WASHINGTON — A House Agriculture subcommittee Tuesday approved an extra 10 million dollars for the school milk program for this school year. This allows a maximum authorization for use of 60 million dollars. The program was authorized for the year ending June 30.

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Sen. George Gives No Hint He's Dropped Opposition

WASHINGTON — Sen. George (D-Ga.) gave no hint Tuesday that he has dropped his opposition to any long-range commitments of foreign economic aid.

George, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, talked for an hour at the White House Monday with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles.

Upon emerging, he wouldn't even confirm the general assumption that Eisenhower and Dulles had sought to persuade him to drop his opposition to their request for authority to make commitments as long as 10 years in the future on specific development projects.

To all questions from reporters, George replied, "Ask the President." The White House had no comment on the conference.

Meanwhile, a possible fight against Eisenhower's nomination of Robert R. Bowie to be an assistant secretary of state was postponed for at least a week.

Two top ranking Senate Republicans—minority leader Knowland (Calif.) and policy committee chairman Bridges (N.H.) have indicated opposition to Bowie.

They have not given their reasons publicly, but reportedly object to Bowie's reputed belief that this country must face up to the

issue of a possible United Nations seat for Red China. Neither Bowie nor Dulles has commented on the situation.

A hearing by a Senate foreign relations subcommittee on the nomination, originally set for Tuesday, has been postponed for at least a week.

Knowland told reporters the postponement was ordered by the committee "as a matter of convenience" and did not presage any movement for withdrawal.
