Roseburg's Precipitation Hit High Mark In December, But Was Below Other Areas'

Roseburg's precipitation in December reached a new high mark, but apparently the record is not all compared to those of other county.

The Roseburg gauge showed 15.74 inches for the month, but figures from 15 of 23 other recording stations show that 11 of them top the mark, according to Ben B. Irving, who heads the county water resources survey.

The Idleyld Park-Rock Creek area recorded 26.32 inches in December. Irving's figures show, and others may have been higher.

Irving and two men from the surveyor's office, Irving's son Ray, and John Felt, returned Tuesday night from a two-day trip to the recording gauge near Marial at the head of the west fork of Cow Creek.

Exact Total Unknown

The gauge there showed a 20.9 total for the period Dec. 2 to Jan. 16, but the recorder apparently was not working properly and the total probably was about 30 inches.

The men went in from the Coos County side, using a Coos Bay Lumber Co. road, then hiking through about three miles. On the road, they had to clear slides and cut through trees. They arrived late at night, spending the night at the station. Snow was about a foot deep in the area; they used snowshoes going in and coming out.

Others High Too

Other big figures recorded in December: Repton 23.67, Horse Prairie 23.02, Flournoy Valley 22.61, Elkhead 22.19, Little River 19.30, Steamboat Ranger Station 17.65, Winchester 17.52 and Devils Flat in the southeastern part of the county 16.72. A gauge east of Sutherland registered 21.49, with the recorder inoperative one day in December. Curtin totaled 20.29 with no record for 5 of 31 days.

No reports are in from the usually damp coastal points. They may have recorded more.

24 Gauges In Use

Last year was the first in which the county has made an effort to obtain a picture of regional precipitation. Several gauges were set up during the year, and there are now a total of 24, including long-established ones, as the one at Roseburg.

Besides Roseburg, figures are now available from one other station — Little River — for the entire year. Roseburg's total was 38.03 inches, but Little River's was 68.08. Rock Creek probably was higher, but no figures are available for the first two months of 1955.

North Umpqua Wet

A supplementary report received Wednesday shows a total of 7.95 inches at Steamboat Ranger Station from Jan. 9 to 16. Most of it was over the weekend.

During the December soaking, the wettest day for Roseburg (5.23 inches) and for Horse Prairie (5.04) was Dec. 26. Topper for one day was 5.75 inches at Repton on Christmas Day. Roseburg had "only" 3.05 that day.

One of the "low" amounts, Tiller with 13.97 inches, was marked up despite 10 days without precipitation during December, and the heaviest day's total was 2.12.

The year was one of extremes: No precipitation was recorded on any gauge in the county during August, out of 19 reports turned in, except for a trace at Roseburg.
