Foe Of Commies Will Speak Here

One of America's foremost authorities on Far Eastern affairs and one of the world's staunchest foes of the men of Moscow, Dr. No-Yong Park, will be the guest of Umpqua Valley Knife & Fork Club members at a dinner-meeting Feb. 1.

Dr. Park, Manchurian-born teacher, author and lecturer, will speak to the club following a 7 p.m. dinner in the Roseburg Elks Ballroom, according to President Harold Augustus.

Few men in America have incurred the hatred of the Reds as has fighting Dr. Park, who from the very first saw the wolfish encroachment of the Communies and their possible destruction of democratic ideals, Augustus said.

Murder Threat Faced
Dr. Park is quoted as saying recently, "I planned to visit Asia this summer, but it seems doubtful now because of the difficulty of getting the 8th Army clearance and a military escort abroad. Without a military escort I shall be murdered in no time by the Red spies."

For many years Dr. Park has been considered an authority on the vacillating situations of the East. Many years ago he was interviewed on the radio many times, once by Commentator Lowell Thomas. More recently he had programs.

The author of a half-dozen books, he is an excellent speaker without a trace of an accent.

Petition For Ike's Name In Primary Circulated Here

A petition to put President Eisenhower's name on the Republican presidential preferential ballot in the May primary election is being circulated in Roseburg.

The petition is being sponsored by the Oregon Federation of Young Republicans, and is being passed around here by Douglas County Young Republicans.

John Horn, chairman of the Douglas County organization, said about 10 persons will circulate the petitions. Fred Bernau is in charge of the move.

A resolution authorizing circulation of the petitions was passed by the state organization last November. It's understood the petitions won't be filed with the Secretary of State unless the President approves.

Last week, he told a press conference in Washington, D. C., that he has no objection to his name being entered in the New Hampshire preferential vote. He made it clear, however, that the test would be in no way binding on his decision to run again or retire from office at the end of his present term.

Horn this morning said relatively few signatures would be required to qualify the petitions with the Secretary of State.

Days Creek Area Mothers To Have March On Polio

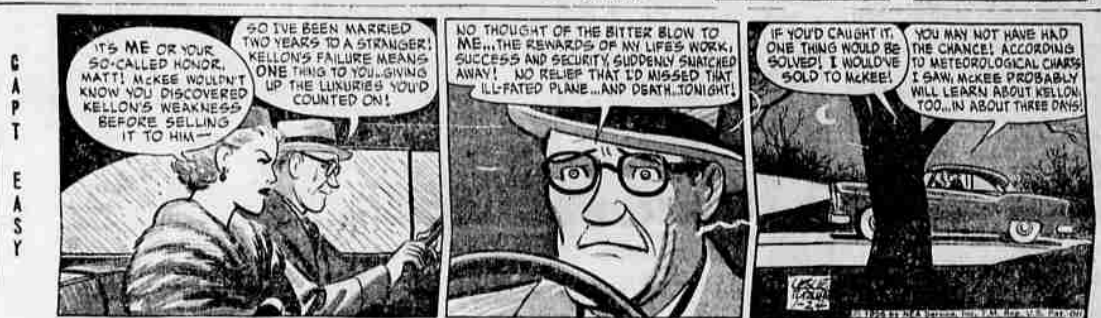
