Marine Corps Institutes Enlistment Program

The U. S. Marine Corps has in-stituted a program to enlist men for two years active duty in the reserves, according to Sgt. Marvin Cox, recruiter here.

Regular enlistment for three and four years won't be affected by the new program, which is being offered on a limited basis for men who want to fulfill their minimum active-duty service requirement.

The new enlistments are open to married men, while in the regular program, men with dependents aren't eligible for enlistment.

Plight of 'Penny' Felt By Residents Of Curtin

The residents of Curtin on Bear Creek are enraged at the wilful shooting of Penny, Penny is a shepherd and chow dog about 10 years old owned by Erwin Goins.

Mrs. John Sowles gave Penny as a puppy to Erwin when he was a boy, Penny and Erwin grew up together with Penny remaining behind while Erwin served with the U.S. Army.

Penny was always a lone wolf dog, hunting alone unless his young master went coon hunting with him. He and a neighbor dog have had 61 coon credited to them in two years time. Since that time count has been lost but he has treed at least four or five coon this last fall.

Penny never was known to molest sheep or anyone's cats but would go up and down the creek each night looking for coon. The neighbors even put out scraps for Penny to try to encourage him to come around to keep the coon from their chickens.

Penny was shot in a hind leg rather high up shattering the bone. He was near the grade school at the time. It is also reported another dog was shot and killed there the same day.

Penny is now at the vets and it is "nip and tuck" if he lives or not as his age is against him.
