

Wholesale Food Prices Drop Slightly Lower

NEW YORK — Wholesale food prices, as measured by the Dun & Bradstreet food index, were a shade lower last week. At \$5.92, the index compared with \$5.95 last week and was down 15.1 per cent from the year ago week's \$6.91. It was the lowest the index has reached since May 23, 1950, when it was \$5.90. The index represents the total cost at wholesale of one pound each of 31 foods in general use. Higher this week were flour, corn, oats, beef, hams, sugar, coffee and steers. Lower were wheat, rye, bellies, lard, butter, cocoa, beans, peas, eggs and lamb.

Izvestia Assails Dulles' Statement

MOSCOW — Izvestia assailed Secretary of State Dulles Saturday for his life magazine interview. The Soviet government newspaper in an editorial by N. Novikov also scored President Eisenhower's state of the Union message.

The Izvestia editorial said: "The peculiar theory of American Secretary of State Dulles on constantly keeping international tension 'on the verge of war' which was expounded in the magazine Life cannot be regarded as other than open encouragement of bellicose statements by American generals and admirals."

On Eisenhower Novikov wrote: "The warmongering tone of pronouncement of American military leaders was struck by the President's message to Congress. A Communist paper in Vienna, Volksstimme, took an even stronger line of assault on the Dulles interview. It said it was a 'virtual refutation of claims the United States would never touch off an atomic war.'"

The paper declared the Life interview demonstrates that "the danger of an atomic war can only be averted by knocking nuclear weapons from the hands of atom diplomats."

Caribou Showing Up In Alaska

JUNEAU, Alaska — Large herds of migrating caribou are showing up in Alaskan areas where they haven't been seen for decades, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service reported Saturday. One immense herd moved through the Noatak and Kobuk River valleys in November and December. Harry Brown, game commissioner in the Kotzebue area on the coast north of the Arctic Circle, said the hills north of Kobuk Village were "black with caribou."

Wildlife Administrator Clarence Rhode said the caribou probably have increased in numbers in recent years. He said hunting pressure and predators may account for the return of the northland's "reindeer" to old ranges, but precise data will not be available until surveys can be made in April.

"Then we will have a fairly accurate picture and be able to determine if there has been substantial increase in population," he said, "or if the caribou simply have moved to new range."
