

Indians Net Win Over Miller Quint

Roseburg's Indians came back with a second round win in district 5 A-1, taking Springfield's Miller 6-4 at Springfield Saturday night. The win evened the Roseburg district record at 1-1.

After a lead-changing situation through the first period and most of the second chapter, the local took the lead for good when Dick Woolstenhulme hit a jump from the key.

The first period was a see-saw affair which ended with the losers leading 20-10. By halftime, Roseburg had pulled out to 37-32.

Springfield could not narrow the count to less than six points after the third chapter began. The period ended 49-40 and by game's end the losers still trailed by six points.

During the fourth period, when the Indians threatened to come close, on two occasions, guard Brady Montgomery gave in 10-foot jumpers that thwarted the rally.

Woolstenhulme, who led all scoring with 22 points, fouled out in the fourth chapter.

Springfield's leading scorer was forward Rick Herman with 13 points.

Both teams fouled heavily with the Indians called down 24 times and Springfield 20 times. Roseburg

made 21 field goals and 18 free throws 29 tries. Springfield had 16 field goals and 22 free throws in 36 attempts.

Record Crowd Sees Globetrotters Win

Before the largest indoor crowd ever to witness an athletic event in Douglas County, the Harlem Globetrotters defeated the House of David 66-58 in the Roseburg gym Saturday night.

Numerous professional entertainment acts of musical and acrobatic nature fascinated the 3,000-odd fans at halftime and in a preliminary engagement the Roseburg B Squad defeated the Wood Butchers 34-29.

The latter proved a spicy bit to the whole evening's talent parade. First of all, the teams played "college time" meaning ten-minute quarters. As an anti-climax, the youngsters finished off the 40-minute ordeal with a 30-foot set shot by Leon Marical in the final 30 seconds, settling the issue.

The Globetrotters, desiring to insure their 5,000th-plus win, didn't waste any time in doing so. They took a commanding 23-7 lead by the first quarter's end and left at halftime in front by 37-23.

This gave the brightly-colored team the welcome opportunity to clown around in the second half. The first-half scoring was led by 6-0 Herman Taylor who potted five field goals. In the second period, 6-4 Charles Harrison led the scoring with six points.

For the Davids in the first half, Robert Beck knocked in three field goals and two free throws.

With the Trotters letting loose with their variety of comedy routines in the second two periods, the Davids stayed within range. The winners outscored their stooges by 17-15 in the third period, but were 20-12 shortenders in the final chapter.

All this time, the scoreboard was not working and time was kept on the bench.

Six-foot two inch guard Stan Burrell provided most of the scoring fireworks in the second half for the Trotters with five field goals and finished out the evening with 15 pointers to lead all scoring.

Near the finish, the Trotters went through their famous football-droppick routine and produced a home-run baseball act. The tall Charles Harrison held down the center's post in a clever ball-handling series that invariably led to two points each time a castoff was made.

The droppick routine was worked only once late in the game and that time it missed by inches after a mid-floor boot.

Dons Likely To Continue Win Streak

Will success spoil the San Francisco Dons?

It's not likely. But that's about the only thing that figures to trouble the all-winning Dons until they put their major college basketball championship on the line in March in the NCAA Tournament.

Coach Phil Woolpert's club has leveled everything in sight, ringing up 40 straight victories for an all-time major college record. And the 11 games remaining on their regular season schedule wouldn't scare your timid Aunt Minnie.

What's more, top-ranked San Francisco now is really all alone atop the national rankings. Dayton, which gave the Dons at least knock opposition for the No. 1 spot while rolling to a 14-0 mark, was chopped down by Louisville 66-64 in overtime last weekend.

All that stands between the Dons and a 51-0 record are the weak sisters of their California Basketball Association—San Jose State (tabbed as victory No. 41 tomorrow night) Santa Clara, College of the Pacific and the like.

The Dons never ran into anybody quite like the California Bears, who became victim No. 40 Saturday, 33-24. A stalling game by the Bears prevented the Dons from scoring more than one field goal in the second half, but it couldn't prevent the inevitable and San Francisco smashed the 39-game record hung up by Long Island U. in 1935-37 and matched by Seton Hall four years later.

The Dons open against the Pacific Coast Conference champ in the NCAA's Far West regionals at Corvallis, Ore., March 16. UCLA is the likely PCC winner. The Bruins—last to beat the Dons a decision already reversed—are 4-0 and have a two-game test of power slated this weekend with Washington, tied for second with Southern California at 5-1.

Other hopefuls seeking NCAA berths return to the task tonight after layoffs for exams. Illinois (4-0) gets back to the T-ten race against Minnesota with a chance to tighten its first-place grip. Kansas State, tied with Colorado and Kansas at 3-1, can edge into the Big Seven lead against Oklahoma. K-State and Colorado have at it Saturday, with Kansas meeting fourth-place Iowa State.

Kentucky looks for a "comeback" in the Southeastern Conference against Georgia Tech tonight after Vanderbilt dumped the Wildcats 81-73 Saturday. Vandy is high with 6-0, Alabama is 4-0, Kentucky 4-1.

North Carolina (8-1) can gain a good hold on the Atlantic Coast Conference lead by beating runner-up Duke (6-1) Saturday. West Virginia (6-1) can do the same in the Southern Conference by defeating fourth-place Military tonight and Richmond Saturday.
