Douglas, Coos Curry Banking Shows Increase

The Douglas, Coos, and Curry county banking district, which includes Coos Bay, Reedport, and Roseburg banks, reported a 2.5 per cent increase in bank debits after comparing the December 1955 debits with those of December 1954.

Eleven banks in the area recorded \$33,110,307 in debits for December 1955 while the previous December total was \$31,838,916. This banking region also reported a 0.8 per cent increase after comparing the December and November 1955 debits.

Total debits for the state, as compiled from 120 reporting banks, were \$1,588,577,449 for December 1955, a 4.5 per cent increase over the preceding December total.

Bank debits represent the dollar value of checks drawn against the deposit accounts of individuals and business firms. Bank debits are generally regarded as good indicators of current business activity, although their value for this purpose may be impaired by the inclusion of large checks of a type that do not constitute "business activity."

The University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research collects bank debit information from 151 banks and branches monthly.

There were slight drops in the vegetable pack, 17,838,860 cases, and in the berry output, 358,921 cases. But the canned fruit pack, 8,171,089 cases, increased enough to jump the total production.

Ex-Convict Gets Death Penalty For Slaying

KANSAS CITY — Arthur Ross Brown, 30-year-old ex-convict was given the death penalty Wednesday for the kidnap-slaying last August of Mrs. Wilma Allen. The Federal Court jury brought in the recommendation just 25 minutes after receiving the case. Federal Judge Charles Whittaker set Feb. 24 as the date of the execution, which will take place in the gas chamber at the Missouri State Prison at Jefferson City.

Eugene Fisher To Talk On Taxes At Eugene Clinic

Eugene Fisher, Elkton, will be a featured speaker at a state tax clinic to be held in Eugene Monday to clarify some issues about school taxes before education legislation is formulated for the 1957 legislative session.

Fisher, an Oregon delegate to the President's White House Conference on Education, will discuss "What We Have Learned About School Finance from the White House Conference."

The special clinic is sponsored jointly by the Oregon School Boards Assn., the Oregon Education Assn., the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers and the University of Oregon. It will be held at the university's Erb Memorial Union Building, starting at 10 a.m. School board members, administrators, PTA representatives and other Douglas County residents interested in educational problems will attend the day-long event.

Topics slated for discussion include: What are criteria for a good tax system? How does Oregon measure up to the system? Comparison of taxes in Oregon, Washington and California, earmarking of tax funds and how funds for public schools are collected and distributed in the state.

Woman Held As Hostage Dies Of Heart Attack

MARION, Ohio — The 66-year-old wife of a bank employee, held hostage Sunday during an attempted bank robbery, died Tuesday of a heart attack.

The victim was Mrs. Alma Hurr, imprisoned in her own home with her mother and husband during a five-hour ordeal.

Marion County Prosecutor Ralph E. Carhart said no new charges will be filed now against the three men accused of the bank robbery and kidnapping.

But, Carhart said, all medical evidence pertaining to Mrs. Hurr's death will be presented to the grand jury, which meets in special session next Monday to consider the bank robbery charges.
