

Portland Youth Found Dead On Rugged Mountain

PORTLAND — Jimmy Son-nenburgh, 14, Portland, was found dead on rugged, snow-covered Larch Mountain east of here Monday.

He and a companion, Lyle Block, also 14, had been the object of a search since they were reported missing on an outing Sunday.

Searchers expressed belief after the discovery that panic cost Jimmy his life.

Young Block walked out of the woods to get help after his friends said he could not go any farther.

The Block boys said they had wandered through the country for hours following the Columbia River in the hope of reaching shelter.

Block said he told Jimmy he would return after getting help. But rescuers said the trail in the area indicated the boy got panicky and continued to walk.

It all started when the two boys and Lyle's brother, Edward, 17, went out to hunt rabbits. Edward said he left the two for a short time and that they had disappeared when he returned.

Lyle said he left for aid when Jimmy got sick and couldn't walk any longer. He said he heard his companion crying in panic as he left.

Lyle, himself, had severe foot and hand frostbites when searchers found him. He could barely walk.

Locks But Not Rectors Changed In Church Feud

NEW YORK — A Brooklyn church feud, centering on efforts to install a new rector, has brought no change in rectors but there have been two changes of locks on the church doors.

Vestrymen who voted last week to oust the acting rector of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Holy Trinity had the locks on the doors changed to keep him from entering the church to conduct services last Sunday.

The Rev. William Howard Melish got into the building anyway after his supporters forced one of the doors. He and a nominee of Bishop James P. DeWolfe conducted rival services.

Monday it was the Rev. Mr. Melish's turn to change locks. He said he had several basic locks to the church replaced to protect the property. The building had been unlocked all Sunday night, he said.

The vote to discontinue the Rev. Mr. Melish's services as acting rector of the church came after he had held the post for nearly seven years. He was named to the job after his father was removed as rector in 1949 for failing to stop the alleged left-wing activities of the son, who was then assistant minister.

The bishop refused to approve the Rev. Mr. Melish's nomination as rector and he has remained in an acting capacity.

Oregon's School Funds Share Put At \$2,323,000

WASHINGTON — Three Pacific Northwest states and Alaska stand to receive a total of nearly 15 million dollars in combined federal-state funds under the school construction program outlined by President Eisenhower in his budget message Monday.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare said Washington would receive \$3,239,000 in federal funds and would have to put up \$4,364,000 in matching state funds.

Oregon's allocation would be \$2,323,000 from the federal government, and \$2,678,000 from the state. The figures for Idaho are \$1,405,000 and \$209,000, respectively, and for Alaska, \$358,000 and \$338,000.

Impressive Record Of Atomic-Powered Submarine Revealed

GROTON, Conn. — Sharply at 11 a.m. a year ago today a big submarine slid from a dock on the Thames River and kicked up a wake.

Two minutes later, the signalman on her deck flashed out a message to a submarine rescue vessel off her starboard.

"Underway on nuclear power." The world's first atomic-powered

submarine, the Nautilus, worked in the year since she pushed down the Thames and into Long Island Sound on her maiden voyage the Nautilus has built up an impressive record.

Part of that record was released by the Navy yesterday.

The Nautilus has averaged a

dive a day in her first year of operations. She also has traveled 26,221.2 nautical miles on 79 cruises without refueling.

Visited six ports from Portsmouth, N.H., to St. Thomas in the Virgin Islands.

Sailed for 8 days and 14 hours without stopping.

Traveled underwater for 3 days, 17 hours and 14 minutes.

Made a 1,300-mile voyage from here to San Juan, Puerto Rico, totally submerged at an average speed of more than 15 knots.

Prisoner's Jail Break Aided By Girl, Charge

BAKER — Larry Smith, 22, in jail charged with stealing gasoline for a car and then taking several minors on a tide in which beer was consumed, vanished from his cell some time Saturday night.

At about the same time his 17-year-old wife left a basketball game. And at about the same time a car was stolen.

Sheriff Lloyd Cook, reporting this, said Monday that to balance, he had some hacksaw blades and a 15-year-old girl who said she smuggled them to Smith.

Smith and two others were charged recently with the gasoline theft and with contributing to the delinquency of minors because of the drinking.

The sheriff said the 15-year-old girl—he would not name her—admitted on questioning that she provided the saw blades that Smith used in fleeing. There was no indication whether she was one of the girls involved in the beer-ride episode.

The jail from which Smith escaped has frequently been criticized as insecure.

Primary Vote Closely Watched In Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS — All five Democratic candidates for governor predicted victory today as Louisiana held the nation's first state primary of the presidential year.

Republicans, numbering less than 4,000 among the more than one million registered voters, scraped the rust off their primary election machinery, idle since Reconstruction, by offering two candidates for lieutenant governor and several for the Legislature.

But they don't have the ghost of a chance. The exercise is designed to strengthen the two-party system in a normally one-party state. Democratic nomination is tantamount to election.

With no presidential choice on the ballot, party leaders watched to see whether Eisenhower-backed Gov. Robert Kennon keeps control of the state Democratic party in the wake of the U.S. Supreme Court's segregation decision.

The five candidates for governor were pledged to uphold segregation in this state where whites outnumber Negroes 2-1, but the issue loomed large in the closing weeks of the campaign.

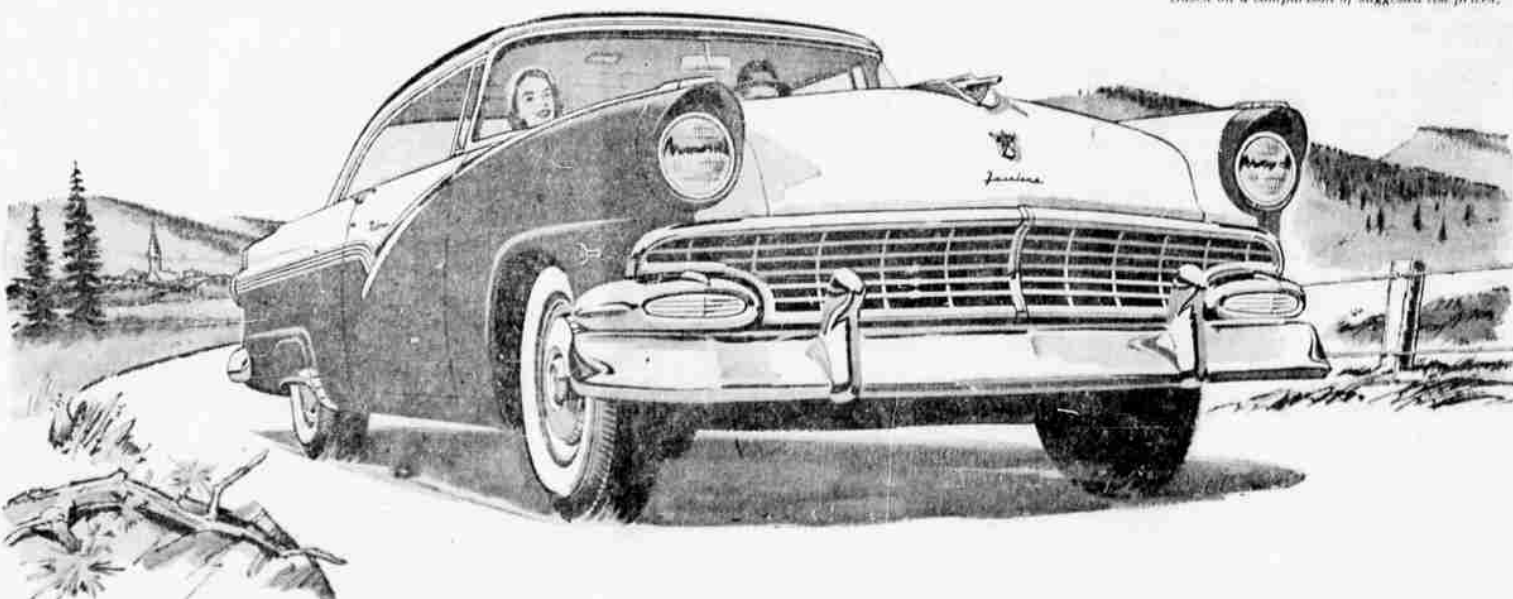
