

Earth Satellites Fired Into Space To Weigh Between 20 And 50 Pounds, Says Expert

NEW YORK (AP)—Each earth satellite fired by the United States into outer space will weigh "more than 20 pounds but probably less than 50 pounds," Dr. Joseph Kaplan, top rocket expert, said Wednesday.

Kaplan, chairman of the U. S. National Committee for the International Geophysics year, told the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences annual meeting in a prepared report.

In size the satellite may be described as about that of a basketball, although the shape has not yet been fixed.

It will travel about the earth in an elliptical orbit, with a perigee distance (closest point) of at least 200 miles and an apogee distance (farthest point) of about 800 miles.

It will remain in its orbit "for at least several weeks and perhaps months. The greater the perigee and apogee distances, the longer the life of the satellite as a result of reduced atmospheric resistance."

Israel, Egypt Accept U. N. Plan For Peace

JERUSALEM (AP)—Israel and Egypt have accepted a three-point U. N. peace plan for the disputed El Ajza demilitarized zone.

The U. N. Palestine truce supervision organization announced the agreement after Secretary Dag Hammarskjold conferred here and in Cairo with leaders of both nations.

Hammarskjold had proposed the plan originally last Nov. 3, after Israeli and Egyptian forces clashed in the Negev Desert area along the Israeli-Egyptian border.

Under the plan (1) Egypt will let the truce group put demarcation lines wherever the U. N. men think necessary; (2) Egypt will withdraw any "minor encroachments which might still remain in the zone, and (3) Israel will remove all her military forces, obstacles and mines from the zone.

Separate Parks Dept. Urged By So. Douglas

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Creek Chamber of Commerce, Canyonville was invited to send representatives, but none was present.

Charles V. Stanton, editor of The News-Review, recently appointed to the advisory committee, told of the history of the committee and its functions.

Charles Collins, supervisor of the Douglas County Parks Department, reported on the county parks program, urging the communities to develop community parks, and to strive for wayside stations along the highway, in addition to the quest for a state park.

Opinions were expressed that a state park should be located in southern Douglas County and several sites were mentioned.

One site now under consideration is located on Cow Creek at the falls a few miles south of Riddle on the former Glenbrook Farms property. The 200 acre site is located on both sides of Cow Creek and is crossed by tributary streams, Beatty and Squaw creeks. Collins urged that the property be jointly developed by the communities and the county parks department if not accepted as a state park.

Another proposed site is along the route of Highway 99 at Panther Creek, about five miles south of Canyonville, where approximately 160 acres could be made available.

Porter Again In Race Against Ellsworth

SALEM (AP)—Charles O. Porter, Eugene Democrat, filed his candidacy for Congress this week. He will oppose Rep. Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg Republican.

Ellsworth defeated Porter, 70,693 to 55,775, two years ago.

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—Drilling through the wall of an adjacent room, burglars Tuesday looted the Plaza Jewelers of an estimated \$100,000 in gems and watches.

The thieves took only the best gems, clip earrings and gem-studded watches from display trays. They also worked the safe combination to remove \$2,500 in cash. Police Chief O. O. Johnson said the theft was the biggest here on record.

Jackie Robinson Takes Cut In Salary For '56

NEW YORK (AP)—Jackie Robinson has signed his 1956 contract with the Brooklyn Dodgers for an estimated \$33,000, a cut from last year's salary.

E. J. (Buzz) Bavasi, Dodger vice president, said "Jackie took a cut but it was far from the maximum 25 per cent."

Bavasi wouldn't disclose any figure. It was reliably reported Robinson, who will be 37, on Jan. 31, agreed to \$33,000, about \$4,500 less than he received for 1955.

The patents, held by AT&T and its manufacturing affiliate Western Electric, cover every known means of electrical communication. They represent the fruits of 19 years of research in AT&T's Bell Laboratories.

Train Engineer To Be Examined

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The engineer whose train overturned Sunday, killing 29 persons, will be given a psychiatric examination today, Dist. Atty. S. Ernest Roll announced.

Roll said he wanted to get an explanation of Santa Fe engineer Frank Parrish's statement that he thought he saw an orange grove before the two-car train jumped the rails on a curve in Los Angeles. There is no such orange grove in that vicinity.

Dag Hammarskjold Heads For Lebanon From Jordan

AMMAN, Jordan (AP)—U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold headed for Lebanon Wednesday after a whirlwind visit to Jordan.

During his brief stopover here the U. N. official was received by King Hussein and conferred with Premier Samir Rifai and Foreign Minister Husain Fakhri Khalidi.

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Gold Air Moves Into Southwest

A fresh batch of cold air moved into the Southeast Wednesday as far south as Northern Florida. The chilly weather followed the season's worst snow storm in some areas.

Temperatures dropped into the 40s in Northern Florida and to the low 60s in the Southeastern section. However, Key West reported a mild 71 compared to 61 at Miami.

Headings in the region generally were around 5 to 10 degrees lower than 24 hours earlier. The snow storm earlier this week swept over areas from Arkansas to Virginia, with falls ranging up to a foot in parts of Tennessee, North Carolina and Virginia.

Wednesday's new snow extended into the Eastern Plains from Minnesota and southward into Iowa, Missouri and Southern Illinois. Falls in most places were light, under one inch.

A storm center nearing the central California coast spread rain over the Northern half of California and Northern Nevada. Reno reported one inch of snow on the ground.

A blanket of clouds covered the Midwest and held temperatures most between 15 and 25 degrees, a little warmer than Tuesday.

Clearing skies in the Northern Rockies and Western Plains brought a little colder weather with readings near zero in parts of Montana. One of the lowest marks Wednesday morning was -3 at Pelston, Mich.

School District's Population Increase Poses Big Problem

The statement by a resident of Dillard School District 116 this week typifies the problem that district and others in the county are facing. Along with the welcome population growth, comes the problem of adequate school facilities.

It is that problem a Citizens' Advisory Committee in 116 is attempting to solve.

This week the committee made recommendations to the school board, suggesting the district bond for \$250,000. The sum is to be used for construction of classrooms.

Why did the citizens suggest bonding for the sum? They point out it should meet needs for two years. Monday evening committee member Paul Hult said the group's consensus was that in two years building costs would have increased. And, he said the committee estimated it would be at least two years before the government "does anything, if it does."
