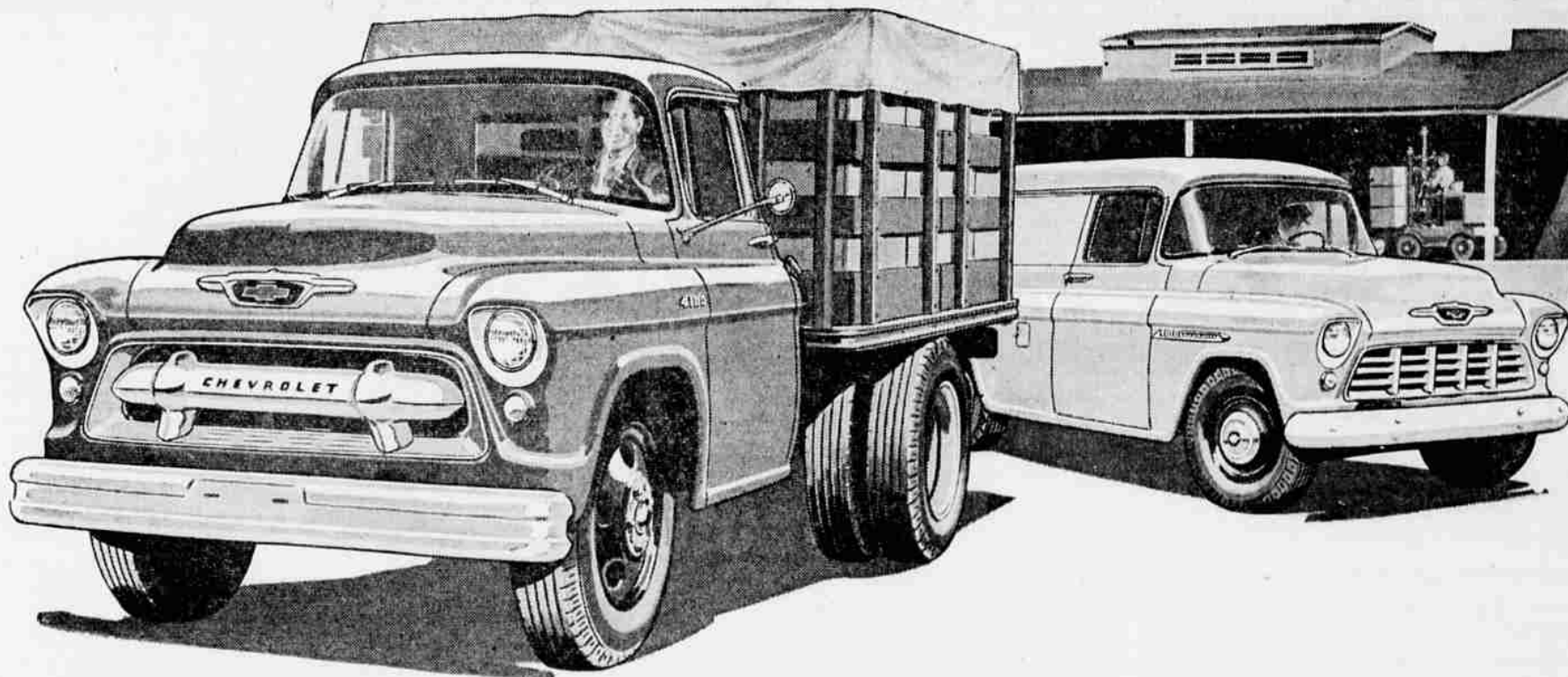
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
