Sutherland's 51-42 conquest of Roseburg was good for the Bulldogs and not quite as harmful for the Indians as some might attest. The win was good for Sutherland morale after a losing streak extending back over 19 years or maybe longer. In talking to Sutherland Principal Troy Thompson, the best information available on Sutherland's last basketball win over Roseburg was that it hadn't happened in the last 10 years. Thompson inquired of some of the veteran teachers around the school.

WE CHECKED a couple places, but this was the most definite date made available. A definite answer from either Sutherland or Roseburg followers would be appreciated. The Oregonian sports pages called it eight years in its game story of Thursday.

While Sutherland got a boost out of it all, the success actually helps the all-over county basketball picture as well. Sutherland and Roseburg schools should be able to compete on respectable point differences in the sport.

ROSEBURG obviously was rusty from a three-week layoff due to postponements. The Bulldogs were up against almost the same situation—they were the better team Tuesday night.

Coach Dick Yurk probably has one of the better players ever to grace a county court basketball court in Carl Bay. The 6-1 senior now has totaled 174 points in eight games for a 21.8 average. While the big men of Bulldogs, outside of Bay, do little scoring, their strong backboard work Tuesday night proved decisive over Roseburg.

WHILE TAKING away nothing from Sutherland's win, Coach Bill Harper of the Indians called the Roseburg performance "terrible." "I don't think we'll have that had a night again," asserted Harper. "If we do we'll get beat bad." Dons To Try For 39th Win Tonight, Friday The 13th

The all-conquering San Francisco Dons, who in little more than a year have bounced out of obscurity to become the top team in major college basketball, shoot for a record-equalling 39th consecutive victory tonight—Friday the 13th.

The Dons play Fresno State, and it doesn't figure to be a Black Friday for Coach Phil Woolpert's powerhouse.

Two seasons ago, San Francisco was classified as a small college, missing out in a bid for the NIAI season-end tournament. Last season, the Dons erupted, rolling to the NCAA championship against the big boys.

With a 12-0 season record and 38 straight over-all, the Dons are on the threshold of tying the all-time major college mark set by Long Island University in 1937 and matched by Seton Hall in 1939-41.

If the Dons, paced by All American Bill Russell and Casey Jones, pack away No. 29 as expected tonight, they'll have a two-week layoff before trying for a record in their next game Jan. 28 against California.

While the Dons were idle last night, North Carolina State, third ranked in the nation, regained some lost prestige by beating Maryland 73-64. The Wolfpack, which dropped from second to third in The Associated Press poll when Duke snapped its winning

USC, OSC Slated For Two Contests

A meeting of two of the nation's top defensive teams, Southern California and Oregon State, headlines Pacific Coast Conference basketball action this weekend, the second of the 1956 schedule.

The NCAA Service Bureau listed Southern California as the nation's No. 9 team, defensively, in its statistical report for this week, and Oregon State was No. 10.

In 11 games, the bureau reported, the Trojans have allowed an average of 58.3 points per contest. Oregon State, allowed 58.4 in 12.

The Trojans and the Beavers will play Friday night and Saturday at Los Angeles. The Saturday game will be televised on the West Coast.

The PCC schedule also sends undefeated UCLA to Pullman for a pair with Washington State; Idaho to Palo Alto to play Stanford, and California to Eugene to meet Oregon. Washington has the weekend off.

UCLA beat a young Idaho team last weekend, while other clubs picked up a win and a loss apiece, and current leads the conference. Oregon will be making its first conference appearance against the Golden Bears. The Webfoots edged Washington in overtime in a non-conference game last Tuesday and have a 6-4 season record.
