The actor was promptly served with a contempt citation in a child support case. Ex-wife Nora Eddington claims he is \$4,325 in arrears. The citation directs Flynn to appear Jan. 27 in Santa Monica Superior Court.

But despite his financial troubles, Flynn took Miss Eddington to dinner and visited with their two children, Deirdre, 11, and Rory, 9. Miss Eddington married and divorced crooner Dick Haymes after divorcing Flynn in 1949. Flynn is currently married to Patrice Wymore.

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Byrd Welcomes Russians To Antarctic Continent

ABOARD USS WYANDOT, McMurdo Sound, Antarctica — Rear Adm. Richard E. Byrd has welcomed the Russians to the antarctic's Wilkes Land with a subtle reminder that the Americans got to much of it first.

The director of U.S. antarctic programs disclosed he had sent a message to Dr. M. M. Samov, leader of the Soviet expedition aboard the ship Oborot which reportedly reached the Knox Coast Jan. 8.

Byrd's message was a courteous gesture. But it was also clear that the Russians were being told American fliers of Operation Deepfreeze already had flown over the area assigned to the Soviets under the International Geophysical Year's program of scientific observation.

This could be significant when and if the United States lays claims to the large slices of the antarctic it has explored in recent weeks. Thus far the U.S. government says it has made no claims—and recognizes none.

"I welcome you to Wilkes Land," the message said. "Hope you are having good luck finding your IGY base site. We recently flew over interior in vicinity of your planned inland bases. Surface does not appear rough but glacial plateau ranges between 11,000 and 13,000 feet elevation. We would like to exchange weather information."

U.S. Navy fliers flew four missions deep into the unexplored area where the Russians are scheduled to set up their bases. One of these flights, on Jan. 5, went all the way to the Knox Coast.

Operation Deepfreeze closed the book on its program of long flights for this season with three weekend missions deep into the interior of the continent. The expedition's four long-range planes—two twin-engine Neptunes and two four-engine Sky-masters—will fly Wednesday to New Zealand en route home.

One of the weekend flights was the longest ever made here, Cmdr. William "Trigger" Hawkins, of Chevy Chase, Md., piloted a Neptune all the way across the continent to the Weddell Sea and back. The round trip of 3,450 miles took 19 hours.

At Little America No. 5 a small tractor party led by Lt. Cmdr. Jack J. Bursey of Grand Rapids, Mich., began a 500-mile journey deep into Byrd land, where a U.S. base will be set up next year.

Four of the 17 buildings to be erected at Little America are already up and being used. Eighty per cent of the total cargo for the base now has been unloaded.

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"Whirlybird" helps string a telephone line. More and more uses are being found for helicopters in the telephone business. Not long ago, one was used to help a telephone crew string over two miles of wire across several steep canyons loaded with brush and poison oak. After poles were put up on the hill tops, the "copter laid a rope across the poles' cross-arms. Then the wire was fastened to the rope and the crew pulled it into position from pole to pole. In this way, a job that would have taken a week was done in an hour and a half. Corner-cutters like this do a lot, of course, to speed up the expansion of your telephone system.
