

Southeast Asia Defense Talks Get Under Way

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Highly secret talks on the defense of Southeast Asia began here Tuesday.

A report military staff planners drew up two months ago was the major item of business before the meeting of top military officers of the seven Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) nations.

Delegates mostly refused to talk about the report. But Adm. Felix B. Stump, U.S. commander in chief in the Pacific, said they would discuss the holding of joint exercises.

"I think we will be able to go ahead with them," he added.

After studying the planners' report, the military chiefs will frame recommendations for the SEATO Council's meeting in Karachi in March.

Medford Annexes Large Area Adjacent To City

MEDFORD (AP) — A special election this week in the Southern Oregon city's geographical size of one-third.

The vote, in a sparsely populated area of 1,100 acres southeast of here, was only 68-49 for annexation to the city.

Scheduled for construction in the area are a 2 million dollar hospital, for which funds are being subscribed, and a 2½ million dollar Methodist retirement home. Rogue Valley Land Co. officials also have announced plans to spend about 10 million dollars for new housing in the community.

Russian Roulette Has Tragic Demonstration

PRICE, Utah — Joseph C. Clarius, 16, want — to prove he wasn't afraid.

Shorter Albert Passie says three friends of Clarius told him the youth suggested a game of Russian roulette Sunday. He took his empty, 22 — caliber revolver and showed them how to play.

Then, to show he wasn't afraid, he put a single bullet in the gun's cylinder, pointed the weapon at his head and pulled the trigger. Nothing happened. He did it again. Again nothing happened.

Next time, however, the gun fired, sending a bullet into his brain. He died three hours later in a hospital.

Sen. George Takes Indirect Issue With Sec. Dulles

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. George (D-Ga.) said American foreign policy should be to "go as far away as we can in justice and honor from any danger of involvement in war."

George, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said in a speech before the Senate that the United States should not become involved in a "brink of war" situation.

George's remarks were a direct challenge to the policy of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, who has been pushing for a more active role in the defense of Southeast Asia.

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Engineers Allow Funds For Navigation Planning

WASHINGTON (AP) — Army Engineers have tentatively allocated planning funds to 60 navigation, flood control and reservoir projects for the fiscal year starting next July 1. Four are in Oregon.

President Eisenhower, in his budget sent to Congress Monday, recommended a total \$3,360,000 for planning projects.

The budget contained no breakdown but the engineers have furnished Congress these tentative allocations which include:

Navigation: Columbia River between Chinook and head of Sand Island, Ore., and Wash., \$13,000; Flood control: Pendleton \$45,000; Multiple purpose, including power: Green Peter Reservoir \$100,000; John Day Dam \$500,000.

Rear Part Of Cow Withdrawn From Naval Exercise

LIVERPOOL, England (AP) — The British Navy withdrew the rear end of a cow Tuesday from a landsea exercise because she (the rear end) is a lady. Just wouldn't do, old boy.

The lady is, in fact, a naval lady named Cassandra Cornelius, a third officer in the Women's Royal Navy Service, or Wrens.

Recently a call went out for two volunteers to play the part of one cow in a forthcoming exercise which will involve some 700 reserve sailors, soldiers and airmen. The phony bossy will mingle with a herd of real cows and spy on troops coming ashore at Aberystwyth, Wales.

Third Officer Cornelius, who is 33, volunteered and was assigned to play the aft part of the cow. Lt. Ronald Sutherland, a 30-year-old bachelor, volunteered to play the fore part. But the planners reckoned without Lt. Comdr. Roy Jones, commanding officer of the Merseyside naval division.

When the skipper heard that the cow was going to be educational, so to speak, he put his foot down so hard it almost went through the deck.

"Someone has jumped the gun," Jones told reporters. "The idea was not submitted to me. There will be a mock cow, yes — but it will be played by two men. What would parents think if the service allowed a woman to be alone like that all night on a mountain?"

Said front half Sutherland: "As far as I know I'm still in. Only the female element has been thrown out."

Said former rear half Cornelius: "I'm a bit of a tomboy and I don't mind doing crazy things. I would have been quite happy in the role."

Davidson, Dooley To Vie For Demo Committeeman

PORTLAND (AP) — C. Girard Davidson, an assistant secretary of the Interior under the Truman administration, and Pat Dooley, state representative for two sessions, will vie for the position of Democratic national committeeman.

The two, both Portland attorneys, announced their candidacies this week. The day before, Monroe Sweetland, state senator who has been national committeeman since 1948, said he was quitting the position to run for secretary of state.

Davidson is general counsel for the National Hells Canyon Assn., which is fighting for federal construction of a high dam in the Snake River on the Oregon-Idaho border. He said friends in the association had urged him to make the race.

Davidson, 45, said, "They felt it would be appropriate to implement on the national level the work being done for Oregon by our Democratic delegation" in Congress.

Dooley, 37, said he had been urged to run by many party leaders. He said he had made the decision in the hope to "insure a close and harmonious relationship between the national committee and the state Democratic organization."

City Police Question Victim Of 'Murder'

MONROE, La. (AP) — City police cast a rare chance to question a "murder" victim here.

Five youths opened fire on a man standing in front of a downtown restaurant yesterday. They tossed the "victim's" body in the car and sped away.

Police officers, tipped that there might be a holdup at the restaurant, chased the car, but lost it. Officers traced the youths through the automobile's license plates. It turned out the affair was a hoax and the bullets blanks.

Chief of Detectives Hugh Tolbert did not identify the youths, but said some kind of charges probably would be filed.

He said the boys were lucky. His men had orders to open fire if a holdup were tried at the restaurant.
