Ike, Republican  
Leaders Discuss  
Farm Problems

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower and Republican congressional leaders discussed possible explosive farm problems Tuesday.

They agreed to push "as rapidly as possible" for legislative action on the administration's agriculture program and also talked over imminent House action on the Eisenhower school construction program.

Sen. Bridges of New Hampshire, chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, said Senate Republicans will press for this sequence:

1. Completion of debate and a final vote some time next week on the natural gas bill now before the Senate.
2. Enactment of a bill revising import quotas on sugar.
3. Action on the administration farm program.

If the farm measure is ready by the time there is a vote on the gas measure, it may be put ahead of the sugar bill, Bridges said.

Sharp Increase In Wool  
Demand Seen For 1956

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — Indications are for a sharp increase in wool demand in 1956, Max F. Schmitt of New York City, president of the Wool Bureau, told directors of the American Wool Council here.

Schmitt said consumption for the first 10 months of 1955 was up 8 per cent over the 1954 level and that prospects look good for a prosperous 1956.

A continued high level of purchasing power and a steady increase in population of the United States are contributing factors, he said.

The first general session of the 91st annual convention of the National Wool Growers Assn. got under way here Tuesday morning with more than 400 Western state sheep and wool men present.

J. H. Breckenridge of Twin Falls, Idaho, association president, was slated to address the group.

Awards Slated  
For Civilian Aid  
To Reservists

A new Dept. of Defense award has been approved for issue to certain civilian businesses, according to information received by local military personnel from headquarters of the Oregon Military District.

The award, a pennant for display purposes, is coupled with a citation certificate. The purpose of the award is to improve support of reserve programs through tangible evidence of Dept. of Defense appreciation.

Any employer, company or business, regardless of size or number of reservists employed, can be considered for the award. To be eligible, an employer must be notably cooperative with reserve components of the armed forces, as shown by support of activities, such as granting leave in addition to vacation time for annual summer encampments or special or emergency tours of duty.

Recommendation for the award will be made by employee reservists through military channels. Final approval will be made by the secretary of defense. Presentation will be by the commander or deputy commander of the Oregon Military District, according to Maj. Floyd S. Korschner of the local Army Reserve, 1614 W. Harvard Ave.

The award can be made through any reserve branch — Army, Air Force, Navy, National Guard or Marines Corps.

Auto Purchaser  
Soaked In 'Free  
Loading' Charge

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.) asserted this week the automobile buyer is "getting soaked because of free loading" in the Detroit area.

Monroney, chairman of a Senate Commerce subcommittee looking into auto marketing practices made the statement after hearing testimony from the National Automobile Dealers Assn. that charging of "phantom freight" by auto manufacturers should be ended.

Paul E. Herzog, manager of the association's research division, said upward of 214 million dollars was paid in phantom freight in 1954. He said the Detroit-based shipping charges are unchanged even if cars are assembled at plants closer to the spot where they are purchased.

Monroney drew from Herzog testimony that dealers in the immediate Detroit area are not charged the phantom freight figures and must pay only a token delivery charge of about \$5.

"This favoritism," Monroney said, leads to elaborate "bootlegging" of autos by Detroit area dealers.

He said statistics show there are twice as many cars registered in California as in Michigan but the same number of cars is delivered to Michigan dealers as to California dealers.

Dean Marting Splitting  
Up This Time For Good

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Dean Marting, who have separated before then made up, said Tuesday they are splitting for good.

"We have tried very hard to effect a reconciliation, but our differences appear to be beyond solution," they said in a joint statement.

Marting is a singer and half of the comedy team of Martin and Jerry Lewis. She is the former Jeanne Biegan as a model.

The Martings were married here in 1949. They have two children, Dino, 4, and Ricci, 2.
