

Man Out Of Jail 8 Hours Returned; Faces New Charge

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—A 23-year-old carpenter, out of jail just eight hours, was back in again Thursday while Deputy Dist. Atty. Robert Hansen, 494 W. Elizabeth, added a kidnapping charge to one of car theft.

Sheriff's Deputy Alvie Youngblood said a car containing, in its rear seat, Gary Duane Frost, 3,

and Curtis Lynn Frost, 4, was stolen from in front of a Beatty pool hall Wednesday.

Their father, James Russell Frost of Beatty, reported the car's disappearance and Youngblood said he located it at a house in Sprague River.

Youngblood said James Harold Rosenberg, who had just completed a seven-month term for destruction of property, was in the house and the children were asleep in a bedroom.

Just as he was about to arrest Rosenberg, Youngblood said, a dozen armed and angry friends of the Frost family arrived. Youngblood said he whisked Rosenberg off to jail. He said he doubted if

Rosenberger knew the children were in the car.

Elena Nikolaidi, Greek Contralto, To Sing Here

SEOUL (AP)—The death toll in a fire aboard a Korean passenger ship rose to 71 Friday in the latest National Police count.

The victims included 42 men, 22 women and 7 children.

Fire swept through the 130-ton coastal passenger ship Taishin-Ho Thursday after cabin boy Park Chong Chul, 29, dropped a kerosene lamp on straw mats.

Park and the shipmaster, Capt. Kim Han Suk, were held on suspicion of negligence.

Ingenuity Saved Property, Lives At Canyonville

Ingenuity saved property and possibly some lives at a Canyonville trailer camp during the recent heavy snowstorm.

Fred A. Mensing, a resident at the camp and an employee at the Hanna nickel smelter near Riddle, reports that the camp encountered much difficulty Friday evening when power failure cut off lights and communication.

While he was endeavoring to obtain information by means of his car radio at about 8 p.m., a neighboring trailerite shouted a warning that a tree was beginning to fall toward the automobile. The tree was bending under its weight of snow and was moving slowly, giving Mensing time to drive his car out of danger just seconds before the tree crashed. Another falling tree caused minor damage to one trailer house, while nearly all in the camp were threatened.

On resident suddenly propounded a unique idea.

The men dashed to their trailers and brought out rifles and shotguns. They began bombarding branches of trees in danger of collapsing upon the camp. Within a few minutes the trees had been freed from their burdens of snow and were no longer a threat. All around the camp, however, the ground was strewn with fallen trees and debris.

APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE FOR YEAR 1956
Deadline March 1st

SECTION 32-2414, O.C.L.A.—Every person owning or keeping any dog over the age of eight (8) months within the State of Oregon shall, not later than March 1st of each year or within thirty (30) days after he becomes owner or keeper of such dog, procure from the clerk of the county in which said person resides a license for such dog by paying said license fee and provided further, that if said person fails to procure such license within the time as herein provided, the County Court may prescribe a penalty in an additional sum not to exceed \$2.00 for each dog. Such license fee shall be the only license or tax required for the ownership or keeping of a dog within this state, and no city or town or municipal subdivision thereof shall impose any further license fee for dogs. Provided, however, that cities of one hundred thousand (100,000) or more population may prescribe and impose a license fee which shall be in lieu of the license fee herein required. The County Assessor and his deputies forthwith shall report to the Sheriff all dogs that they shall find that are not licensed as herein provided, together with the owner or keeper thereof.

LICENSE FEES — Male \$2.00; Female \$3.00; Spayed Female \$2.00, if licensed before March 1st of each year. If licensed after March 1st, add a penalty of \$1.00 and after June 1st, a penalty of \$2.00 to each license fee when paying or remitting for a dog license, except a dog just purchased or reaching the age of eight months, the license then being due within 30 days.
