SEATTLE (AP)—Cowboy Johnny Cherberg, unable to subdue the angry bawling of his University of Washington football team, old grads and undergrads, has been ordered to seek new pastures.

The 45-year-old coach was fired yesterday after two hectic months of trying to stave off criticism aimed at regents which — with a big "if" — voted Dec. 10 to keep Cherberg. The "if" was incorporated in a proviso Cherberg would "amicably resolve" his difficulties with his protesting team members.
