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11-Year-Old Knows Need For Fight Against Polio

You'd never dream to look at Ted Judd that he ever spent a day in an iron lung. If you saw that sturdy lad on the football field or the basketball court, you'd be amazed to know he spent his fifth birthday in the polio ward of St. Anthony's hospital in Pocatello with what the doctors called one of the worst cases of polio they'd ever seen.

Polio reached the epidemic stage in Pocatello in August of 1949. The hospitals were filled with children and adults. Doctors and nurses worked overtime; parents waited and prayed beside iron lungs.

Little Ted Judd took his turn in the iron lung, then spent six agonizing weeks working with the doctors and therapists who hoped to save him from permanent crippling. Both his knees were affected; shoulder muscles were damaged, too.

Ted's mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Judd, never gave up hope. Neither did Ted. After his hospital discharge there were daily trips for therapy to strengthen and re-educate the muscles. Each week showed some improvement, but it took three years.

When Ted entered school as a first grader the damaged shoulder muscles prevented him from holding a pencil and learning to write. But by the time he entered the second grade, recovery was complete and Ted was writing as well as any other second grader. Knee muscles recovered, too, in time, and today Ted's a credit to the sixth grade basketball team at Green School.

The Judd family moved to Green in September when Ted's father became assistant superintendent of schools for this district. The Judds have three other children: Dan, 13, Julie, 7, and Terri, 2.

Mrs. Judd has much to be thankful for, and she hasn't forgotten those terrible days in 1949. She never misses a year working for Mothers' March on Polio. For the last two years she was a captain in her area in Pocatello, and she'll be marching in the Green area the night of Jan. 31. She knows there will be one shining torchlight and one generous handful of coins saved from an 11-year-old boy's allowance. That boy will be her own son Ted, who fought his own battle with polio and who wants to help others finish the fight.

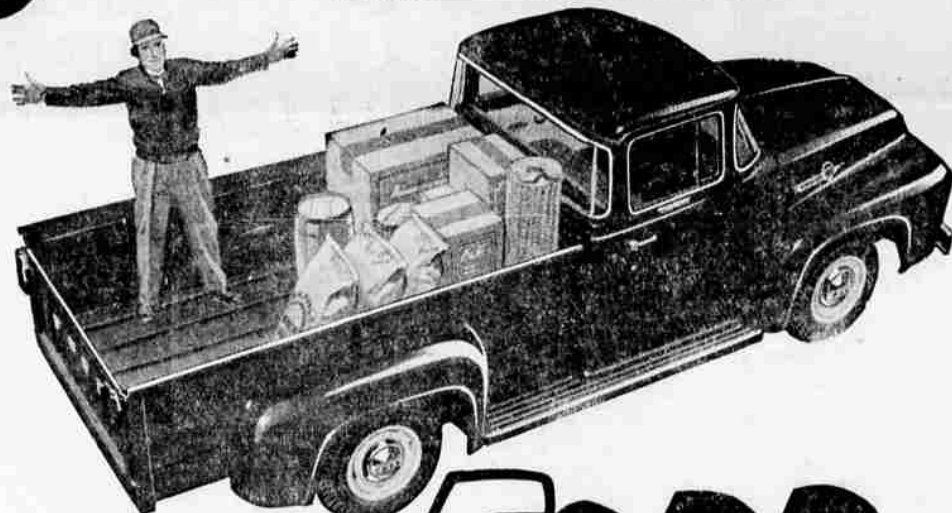
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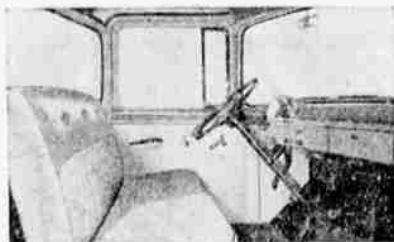
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
