CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy — Tenley Albright expects to be back "on ice" Saturday with help of her physician-father who is rushing here by air from Boston. By the time her name is called Jan. 30 to perform school figures in the Winter Olympic games, Tenley expects to be completely recovered from a deep wound suffered Thursday when she fell and gashed her right leg with her skate blade.

A pair of neighborhood quarrels matching teams from the old Northern Division will hold the Pacific Coast Conference basketball spotlight this weekend.

Washington takes on its old cross state rival, Washington State, and Oregon travels to Moscow for games with Idaho.

Oregon State, another ex-Northern Division team, also will be in action as host to Stanford, the only California team slated for PCC duty this weekend. The Indians journey to Corvallis for games Friday night and Saturday. The Saturday contest will be the NCAA's televised "Game of the Week."

Washington and Oregon hope to gain on front-running UCLA.

Both teams have 1-1 conference records and sweeps would put them within reach of the Bruins, who have won four league games without a defeat.

Oregon State will face tougher competition in the Stanford Indians. The Indians won three of their four conference games and are tied in second place with California, while the Beavers have a 1-3 record.

Leapin' Larry Chene To Face Golden Boy

Helfand Takes Blast At NBA

NEW YORK — Julius Helfand has thrown down the gauntlet to the National Boxing Assn.

The chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission blasted the NBA last night for a resolution by its Executive Committee that would permit a boxer to sign for a fight himself when his manager is under suspension.

Speaking at the annual dinner of the Boxing Writers Assn., Helfand termed the resolution "sheer hypocrisy."

"You know," he said turning toward Lou Radzienda, president of the NBA, "that after a fight the fighter will go back to his hotel and whack up the purse with his suspended manager."

Radzienda, a member of the Illinois State Athletic Commission who had praised Helfand's campaign against the undesirables in the sport just before Helfand rose to speak, said later:

"We believe the fighter comes before the manager. Just because his manager is under suspension or doesn't have a license is no reason to penalize a fighter. He has to make a living and should be granted that right."

"What he does with the money is no concern of ours. Under our resolution a suspended manager or one without a license can't come running to a commission for help if the fighter refuses to live up to their personal contract."

Why should we deprive a top-ranking contender from a title shot because of his manager? That's what a fighter dreams about."

Grambling College Star Bids For Scoring Title

NEW YORK — Bob Hopkins of Grambling (La.) College, who holds the career scoring record for small-college basketball players, is making his most determined bid for a seasonal title.

Hopkins, who shows a four year total of 3,373 points—414 more than anyone else ever has registered in small-college competition—is right on the heels of Dave Olmsted of Clarkson (N.Y.) College, the leader in this year's derby.

Statistics compiled by the NCAA Service Bureau show Olmsted has tallied 290 points in nine games for a 32.2 points a game average. Hopkins has 479 points in 15 contests for 31.9.

Winter Steelhead Count Up At Winchester Dam Station

An additional 911 winter steelhead were counted across the Winchester Dam counting station board for the first two weeks of January, the second highest total counted for an equivalent period since 1946.

The 911 fish brings the total run to 2,807 for the season, a figure which ranks third below the years 1953 and 1954 for total runs up to Jan. 15.

High total for any Jan. 1-15 period is 1,806 recorded during 1953's record run. The 911 figure ranks second to this.
