

1956 Winter Olympics Launched In Italy By 1,100 Athletes; Norwegians Favored

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP) — The snow-starved seventh Winter Olympic Games opened in Cortina's modernistic 12,000-seat ice stadium Thursday as 1,100 athletes from 32 nations paraded in brightly colored attire.

President Giovanni Gronchi of Italy proclaimed the games open and Guiseppe Cheloni Minuzzo, Italian ski champion, took the Olympic oath of fair play on behalf of the competitors. It was the first time a woman had been given this honor.

The only flaw in the magnificent ceremonies in the packed stadium was the stumble of torch-bearer Guido Caroli of Italy. Skating in the torch to light the Olympic flame, the Italian fell headlong in front of the presidential box when he tripped on microphone wires.

Somehow, the speedskater held on to the torch. Hastily regaining his feet, he completed the circuit of the stands and ignited the bowl that will burn day and night until the games end Feb. 5. A huge roar came from the crowd when the flames flared up.

Americans in colorful red, white and blue uniforms, and fur-hatted Russians drew almost equal applause from the festive crowds as they marched in the bright sunlight, glinting off the mountains.

The day was bright and clear without the faintest sign of a snow cloud—and snow is one thing these Olympics need the most.

A few flakes fell Wednesday afternoon but not enough to help the ski course. The thin cover of snow in the mountains has thawed in the noonday sun and frozen at night making the course almost a sheet of ice. In many places it has worn bare, exposing the rocks.

The polished pine stands were packed with 12,000 spectators wearing a picturesque variety of gay Alpine attire.

The opening day competition was confined to two hockey games—Italy vs Austria and Canada vs Germany.

The jagged brown peaks of the Dolomite Mountains made a spectacular background for the marching athletes, led by the tiny Greek delegation, as is Olympic custom. The big Italian home team brought up the rear.

Greenberg, Cronin Elected To Baseball's Hall Of Fame

NEW YORK (AP)—Hank Greenberg, who in 1938 came within three of breaking Babe Ruth's record of 60 home runs, and Joe Cronin, the most expensive player in baseball, took their places alongside the game's immortals today in Baseball's Hall of Fame.

The two slugging right-handed hitters earned membership to the shrine at Cooperstown, N.Y., yesterday when they received more than the necessary 75 per cent of the vote of the 10-year members of the Baseball Writers' Assn. They became the 80th and 81st Hall of Famers.

Greenberg was named on 164 of the 193 ballots cast to 132 for Cronin. Only players active in the 1920-30 period were eligible and they could not have been active as a coach or manager within the last five years. The pair will be inducted formally at the Cooperstown Museum next July.

Greenberg, 45, who quit as a player in 1947, now is in his sixth year as general manager of the Cleveland Indians.

Cronin, 49, has been general manager of the Boston Red Sox

since 1948, two years after he retired as a player. In 1934 he was sold by Washington to Boston for a record price of \$250,000 and immediately was named manager of the Red Sox.
