# Pre Bowl Grid Test Slated At Coliseum

LOS ANGELES — The sixth annual pro bowl football game comes off tomorrow in Memorial Coliseum with the finest professionals in the world colliding in the all-star staged engagement. More than 40,000 fans are expected to see the long grid season end.

It's the East against the West in the divisional battle and the West is a slight favorite to make the count 4-2 since the series was inaugurated in 1957.

Coach Sid Gillman of the Los Angeles Rams, coaching the West, and big Joe Kuharich of the Washington Redskins, tutor for the East, have an abundant supply of material.

Kuharich will lead off on offense with Adrian Burk Philadelphia at the quarterback helm, flanked by halfbacks Frank Gifford of the New York Giants and Ray Mathews, Pittsburgh, and fullback Curly Morris of the Cleveland Browns.

Gillman's ace, Han quarterback Norman Van Brocklin, probably will have his teammate, rookie Ron Walker, at one half, Rick Casares of the Chicago Bears at the other half, with Rookie Alan Ameche of Baltimore at fullback.

It makes little difference who starts the game. Gillman has such other stars as Howie Ferguson, Don Walker, Dick Moegele and Tank Younger for offensive backfield duty; Bill Howton and John Hoffman to back up Harlon Hill and Billy Wilson at end.

Kuharich has backs Ollie Matson, Johnny Kiszewski, Scooter Scudder and Kyle Rote; the latter also available for end, regular ends Pete Pihos and Darrell Brewster.

The players on the winning team collect \$700 apiece, the losers \$500.

The East squad lists seven players from the champion Cleveland Browns and Washington Redskins; five from Pittsburgh, and four from Philadelphia, Chicago Cardinals and New York.

The West squad: Los Angeles and the Bears seven apiece; Baltimore, Green Bay and Detroit five; and San Francisco, three.

# Oregon Edges Cal, 63-62; OSC Beaten

Larry Beck of Washington State and the University of Oregon furnished two bright spots in an otherwise dull picture for the north in the Pacific Coast Conference basketball race Friday night.

Beck punished the hoop for 34 points to equal Washington State's one-man, one-game scoring record but his efforts went for naught as the Cougars dropped an 88-72 decision to UCLA at Pullman.

Oregon was the only northern winner of the night, registering a paper thin 63-62 victory over the California Golden Bears. In the other conference games played, Idaho was swamped by Stanford, 77-69, and Southern California bounced Oregon State's defending champions, 58-47.

Washington drew a bye this weekend.

Washington State gave the taller Bruins a tussle of it for the better part of the first half but the Bruins' height started to pay off with five minutes remaining in the period and they scrambled to a 43-34 intermission lead.

Morris Taft, with 27 points, and Willie Naulls, with 22, was the double-barreled shotgun the Bruins aimed with deadly efficiency at the Cougars.

It was the third straight PCC victory for the Bruins.

At Palo Alto, the Indians led on sharp-shooting. Bill Bond to sink Idaho and win their second victory in three conference starts. Bond got 25 points.

The Vandals fought Stanford to a virtual draw in the first half, which ended at 27-22 Stanford, but the smaller and faster Indians ran away with the game in the second half.

With seven minutes to go and a 65-50 lead, Stanford Coach Howard Dallmar started hoisting the victory flag and sent in his reserves to complete the scalping job. His first-string Indians had started on Idaho.

It was the first conference game of the season for the Oregon Ducks and they had to come from behind with 3 and one half minutes remaining to take it.

Trailing 59-57, Oregon tied it up on two free throws by Max Anderson. Phil McHugh added two more charity tosses for the Ducks and then connected with a layin to give Oregon a 63-59 lead.

Duane Asplund almost pulled the game out of the fire for the Bears. He tipped in a field goal and made the free throw and the score went to 63-62 Oregon.

The Ducks tried to freeze the ball with nine seconds remaining in the game but Asplund was fouled in the process. California lost the game when both of Asplund's free throw attempts missed.

Earl Robinson of Cal topped the scorers with 27 points.

Southern California found the early going easy against the OSC Beavers and left the floor at the half in possession of a 32-25 lead.

Oregon State threatened at the start of the second half and trimmed the Trojan lead. The Trojans regained their composure in the final stages of the game, however, and were in complete command at the final buzzer.

Southern California's Jack Lovrich was the game's high scorer with 19 points.

Saturday's schedule calls for the same pairing, with all but the Southern Cal-Oregon State game night affairs. The latter will be an afternoon, televised affair.

# Dons Tie All-Time Record

The Dons did it. And they did it big.

Top-ranked San Francisco, the best college team in a long, long time, breezed past Fresno State 69-50 last night to match the all-time major college consecutive victory record of 39 games.

Now the Dons have a two-week vacation before making a bid against California Jan. 28 To become the winningest team ever.

Long Island University set the record 39 years ago, rolling along unbeaten from the 1935 season until knocked off by Stanford two years later. Seton Hall is the only other major club to win 39 in a row. The Pirates did it in 1939-41 with LIU finally stopping them.

All-America Bill Russell, the Dons' 6-10 ace, topped the scoring against Fresno State with 22 points, showing little effects of a cold that put him in bed Thursday. Russell also cleared 17 rebounds although playing less than half the game as

Coach Phil Woolpert substituted freely and used his entire 15-man traveling squad.

Elsewhere, it was a night of upsets, big scares and heavy use of the controversial zone defense.

North Carolina, ranked No. 9 got 30 points from Lennie Rosenbluth and needed 'em all after blowing a 16-point halftime lead to outlast South Carolina 75-73 and gain a share of the Atlantic Coast Conference lead with Duke.

Virginia Tech, a real sleeper with a 5-5 mark, upended 14th-ranked George Washington 63-61 as Bill Matthews hit 21 points and tapped in a closing-second field goal. Tech hit an amazing 60 per cent of its field shots, but trailed in field goals 24-23.

West Virginia, despite Hot Rod Hundley's 28 points, just did get past Penn State 81-79.

In the Ivy League, Harvard stunned Penn 86-78 as the Cent. canceled 26 points and Phil Houghby 25 to outshoot the 31 Jon Sturges hit for Penn.

La Salle, using a second half zone, rallied to defeat Syracuse 71-61 and little St. Joseph's, Pa. upset Manhattan 73-74 in the other half of the Philadelphia twinbill as Kurt Engelbert hit a field goal with 17 seconds remaining in the second overtime period.

Texas A&M, mixing speed with a zone defense, held off Texas 75-74 in a Southwest Conference game while Arkansas employed a zone to defeat Rice 84-70.

Heavily favored Colgate needed Milt Graham's one-handed shot from the corner at the final buzzer to beat Buffalo 66-65 after trailing by five with 60 seconds remaining.

Florida defeated Miami (Fla) 87-85 on two free throws and a field goal by Capt. Ted Copeland in the last 42 seconds. And Florida State, down 13 points, rode behind Jimmy Oler's 28 points to beat Georgia 79-76.

# Doctors Back Up State Proposals

The Douglas County Medical Society went on record at its January meeting supporting the recommendations of the State Board of Education in regard to grade school athletics, it was announced.

According to Dr. Donald M. Jepsen, secretary for the Society, the group discussed the state board's recommendations but took no stand on either condemning or condoning tackle football in the lower grades—a point which has been the greatest source of discussion in the principles.

Though the tackle football issue did not prove controversial, an oft-indicated point difference between state and local rulings does exist in regard to physical examinations.

While the local school district doesn't require examination in every situation for athletic participants, the state board's rulings do require a physical exam for every participant and a record of such. In addition, the state board rules require an examination immediately after an illness to determine the participant's fitness to take part.

The Society did not take a stand in ruling the local situation too arduous in regard to either the tackle football situation or the physical examination question. The Society "merely took a favorable stand on the state board's report of 27 principles," according to Dr. Jepsen.
