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Missing Airplane Found On Vancouver Island
 PORT ALBERNI, B.C. — A Pacific Western Airlines plane that vanished Tuesday with four men aboard was found on Vancouver Island Wednesday.
 The pilot and his three passengers are all alive, the Royal Canadian Air Force reported.
 The pilot was Capt. J. Lightbown of Vancouver. His passengers were Bill Craig and C. Rowland of Vancouver and Gene Olson of Seattle.
 The plane was on a flight from Port Alberni to Gold River, 130 miles up the island.
 An RCAF officer said the plane was sighted upside down. Another plane of the airline was sent to pick up the four men.
 The plane was sighted while a concerted air, sea and ground search was being pressed in unfavorable weather.

Three Men Captured At Police Roadblock
 JUNCTION CITY — A police roadblock here Tuesday night resulted in the capture of three men accused by police of attempting to break open a safe in Albany.
 Scheduled for arraignment in Albany Wednesday on burglary charges are Thomas E. Culver, 23, and Stanley Compton, 21, both of Junction City, and Earl Bonney Jr., of Salem.
 Albany police said a merchant patrolman surprised three men in the act of trying to peel a safe in the Medical Building about 10:30 p.m. They ran to the rear of the building, smashed a window, and made their escape.
 Later Harrisburg police spotted a car speeding through town and gave chase. They radioed ahead to Junction City and a roadblock was thrown up by police of that city. The three men in the car were captured and returned to the Linn County jail in Albany.

Rep. Engle Says Court Decision Threat To Water

WASHINGTON — Rep. Engle (D-Calif.) said Thursday a recent Supreme Court decision involving Oregon threatens the traditional water rights of the 15 Western reclamation states.
 Because of this, he said in a statement, he has introduced a bill to clarify and reaffirm these rights.
 "Traditionally," he said, "the federal government in the 17 Western states has acquired and held its water rights under state law as a proprietor, just the same as any other land owner."
 "Under the decision in the Oregon case, whenever the federal government reserves a portion of the public domain for a military installation, or any other specific purpose, the use of water on the reserved area would be independent of state law."
 "If this decision is applied retroactively, it could cut off private water rights which have been in use for half a century or more."
 "Pointing out that the government owns large areas of the West, Engle added:
 "The complexity and disastrous impact of this decision in such circumstances can be easily seen and it is therefore imperative that the decision be reversed by act of Congress."

Law Firm Files Suit Against Naming Justices

SALEM — A Portland law firm filed suit in the state Supreme Court Wednesday contending that the high court has no power to appoint circuit judges as temporary Supreme Court justices.
 In the past few days, the Supreme Court has so promoted three circuit judges to the high bench to serve temporarily. They are James W. Crawford, Portland; Ralph M. Holman, Oregon City; and Dal M. King, Coquille.
 Maguire, Shields, Morrison and Bailey, the Portland lawyers, argue that the 1955 law, under which the appointments are authorized, is unconstitutional.
 The firm points out that the Constitution says that supreme justices must be elected by the people, or appointed by the governor when vacancies occur.
 This provision, the Portland lawyers contend, means that the Legislature can't provide any other method for placing judges on the supreme bench.
 The Portland firm is interested in a case in which Judge Crawford is to sit on Thursday.

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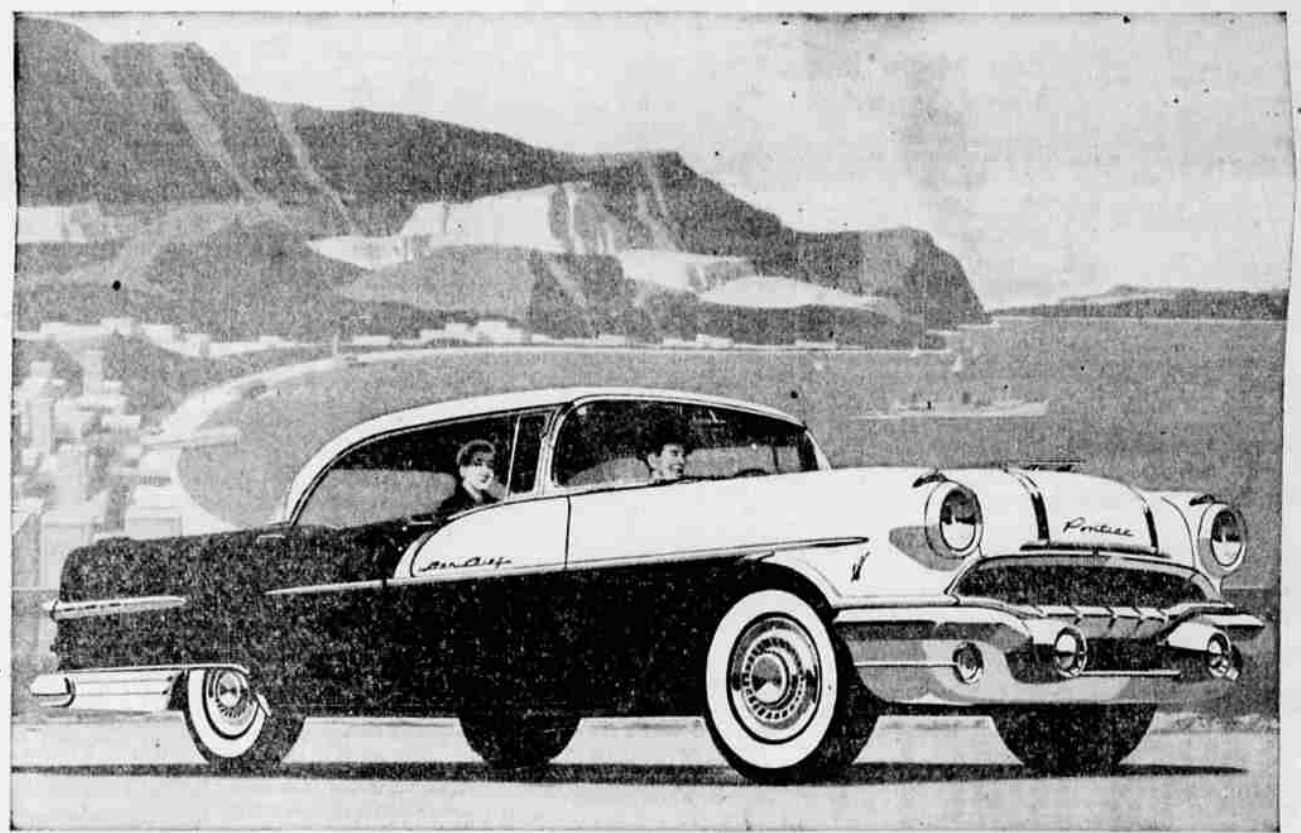
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
