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Latin America Sugar Sale Equality With U.S. Producers Proposed

WASHINGTON (AP)—A State Department spokesman urged Congress this week to give Latin American and U.S. sugar producers an opportunity to share about equally in the growing U.S. market.

Henry F. Holland, assistant secretary of state for interamerican affairs, told the Senate Finance Committee the administration recommends that increases in sugar consumption above 8,350,000 tons in any one year be divided 55 percent to domestic producers and 45 percent to Cuba and other foreign countries.

The committee is considering changes in the Sugar Act which apportions the amount of sugar foreign and U.S. producers may sell in this country. It is due to expire next Dec. 31.

A House-approved bill would change quotas if U.S. consumption reaches 8,350,000 tons in any one year. It is estimated that 1956 needs will approximate 8,535,000 tons.

Armed Robber Beats Treasurer, Steals Money

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—An armed man beat Linn County Treasurer Raymond Tomlinson into unconsciousness and stole an undetermined amount of money in a holdup at the courthouse here Tuesday.

Tomlinson, 61, said the man entered his office on the ground floor of the courthouse and asked for an income tax blank. A few minutes later he returned, flourishing a gun and demanded all the money in the office.

Tomlinson said the man, who appeared to be in his 30s, held him at gunpoint while he took all the money from the office cash register.

He then demanded all the money in the vault.

Tomlinson said he protested that no money was kept there but was forced to enter the vault and sit on the floor. There the holdup man struck him "four or five times" on the head with the butt of his pistol and apparently took some of the vault funds to add to that from the cash register loot while Tomlinson was unconscious.

The office was locked by police pending a full investigation.

Tomlinson recovered consciousness about 15 minutes after the attack and reported the holdup to County Engineer Walter Larson who occupies the neighboring office.

Tomlinson said the holdup man was wearing black clothing.

Employees from the county engineer's office said they saw a man leaving the courthouse at about the time the holdup man made his escape. They said this man got into a gray 1936 Buick, took off a black jacket and donned a red one.

That was the only clue police had.

Snow Brings Relief To Powder-Dry Farms

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Snow spread over Missouri and Kansas Tuesday brought some relief to powder-dry farmlands.

A prolonged winter drought has gripped most sections of the two-state area. Fall-planted crops and pastures were reported in bad shape. Missouri streams and farm wells have been low and some farmers have been forced to haul water for their stock.

As much as three inches of snow had fallen Monday in some places. The snowfall ended 34 straight days without measurable precipitation in Kansas City.

Although farmers welcomed the snow as temporary relief, considerable more moisture will be needed to remedy the situation.

SERVICE RESTORED

LIBBY, Mont. (AP)—Regular service was restored on Great Northern mainline tracks Tuesday after five cars of the eastbound Empire Builder were derailed near here early Monday morning.

None of the 123 passengers was injured and none of the cars tipped over. A broken rail was blamed.

Burglary Suspect Linked To Second Bank Robbery

PORTLAND (AP)—Theodore J. "Blackie" Audett, 52, arrested here Monday on a federal charge of burglary at the First National Bank of Cottonwood, Idaho, in 1933, was linked Tuesday with yet another bank robbery.

U. S. Atty. E. C. Luckey said Audett possessed some \$50,000 worth of U. S. savings bonds and a charge was prepared for filing with U. S. Commissioner Robert A. Leedy saying they were believed to have been stolen last November from a bank at Pomeroy, Wash. Audett was to be arraigned later Tuesday.

The bonds, Luckey said, were on Audett when he was arrested by an FBI agent less than hour after a federal warrant was issued for him in Boise.

Shortly after the Cottonwood bank was entered through a skylight and safe deposit boxes rifled of \$27,000, Audett was arrested in Portland and questioned. However he was on parole at the time from a safe burglary sentence given in Umatilla County, and he went back to the Oregon state prison to finish out that term. He was released last October.

It was while in the Oregon prison on his last stay that he wrote what he called his autobiography and what Warder Clarence T. Gladden called the "biggest concoction of lies I ever saw." It appeared some months ago in True Magazine under the title "Rap Sheet."

Audett has served time in McNeil Island, Leavenworth and Alcatraz federal prisons as well as in lesser institutions. His arrest record goes back to 1921.

At Boise U. S. Atty. Sherman Furey said that in addition to the warrant against Audett for the Cottonwood burglary, detainers have been placed against Walter Clyde McClure, currently in McNeil Island prison, and Donald Duane Hall, at Washington State Prison, Walla Walla.

Accused Kidnap-Rapist's Preliminary Hearing Set

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP)—The 200-pound upholsterer who, sheriff's officers say, admitted raping a beauty queen last March and again last week, faces a preliminary hearing Jan. 28.

Jack J. Walker, 25, father of one child and whose wife is expecting another, was arraigned on two counts each of kidnapping and criminal assault and one count of burglary.

Officers said Walker had admitted the two attacks on Miss Donna Schurr, 18, Miss California in last year's Miss Universe contest. He was captured last Tuesday night by Miss Schurr's fiancé, Lloyd Brett, 21, following a high speed chase. Brett said he saw Walker letting the girl out of his car.

Marriage Licenses Soar; Divorces Also Increase

Marriage licenses were issued in record-breaking numbers in 1955 and outnumbered the suits for divorce filed in circuit court, county clerk's records reveal.

During the year, 528 marriage licenses were issued, exceeding by 78 the previous high of 450 in 1953. In 1954, they totaled 440, according to County Clerk Charles Doerper.

Last year, 358 suits for divorce were filed in the county, continuing the high trend of past years. However, circuit court records disclose that only 322 suits were terminated — some by dismissal. In the last quarter of the year, of 77 suits terminated, six were by dismissal.
