SHIP RUNS AGROUND

TOKYO — A light cargo ship operated by the U. S. Military Sea Transportation Service ran aground in soft mud in Omimoto Harbor Saturday but freed itself six hours later, the Navy reported. The vessel, the T-AKL24, was not damaged.

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Diamond-Laden Stratocruiser Forced To Return

LONDON — A New York-bound strato-cruiser carrying 47 passengers and a fabulous cargo of diamonds ran into mechanical trouble over the Atlantic Saturday and turned back to London.

The craft landed safely with one of its four engines cut off. A heavy police detail guarded the plane while engineers fixed a propeller. The plane took off again later.

In the hold of the British Overseas Airways Corp. Plane was an ordinary registered postal package carrying rough diamonds valued at \$8,400,000. One was a 426-carat stone which diamond magnate Sir Ernest Oppenheimer has called the most magnificent ever found in South Africa.

London's Diamond Trading Co. put the gems in the mail Friday consigned to Harry Winston, Inc., New York. Spokesman said it was the biggest single sale of rough diamonds ever made to one firm.

A diamond-laden strato-cruiser crashed on Christmas Day, 1954, at Prestwick, Scotland, with the loss of 28 lives. Detectives searched for weeks in the burned wreckage for gems valued at \$2,800,000. They found almost the whole lot.

Kefauver Will Enter Minnesota Primaries

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Sen. Estes Kefauver, (D-Tenn.), will file in the Minnesota presidential primary, challenging Adlai Stevenson, who has the endorsement of the Democratic - Farmer - Labor (DFL) State Central Committee.

Announcement of Kefauver's intention to file for the March 20 race was made here by Hjalmar Petersen, who will be Kefauver's Minnesota campaign manager. A former governor, Petersen now is a state railroad and warehouse commissioner.
