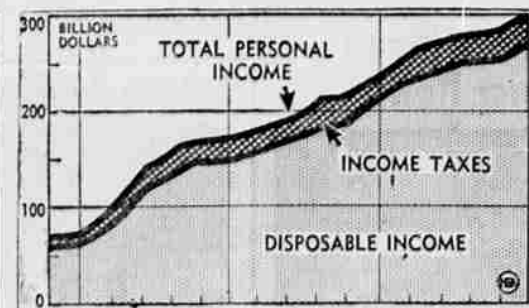

**BOOM TO CONTINUE** — The amount of money the average American had to spend continued to increase in 1955. Consumers' disposable income has increased steadily since World War II. In 1955's third quarter it was at a record annual rate of 272 billion dollars, 7 per cent above a year earlier. According to government experts, the trend will continue upward in 1956, though probably at a slower rate.

## Business Slows Breakneck Pace, But Signs Indicate Boom To Be Rolling Again

NEW YORK — Business, which smashed all records in 1955, slowed its breakneck pace this week. But there were signs that America's greatest boom would be rolling in high gear again by springtime.

Most striking evidence of retrenchment this week was in the auto and construction industries. There was hesitation, too, in Wall Street. The stock market experienced its sharpest fall since President Eisenhower's heart attack.

Other key lines, however, hummed at a fast clip. Steel boasted a new weekly production high of 2,428,000 tons. Production and refining of crude oil held close to peak levels; manufacturers of furniture and home appliances stepped on the gas.

For a psychological shot-in-the-arm, industry unfolded plans for record expansion programs which added up to a new multi-billion-dollar bet on good times ahead.

In the center of the spotlight was big General Motors Corp., which will plunk down one billion dollars for machinery and other new facilities in 1956.

The steel industry backed up its belief in continued prosperity with plans for a three-billion-dollar expansion that will add 15 million tons of new steel-making capacity by the end of 1956. It's the biggest expansion the steel industry has ever undertaken in peace-time.

Also indicating confidence in the future was President Eisenhower's budget message. In the fiscal year starting July 1, he estimated, Uncle Sam's tax take should total 66 one-third billion dollars—a gain of 1 1/3 billions over the current fiscal year. If the estimate is correct, wages, salaries and profits will have to go higher too, because that's where most of taxes come from.

Here's how the general pattern of business in 1956 shaped up this week: auto sales and home construction will be down from last year's peaks, but rising activity in other lines will more than take up the slack.

The upward trend of general business showed up on steel producers' books this week, cutbacks in the auto industry notwithstanding. Fighting for all the steel they could get were such big users as home appliance makers, freight car builders, and producers of oil and natural gas.

Chairman Vinson (D-Ga) estimated the cost of the construction, that would be \$429,000 or about 110 million dollars more than last year's program.

**Flood Brings Transfer Young Chinook Salmon**  
PORTLAND — Because of flood damage to the state Fish Commission hatchery above Lookout Point Dam, the commission plans to release a million yearling spring chinook salmon in the Willamette River.

They are being trucked downstream to a point below the Dexter re-regulating dam. The job will take about three weeks.

High waters flooded some of the rearing ponds, and the commission expected some 400,000 steelhead, 8 to 9 inches long, will be carried by the current into the Lookout Point Reservoir.

**Thornton Criticizes Law Affecting Legal Voters**  
SALEM — Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton this week criticized a 1955 law which makes it a criminal offense to vote in an election unless the voter actually lives in the precinct in which he votes.

He said the new law would deprive hundreds of citizens of the right to vote unless they register.

Those who must re-register are persons who have moved from their precincts since they last voted, who failed to vote since Nov. 30, 1952, who wish to change parties, or women whose names have been changed by marriage.

**ENTERS PRIMARY**  
CONCORD, N.H. — Supporters of Sen. Kefauver entered the Tennessee Democratic this week in New Hampshire's first-in-the-nation March 13 primary.

They filed petitions placing Kefauver's name in the primary preference poll and at the same time submitted a slate of candidates who will run for delegate seats pledged to him.

**Patterson Names Hukari As Hood River Judge**  
HOOD RIVER — Gov. Paul Patterson has appointed Arvo Hukari succeeds John H. Sheldrake, who died last week.

Patterson had appointed Hukari, who was a county commissioner, as acting judge after Sheldrake became critically ill.

Hukari, a Commissioner George Craig will appoint a third member of the county court to fill the vacancy left by Sheldrake.

A Republican, Hukari is president of the Hood River Electric Co-operative and a strong booster of public power. He is a retired fruit grower and former executive of the Hood River Apple Growers' Assn.
