

### Advanced Training Courses Scheduled For Policemen

Regional schools for advanced training courses for policemen have been scheduled at 14 Oregon cities including Roseburg, during March and April, according to Roseburg Police Chief Stan Olson. Olson, who is chairman of the executive board of the Oregon Assn. of City Police Officials, will be in Salem Thursday to attend a training committee session. Courses were set up at that time, and it was decided to hold the association's annual convention at Bend on April 29-30 and May 1. The training committee is composed of the association's executive board and representatives from the state police, FBI and Oregon Assn. of County Sheriffs. All organizations help sponsor the schools through the League of Oregon Cities. Scheduling of exact school dates will be made by the league.

The courses will cover the following subjects: Interrogation, confessions and statements, information on resources of state agencies, accident investigation, burglary investigation, report writing and use of notebooks, functions of the State Board of Parole and Pardon, public relations and basic fingerprinting.

Basic fingerprinting is scheduled with the advanced courses, Olson said, because a specialized course in fingerprinting and photography is planned in the summer. It will be a week-long course, probably at Eugene. Also planned for summer is a one-week specialized course in administration and supervision. The courses will be handled by the FBI.

Advanced courses are held each spring and basic courses each fall. Olson pointed out that they are extremely valuable in smaller cities where on-the-job training is difficult.

Levels and a couple of inches of rain in 24 to 30 hours could send the South Umpqua over its banks again. "That could happen at any time in this country," he said.

There's no drying in sight, he said. The sunshine of the past few days has been too brief, and rain has followed each sunny period. In the past few days, when the sun has shone for brief hours, an average of one-third inch of precipitation has fallen.

The five-day weather outlook—today through next Wednesday—calls for recurring rains with total precipitation averaging one to two inches in inland valleys of western Oregon. The more reliable 30-day outlook is for more than normal precipitation in the Pacific Northwest, Lander said.

And temperatures during the next five days will be much above normal. The situation right now is that three storm fronts are lying off the coast and are expected to come in at 18 to 24-hour intervals. So far this year, rainfall has been double the normal amount. The weather year begins on Sept. 1. Since then, 32.85 inches of rain have fallen, and 23.68 inches of that have come since Dec. 1.

December was a record-breaker, with 15.74 inches of rain recorded. So far this month, 7.92 inches have been recorded. The record is 12.23 in 1890, but the preceding December had about normal rainfall.

The 32.85 inches so far this year has exceeded the average yearly rainfall in Roseburg by 2.35 inches, and only 4 1/2 months of the weather year is gone.

The excess of rain so far is 16.42 inches, meaning almost exactly twice as much rain has fallen since Sept. 1 as in a normal year. "The situation," Lander observed, "is loaded with potentiality."

### Mad Dog Killer Escapes Jail; Search Launched

EVANSVILLE, Ind. (AP)—Police in three states searched grimly today for Leslie Irvin, described as a "mad dog" killer who escaped from jail while under sentence of death for one murder and indictment for five others.

The hunt was concentrated in the Evansville area and in nearby sections of Kentucky and Illinois. Illinois state police put out a state wide alert for Irvin last night after authorities at Waukega, Ill., said they had reports he had been seen in a Waukega tavern.

Meanwhile, law officers and witnesses in Irvin's murder trial were given police guards as they hunted the 31-year-old former Evansville pipefitter.

Irvin, convicted of killing an Evansville man and also charged with killing two Indiana women and three members of a Kentucky family, had been scheduled for transfer Monday to the Indiana State Prison at Michigan City to await execution in the electric chair June 12.

### Accused Robber Jailed In Linn

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—Robert Lee Roberts, 33, accused of the \$8,001 robbery of the Linn County treasurer's office, was jailed here Thursday.

District Judge Wendell Tompkins set bond at \$15,000. Roberts, who said he was from Sweetwater, Texas, was charged with armed assault and robbery.

Sheriff George Miller brought Roberts to jail from Coos Bay, where a tavern-spending spree by Roberts brought him police attention. Jailed on a drunkenness charge, he was found to have \$1,875. Police said he told of winning \$8,000 in a Reno dice game.

A search is on for more money and a second man. Several court-house employees said they saw two men run from the courthouse after the robbery Tuesday. The sheriff said Roberts had been identified by several of them as one of the men.

### Future Of YMCA Stressed At Annual Dinner Meeting

A second "glorious 100 years" is foreseen for the YMCA. The predictor was Norman Winslow, Salem attorney, featured speaker at the eighth annual YMCA dinner held in Roseburg Thursday evening at the First Methodist Church.

Winslow attended the centennial observance of the organization held in Paris, France, last summer. He believes the YMCA is making a wonderful contribution toward saving civilization.

The conference, he opined, "shows all of us that we do have a shrunken world." He said the YMCA is helping shrink it, and added there would never be any war "if we understand everybody."

The 22nd world conference of the association drew 10,000 persons from 78 countries. All races and creeds were represented. Winslow said it had been his experience that such conferences bring together outstanding workers. A major point of the centennial, he said, was the fact there is a C in YMCA. He noted a most important revival with Christians approving the YMCA.

Likewise, he stressed the importance of the association being a "lay organization." The organization future depends on laymen, he continued. "In the next 100 years it will need lots of people like your Don Naden."

Each member has to share fellowship around the world, he noted. As examples, he cited the spirit of comradeship prevailing at the centennial. Conference goers, too, were inspired by a message sent to them from behind the "Iron Curtain." It came from Czechoslovakia, and, to misdirect those who go to YMCA beliefs it had been sent to "The Society of the Gospel, Palace of Sports, Paris, France."

Simply, the note expressed "good luck" to those present. The Salem board member observed that the Y "was not dead there."

Speaker Winslow was introduced by new President William Green.

### Army Engineers OK Lower Dam

WASHINGTON (AP)—A board of Army Engineers unanimously approved Thursday a lower dam on the Columbia River than was originally authorized.

It would cost 310 million dollars, 40 million less than the original plan.

Local interests had objected that a high dam would inundate much land now occupied by important industrial and port facilities.

The original John Day proposal provided for a dam with a maximum elevation of 292 feet at mean sea level to store two million acre feet of water. The modified plan approved today would provide for a pool level with a maximum elevation of 265 feet and storage of 500,000 acre feet of water.

### Police Trailing Youths Fleeing In Stolen Cars

State police today were on the trail of two teenage youths who apparently fled south after stealing vehicles at Roseburg and Myrtle Creek.

The vehicles — a car and a station wagon — were recovered by Myrtle Creek police, but the last trace of the youths was at Tri-City, where they are believed to have had breakfast.

In Roseburg, Nathan Raymond Collins, 200 W. Mosher St. told city police his wife's car was stolen Thursday night from where it was parked across from West Coast Building Supply.

The car, registered in the wife's maiden name, Audrey C. Orr, was recovered as Myrtle Creek police tried to stop two youths and question them about being out so late, officers told correspondent Ruth M. Evans.

The boys raced away from the officers but abandoned the vehicle about two blocks away, at Hall and Second streets, and fled on foot.

Later, the youths apparently stole a station wagon, belonging to Gerald Smith of Myrtle Creek, in the Herman Addition. About 5 a.m. it was found abandoned near Ganz Mortuary south of town, police said.

The youths may have gone further south after being seen at Tri-City. Police are on the lookout for them.
