Equipment Arrived Delay Stalls Date For TV Opening

An unexpected delay in arrival of transmission lines has made it impossible for KPIC-TV personnel to set an exact time for the start of actual programming from their Rose Mountain tower.

Engineering Director Al Barnard Tuesday said the station would not be in operation earlier than Feb. 1 nor later than Feb. 15, but he was unable to give a definite date. According to S. W. McCready, general manager of KVAL-TV who is supervising the Roseburg operation, the missing transmission lines are the last pieces of equipment which "can give us any trouble."

Despite the delay, work on the station is going very well, McCready added. The tower building is completed and the equipment has been moved in. Its installation is a permanent nature, McCready added. Right now, crews are putting the antenna together.

The television station will make its downtown office in the Carter Building on Main Street, next door to the News-Review. Studio personnel will be moving in next week, according to resident manager of KPIC-TV Gene Pierce.

This newspaper will publish a special TV section Jan. 31.

Burglars Take Tools, Money In Five Thefts

Tools and money were the loot in five burglaries which occurred Sunday and Monday in central Douglas County. The Sheriff's Dept. and state police are investigating.

About \$500 worth of tools, oil and electric cords were stolen from the Hamilton and Thompson Construction Co. at Ford's Camp near Canyonville Monday night, according to Sheriff Ira C. Byrd.

The locks were removed from several buildings at the bridge construction site of the company.

State police reported about \$75 worth of small tools were stolen from the Flury Logging Supply Co., Newton Creek Road and Stephens Street, the same night.

About \$1.60 in dimes from a soft-drink machine also was missing.

Burglar William Co. Construction, four acetylene welding tips, a 2-pound roll of copper wire and a pair of welding goggles were taken Monday night, a deputy sheriff said.

Two homes were among the targets of the burglars. A burglar bank containing about \$13 was taken from Don Hinch home near Camas Valley. A box of 22-gauge and candy were stolen, probably by juveniles, from the Ross Lovelace home at Dixonville. Both house entries are being investigated by the Sheriff's Dept.

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'Short Route' Plan Opposed In Petitions

Completion Of Existing Road East Of Wilbur Asked By Protesters

A move against construction of the so-called "short route" between Sutherland and Glendale has been started in Douglas County through the circulation of about 50 petitions.

The petitions, which are being passed around in the Roseburg, Glendale and Sutherland - Oakland districts, call for using available county road funds for "existing county roads rather than construction of new roads such as the short route."

They also advise the Douglas County Court, to which they are addressed, that if funds are available, existing construction east of Wilbur should be finished.

The county road there was started a few years ago, but never completed. It runs about 12 miles east of Wilbur along the north bank of the North Umpqua River. Cost was in the neighborhood of \$300,000, it is understood.

Purpose of the road originally was to connect Glendale with a river crossing west of Glendale to carry the road onto the south side of the river.

The petition urges completion of the road for "utilization of a substantial investment already made."

It's understood that in the neighborhood of 50 petitions — enough for between 2,000 and 3,000 signatures — are being circulated.

The County Court now is comparing two proposed "short routes."

Robert L. Johnson Promoted To Director

SALEM, Ore. — Robert L. Johnson, 37, Oregon's first civil service director and now secretary of the Legislative Commission on Reorganization of Government, was appointed by Gov. Paul Patterson Wednesday as state director of finance and administration.

Johnson will succeed Harry S. Dorman, who is retiring on March 1.

Johnson did the survey work for setting up Oregon's civil service system in 1946, and then stayed on as the first civil service director. He took a leave of absence from that job to work for the Legislature's Commission on Reorganization of the State Government.

That reorganization commission set up the State Department of Finance and Administration, which took over all of the state's budget, purchasing, printing, and office management functions.

In 1951, Johnson went to Greece as civil government adviser to the Greek government. He returned to Oregon last year to join the Legislature.

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Petty Larceny Added To Charge Of Theft

A man being held on a charge of threatening commission of a felony pleaded guilty to an additional crime in justice court, Canyonville, and was fined \$50 and costs.

Lester Leroy Seiber, 40, Myrtle Creek, admitted stealing a rifle which he accused of holding on his daughter, Mrs. Roberta Peterson, last week.

Seiber still is to be arraigned in circuit court on the felony count. He made \$500 a week by a deputy sheriff who said the incident arose from a family problem.

The accused man is being held in the county jail in lieu of \$5,000 bail.

U. S. Pushing Construction Of Electronic Brain-Memory To Meet Potential Threat

LEXINGTON, Mass. — The United States is pushing the building of electronic brain-memory centers to meet the present threat of potential enemy bombers and the future menace of long-range missiles.

Under test at the Lincoln Laboratory here is the prototype of an eventual chain of such units — in which computing machines, radar warning systems and communications networks will provide, automatically and almost instantly, information needed for waging air battles.

Officials of the laboratory, run by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, said work on other centers will be carried on, even though operation of the first unit still is in test stage. They told visiting reporters the "critical nature" of defense needs required immediate start on other installations.

The laboratory, under contract with the Air Force, has developed

Michael Dunstan Suffers Injuries When Hit By Car

A 12-year-old Central Junior High School student, Michael Dunstan, was reported in satisfactory condition at Community Hospital today, despite painful injuries received when struck by a car.

The boy's bicycle collided with a car on Douglas near Rose Street shortly after 8 a.m. as the youth headed for school.

He has fractures of the left hand and right wrist, a deep laceration on the left leg, a broken tooth and bruises, including a bump on the head. He was not knocked unconscious, however.

Roseburg police did not cite driver Robert B. Barrow, 24, of 301 Emerald Lane. Officers said Barrow was headed east on Douglas as the Dunstan boy headed west.

The boy apparently turned quickly in front of Barrow about 20 feet east of the intersection, intending to head up Rose Street, to his school. Two witnesses verified that such was the case, officers said.

The boy was bounced on top of the car hood, then rolled off to the pavement. The front of the bike was crumpled; the car's left headlight and hood were damaged.

Michael is the son of Edna H. Dunstan. Mrs. Dunstan, who went to the hospital as soon as she was notified, and driver Barrow appeared shocked more than Mike seemed to be. His main worry at the moment: He might not be able to play football next season.

Interim Group Hears Reports Tuesday Night

If Douglas County's municipal and taxing district problems are any indication, the State Legislative Committee on Local Government has a gigantic project ahead of it.

Representatives of nearly a dozen cities and districts turned up for review problems they face in a rapid and painful growing county at a public hearing Tuesday night in the Hotel Umpqua.

Representing the committee on local government were: Sen. Paul Geddes (who acted as chairman) and Stewart Hardie, Rep. V. Edwin Johnson and Jay members Ormond R. Bean (regular chairman), Judge Raymond A. Lathrop, John P. Misko and Curtis M. Everts.

Mostly they heard reviews of the painful demands being made by rapidly growing populations in cities, school districts and water and sewer districts. But one bright spot was a report by County Planning Commission Chairman O. J. Felt Jr. of the impressive steps the commission is taking to form some pattern in county growth.

Members of the interim committee verbally patted the commission on the back for the work it has

Myrtle Creek police told Mrs. Evans that a complaint has been filed in municipal court charging Miller with contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

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Board Accepts Revised Salary Base Schedule

The recommendations of the Roseburg Education Assn. for revision of the basic salary schedule for instructors were accepted by District 4 school board members meeting in special session Tuesday night.

The board will present the recommendations on the stipulation that the overall increase does not exceed \$10,000 more than the present schedule. As explained to the board earlier, the revision provides salary increases of \$300 at the minimum of each training level. The levels refer to teachers with three years of college, bachelor degrees, bachelor's plus 45 hours, and masters.

Salary increases, as proposed, drop each year for the first to the eighth within the district. At the ninth year, as set up, there are no increases over the present schedule, other than annual increments.

In commenting on the new proposed schedule which will be taken to the district board Tuesday night, Supt. M. C. Deiler said "it places the administration in a better position to acquire better teachers and to hold younger instructors."

In other action, the board extended annual increments for certain maintenance staff members, as recommended by buildings and maintenance Supt. Guy Davis.

Action on proposed recommendations of a revised salary schedule for elementary principals in the district was tabled until the special board meeting of Jan. 25. The plan will be examined by a committee of board and administrative personnel.

Board members also tabled recommendations from Clerk V. J. Miceli concerning salaries in his department. They asked Supt. Deiler to prepare comparative estimates with other districts.

And, they authorized the superintendent to ascertain if the proposed school building site property on Howe Street meets state requirements.

Man Violates Probation Before Expiration Date

Only days before his probation was to expire, a Reedsport man was back in the county jail Tuesday on a non-support probation violation.

Huey Crabtree, 41, was arrested by a deputy sheriff over the weekend and lodged in the county jail. He had been sentenced to a year in the penitentiary on Jan. 15, 1955, but had been granted probation by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

Fine, Jail Sentence Imposed On Motorist

Edbert Curtis, 67, Box 454 Idlewild Rd., was fined and given five days in jail Wednesday morning after he pleaded guilty to drunken driving.

Municipal Judge Randolph Sizemore also imposed a \$25 fine for no operator's license. Curtis, arrested on Diamond Lake Boulevard about 1 a.m. today, told city police he lost his license 19 years ago at Tillamook after being convicted of drunken driving. He never applied for another license, he said.

Planes Make Safe Return Flight From Antarctic

ABOARD USS WYANDOT, McMurdo Sound, Antarctica — The four aerial work horses of U.S. Operation Deepfreeze flew safely back to New Zealand Wednesday, en route to the United States.

All hands of the Antarctic expedition breathed easier at the word that the two twin-engine Neptunes and two four-engine Skymasters had landed at Christchurch 11 hours and 2,250 miles after their takeoff from the Ross Sea ice shelf here.

The same planes had made history's first flight from New Zealand to the Antarctic on Dec. 20, proving it could be done. But the return was still considered a worrisome mission, with flight conditions along the way ranging from excellent to poor.

On the way down, the planes had been supported by six ships spaced across the ocean as weather beacons and rescuers if needed. On the flight back, they had only the support of the Coast Guard icebreaker Eastwind, stationed about 750 miles north of McMurdo.

The four aircraft will undergo maintenance in New Zealand for about 10 days, then will be flown home across the Pacific.

Beginning Jan. 3, three fliers of the expedition made nine long, tiring flights in 12 days into the unknown interior of the Antarctic continent.

Through mountain passes and over snow-covered plateaus at least 9,500 feet high, they flew in all more than 23,000 miles. Four times they flew over the South Pole. They also flew twice over the area known as the pole of inaccessibility—the center of the continent—and once over the south magnetic pole. Neither had been reached by air before.

Retired Teacher Takes \$32,000 TV Winnings

NEW YORK — Mrs. Mabel Morris, a 75-year-old retired school teacher, financial aid, took her \$32,000 winnings and quit The \$64,000 Question CBS television quiz show last night.

She said doctors had examined her pulse and told her the excitement of trying for the grand prize would be too great.

Mrs. Morris, an English - born widow, had reached the \$32,000 mark in four previous sessions of the show by answering complicated questions about Charles Dickens and his books—her chosen category.

She has been a resident of the Home for Aged and Infirm Hebrews for several years.

Ship Burns Along Dock In Louisiana

Six Persons Rescued; Full Cargo Is Lost; Cause Of Blaze Unknown

LAKE CHARLES, La. — Citizens Service Oil Co. workers Wednesday wearily battled swirling flames and choking smoke that may conceal the bodies of at least 16 seamen in a blazing tanker.

Loaded with a full cargo of 130,000 barrels of gasoline, kerosene and fuel oil, the tanker Salem Maritime exploded late Tuesday night. A crew of 41 was believed assigned to the vessel. Citizens Service officials did not know how many were on board at the time of the blast.

Firefighters picked up pieces of three bodies Wednesday morning. St. Patrick's Hospital here treated eight seamen, one in serious condition. A Citizens Service worker also was burned seriously.

A spokesman for Citizens Service, which owned the tanker, estimated the missing at 20. A seaman, who had been on board before the explosion, put the figure at 16.

The Salem Maritime's blast set two loading docks afire at the Citizens Service plant in Lake Charles, about six miles from this city in southwest Louisiana.

The ship and the docks were a complete loss. No damage estimate was given.

About 1,500 workers attempted to douse the fire and succeeded in confining the flames to the ship and docks, away from the huge adjoining oil refinery.

At 3 a.m., a tugboat surveying the cracked, flaming Salem Maritime noticed a flashlight waving at the shore. Pulling alongside, the tug found three seamen, who jumped overboard.

The three—Frank Tolo, 25, of Brooklyn, N.Y.; George Emley, and Fred Gentry (ages and addresses unavailable)—had lain trapped in the tanker's engine room for four hours. When gusts of wind shoved flames away from their side of the engine room and onto the deck where they signalled the tug.

The three were hospitalized for shock and minor burns.

Earlier another tug had picked up a trio who jumped into Lake Charles.
