

# Roseburg Lions Observe Founders Night, Hear Talk

A graphic account of his air trip last fall to South America, as a director of Lions International, was told by A. L. Hawn as the featured program of the Roseburg Lions Club's annual Founders Night program Thursday.

The evening was highlighted also by special recognitions and awards and visits from the West Roseburg Canyonville and Sutherlin Lions clubs. The West Roseburg group took home the traveling trophy "Leo" trophy.

Charter members Don Hellwell and Ford Singleton, who together with Bruce Elliott, unable to be present, were honored. The three are the only charter members remaining in the club. Hawn, now of Eugene, is also a charter member and first president of the club.

A five-year perfect attendance pin was presented Willard Buchanan, a charter member and past president of the Medford Crater club and now living in Roseburg. Key awards for bringing in new members were presented Dr. Bruce Tuck, William Unrath and Charles Thomas. Past presidents of the Roseburg club were also

given special recognition.

On the humorous side International Director Hawn was presented a special "gift" by the West Roseburg Club in token of his high esteem for the University of Oregon "Ducks." The gift, neatly wrapped, proved to be a live duck, which thrust his head upward as soon as the box was opened.

Other program features included a report by the new student representative Roseburg High senior Frank Purdy Jr. He replaces Dave Geddes, student representative of the first semester. Hawn, unaccustomed to air travel, said he flew about 37,000 miles in three weeks on the South American tour. Frequent brushes with death on the trip and being felled royally in every South American country visited were described by the speaker. An engine bursting into fire on landing, instrument landing in pea-soup fog at Atlanta, Ga., and flying through the "eye" of a hurricane felled south of Florida were told about.

Hawn was high in his praise for the hospitality afforded the traveling group of about 80 Lions International officers and directors, whose goal was Santiago, Chile, home of the Lions International president in all the South American countries they were greeted, toasted, feasted and honored. Panama Lions greeted them with a band. They were guests of Peru's vice president, and Chile's president, as well as other dignitaries.

The speaker likened the trip of his group to that of an envoy mission of good will and cited the part Lionsism is playing in attempting to weld the world together.

# Highway Changes To Halt Future Flood Conditions

PORTLAND — A three million dollar highway program to repair flood damage and to rebuild roads to prevent future flood damage was recommended Thursday to the State Highway Commission.

R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, said this could be worked out as a cooperative program with the federal Bureau of Public Roads with each paying about half the cost.

Baldock said that since Dec. 18 Oregon state highways have suffered \$68,500 worth of damage from heavy rains and floods.

The changes to eliminate future flood damage would include a new \$400,000 bridge over the north fork of the Coquille River and raising grade as well as changing location of sections of the Coos Bay-Roseburg Highway, the Redwood Highway, the Rogue River Loop and Powers secondary highways, the Medford-Provo Highway and the Pacific Highway in Josephine County.

The changes, Baldock said, would cost \$2,150,000. The rest of the approximately 3 million would go into repairs.

On the Thursday, bid opening, the largest of the jobs, changing the Salmon River highway route near Sheridan, brought a low bid of \$381,000 for grading 6.8 miles.

# Riddle PTA To Recommend More Free Polio Vaccine

The Riddle Parent-Teacher Assn. has decided to recommend to the State Dept. of Health that free vaccinations of the Saik polio vaccine be continued.

It was also announced at the last meeting that a father and son banquet will be scheduled for Feb. 23 for a money-raising project.

The major part of the program at the last meeting was a panel discussion by five members of the Riddle school board. Board Chairman Leonard Dawson traced some of the reasons for the present national teacher shortage and commented on the reasons for appointing the citizens' committee to study teachers' salaries.

James Carrell discussed the progress of construction of the new elementary school building. He said enough classrooms would be completed by mid-March to permit elimination of the double shifting system.

Rudy Paetz reported on the advisory group now working on recommendations for legislative action on six major school problems, such as teacher shortage. Local help from state and national sources and construction problems. Riddle is represented on the lay group for the study in Douglas County by six local citizens.

Director Ernest Daniels discussed comparisons of the Riddle district with other Douglas County districts. He related that assessed valuations in the school district had increased five-fold in the last 10 years and school population was up eight times. Elmer Sunday reported on the liaison work between the local board and the Oregon School Board Assn.

During the social hour which followed the meeting, a voluntary collection for the Neal children was taken. A total \$71.62 was raised.

A public hearing was held on Jan. 12 and several remonstrances against formation of the district were made.

It was understood at that time that no petition against organization of the district would be made. It would take 10 per cent of the residents in the area to stall work toward writing of the ordinance.

Another public hearing will be held when the ordinance finally is written and ready for approval of the County Court.

Fett told the Rotarians that another attempt to get county zoning on the ballot probably will be made this fall before the general election in November.

Such a proposal was defeated in November 1954. Fett blamed a misconception of the voters as the reason. He said he doesn't believe most people understand the meaning of "zoning," believing it to imply stringent restrictions and, in some cases, the actual loss of rights among property owners.

Fett discounted that, however, pointing out that zoning actually means protection for the orderly development of growing populated areas.

He said there is a demand for planning among the smaller cities of Douglas County. Recently, he said, he and some of his staff met with Riddle city officials to explain the organization of a planning commission. They were "hungry" for information, he explained.

The planning chairman described other activities of the county commission. Presently, a map marking all areas likely to flood is being drawn by technicians of the commission. It will be used in the granting of subdivisions. No residential areas will be allowed in flood areas, he said.

Other studies are being made in building inspection, surveying for possible roads between populated areas and mapping.

Through its studies, Fett said, the commission has discovered the county can rely on mineral wealth to sustain the county economy should timber ever be exhausted.

"We've found there is probably greater resources underground than on the ground," he said. "They are virtually unlimited."

Tickets for the nine-weeks of "entertainment in education" may be purchased from any YM board member, Y Executive Secretary Don Lewis or Miss Patricia Mayo, Niden Travel Agency, Hotel Umpqua. They will cost \$6 and are on sale now.

Films for the series are furnished by the State Board of Higher Education. It is the first time the local board has offered such a course for adults. Those registered in the course may bring guests.

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# NRECA Charges McKay Fails To Carry Out Act

ST. LOUIS — The secretary of the interior has been accused of refusal to obey provisions of federal law in disposing of power produced at government hydroelectric projects.

The National Rural Electric Cooperative Assn., at the closing session of its convention Thursday, adopted a resolution saying Interior Secretary Douglas McKay has "consistently refused to carry out the provisions of the Flood Control Act of 1944, in disposing of power produced at federal hydro projects." The law gives preference to cooperatives in the purchase of such power.

The association also criticized the activities of the Hoover Commission concerning the REA and urged legislation to keep power companies from deducting for income tax purposes money used for what the rural electric group calls "propaganda."

It urged the defeat of recommendations of the Hoover Commission and private utilities. It asked a congressional investigation of the Federal Power Commission, J. E. Smith of Chase City, Va., was re-elected president of the organization.

# Prince Announces Miss Kelly Will End Film Career

HOLLYWOOD — If Prince Ranieri of Monaco has his way, Grace Kelly will live the life of a princess after their marriage and make no more movies.

The Oregon Heart Assn. is about eight years old. Lincoln noted Thursday that the fight against heart handicaps is improving because of continuous research to develop new techniques in the fight against cardiac disorders.

Funds collected during heart month are not spent on treatment, he pointed out, because the amount is not sufficient.

He outlined the spending of each dollar collected: Research in Oregon — 31.2 per cent; national research — 11.6 per cent; professional education — 8.7 per cent; community service and public education — 10.3 per cent; American Heart Assn. program — 11.6 per cent; rehabilitation and employment — 3.5 per cent; and administration — 18.1 per cent. Currently, in Oregon, more than a dozen heart research projects are under way, Lincoln reported.

# Two-Year-Old Child Burned To Death In Fire

NEWPORT, Wash. — A little boy who apparently hid under a bed on the second floor when a fire started was burned to death Thursday. A rescue team found him, was turned back by flames.

The boy, 2-year-old David Wells, was playing with matches when the fire broke out in an upstairs bedroom of a farm house seven miles northwest of here, Sheriff William Giles reported.

The Wells, who have three children, share the house with Mr. and Mrs. Harold Roberts and their three children. No one else was hurt.

# Confessed Slayer Roche Dies In Electric Chair

OSSINING, N. Y. — John Francis Roche, confessed slayer of at least four persons, died last night in Sing Sing Prison's electric chair.

The 28-year-old Roche was sentenced to death for the second of two sex crimes — the slaying in June 1954 of 14-year-old Dorothy Westwater in Manhattan. He also admitted the murder of a cab driver and an 85-year-old woman in New York City.

Roche, who had expressed the wish to die, was accompanied into the death chamber by the Rev. Thomas J. Donovan, the prison's Roman Catholic chaplain. Earlier Roche had said he was a nonbeliever in religion.

# COMMITTED TO JAIL

Roy Koon, 42, North Bend, was committed to county jail Thursday after having been arraigned in Reedsport and Canyonville justice courts on charges of obtaining money by false pretenses.

Koon was arrested in Coos County earlier in the week and held for Douglas County authorities on the check charges.

PORTLAND — Archie (Art) Erskine, 48, arrested last week on a bookmaking charge, was fined \$500 Thursday and placed on probation for 2 1/2 years. He was convicted on five gambling counts in municipal court.
