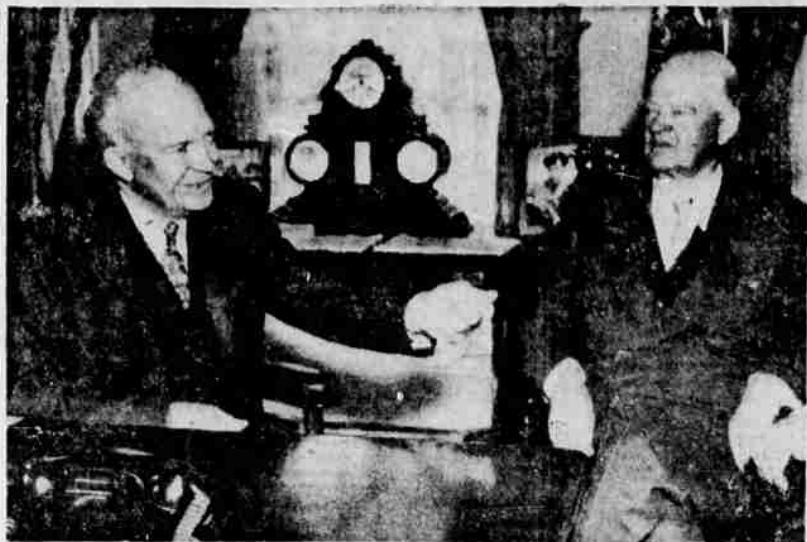


Oakland High School Honor Roll Announced

Eye Examinations Reveal Brain Tumors, Says Doc

LOS ANGELES—Eye examinations may serve to locate 30 per cent of brain tumors, Dr. David O. Harrington of San Francisco says.

Dr. Harrington, University of California eye specialist, told a group of 150 of fellow specialists here that in a single month recently he found evidence of pituitary tumors in four patients who came to him for glasses.

Dr. Harrington said he has developed a screener that makes it possible to examine both eyes for signs of brain tumor in four minutes, whereas such examinations have required more than half an hour.

Air Force To Include F100 Supersabre Jets

WASHINGTON—The Air Force expects to equip its day fighter units in the European area with F100 Supersabre jets within six months.

Announcing this week, the Air Force said shipment of the supersonic F100s to the seven squadrons will begin late this month. About 175 aircraft will be involved.

The squadrons now are flying F86 Sabrejets.
