Pro Golfers Ready For \$15,000 Tourney

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — Forty-two top professional golfers, including Shelley Mayfield and the player he defeated in an exciting playoff here a year ago, Mike Souchak, tee off Thursday in the \$15,000 Thunderbird Invitational Tournament.

Souchak, fresh from his recent victory in the \$12,500 Caliente Open at Tijuana, Mex., and Mayfield, wound up at the end of the regulation 72 holes last year tied at 270.

They battled to another deadlock in an 18-hole playoff, and finally Mayfield edged Souchak on the 20th hole.

Invited to compete here at the Thunderbird Country Club were the 30 leading money winners of 1955, four past winners of the Thunderbird tournament and eight other special guests, including Lloyd Mangrum and Byron Nelson.

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Jim Sutherland Plans '12th Man' System For Washington State

SEATTLE (AP) — Ask Jim Sutherland what system he intends to install at Washington State College and the school's new head coach will give you one you never heard of.

"I want the student body at Washington State to be a part of the athletic program," the big, soft-spoken head man said Wednesday.

"The student body will be the 12th man on the Cougar football team. Its support and enthusiasm and encouragement can win us one or two close decisions each season. I'm going to talk it over with student representatives Friday. From what I have learned of the students at WSC I am sure they will be eager to get the system operating."

As for his players, Sutherland says he "wants kids who intend to graduate. We want the type of boy who is after an education. Any player who comes out for the team, reports regularly for practice and keeps up his grades will never be cut from the squad. We want our players to go out after graduation and be good-will ambassadors for us."

Pinned down, Sutherland said

his physical ideal would be a player who "stands about 6-2, looks like he weighs 175 but actually weighs 210."

Along with his 12th man system Sutherland will install the T-formation. The Cougars last fall operated from the split-T and previously had employed the multiple offense, a combination of T and single wing.

"I think the straight T will give us a better opportunity to make use of the available material," the new coach says. "Our attack will be about 52 per cent run, 48 per cent pass. We'll hope to keep the opposition loose with our passing threat and hurt them with our running."

Although he does not plan to give his assistants titles such as "line coach" and "backfield coach," Sutherland indicated Leon McLaughlin would handle much of the squad's defensive preparation. He regards the former Los Angeles Rams center as an outstanding man on defense.

"Another thing," Sutherland added. "We are not going to concentrate on beating other Northwest teams. We are a part of the Pacific Coast Conference and our objective will be to win in all company."

Refs Threaten To Walk Out At Winter Olympic Games

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP) — A threatened walkout of hockey referees and worsening of conditions on the ski slopes brought more headaches Wednesday to officials of the Winter Olympic Games, opening here Thursday.

The 15 Olympic hockey referees, representing each of the ten countries in the tournament, held an angry meeting and issued a protest over living accommodations.

Some said unless the situation is remedied and unless they are reimbursed for personal expenses they will head home Thursday.

Two hockey games are on Thursday's opening program, Italy vs. Austria and Canada vs. Germany.

"Our rooms are terrible, the worst I've seen in 15 years of handling international matches," complained the veteran Swiss referee, Kurt Khausser.

The whistle-blowers also said they hadn't been paid for money spent in getting to Cortina and had not been reimbursed for other ex-

penses, such as tips.

Meanwhile, Alpine skiers from a dozen nations turned out to check the slopes where the downhill, giant slalom and special slalom races will be held.

These slopes, turned into "suicide" highways by craggy rocks and lack of snow, have been responsible for a growing list of accidents. Thirty competitors have been injured so far, most of them skiers.

The women's giant slalom, scheduled Friday, has been shifted from Faloria Mountain to the Tofana downhill track.

There was one bright spot in the American picture. Tenley Albright, the world champion figure skater who gashed her leg in practice last week, skated through her most rigorous routines and found herself in top form.

There have been 10 two-hit World Series games. The last was by Vic Raschi of the Yankees against the Phillies on Oct. 4, 1950.

Italians Tighten Grip On Bobsled Monopoly

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO (AP) — Italians took a stronger grip on the pre-Olympic bobsled monopoly Wednesday, registering the best two times in the two-man sled trials setting a new course record in the four-man.

Eugenio Monti, pint-sized speedster from the Dolomite Mountains, whipped down the 1700-meter Olympic run in 1:22.45 for the fastest time of the day in small sleds.

Dino de Marin guided his four-man sled down in the record time of 1:18.77, breaking his own mark of 1:19.62. It was the fourth time in four days that the highly favored Italians broke the course record.

As he has done for the past week, America's Bud Washbond showed he is virtually the only threat to the Italians in the two-man event. He racked up third fastest time—1:23.46.

Art Tyler, of Rochester, N.Y., did 1:25.70.

U.S. Army Sgt. Pat Biasieddecki of Ware, Mass., braked for Washbond and Edgar Seymour, Rochester, N.Y., braked for Tyler.

Jim Bickford, Saranac Lake, N.Y., who is competing in his fourth Olympic, tried out his four-man sled for the second time with a good 1:22.31. Bickford's crew were Don Jacques of Lake Placid, N.Y., Larry McKillip, Saranac Lake, and Army Maj. Hubert Miller, Saranac Lake.
