Oregon State's sly-high Beavers shoot for their second straight victory over Stanford's short and scrappy Indians Saturday in the NCAA's basketball game of the week.

The Beavers, defending Pacific Coast Conference champions, dominated the backboards in the opening game of the series Friday night to whip the favored Indians, 69-59.

The OSC-Stanford game was one of three contests played in the PCC Friday night. Washington drubbed Washington State, 62-42, and Oregon thumped Idaho, 84-76, in the other two games.

Dave Gambee, Oregon State's 8-6 sophomore center, was the big man in the Beaver attack with 22 points but found the basket again and coasted in the rest of the way.

Wayne Moss, the 6-9 OSC center, kept the backboards in complete possession of the Beavers.

Oregon State moved into a 32-26 lead at the half, increased their advantage to 16 points, let Stanford get to within eight points and then rallied to win going away.

There were never more than three points separating the teams in the final half as the lead changed hands eight times. There was no advantage on either side until Friese and Cory combined to ice things for Douglas.

Halftime ended with Roseburg leading 21-23 and the third period closed at 33-31.

Roseburg led by slim margins through the first half and finished the first two intermissions with 11 leads of 14-10 and the aforementioned 24-23.
