

Picture Of Council Growth Told At Annual Camp Fire Counsellors' Meet Monday

The year of 1955 saw continued expansion of the many programs of the Roseburg Council of Camp Fire Girls.

A picture of council growth and expenditures came at its annual meeting Monday night in Roseburg when members gathered to elect new officers and board members and survey work of the past year.

The written report showed a youth membership of nearly 1,000 and a future increase of more than 400 waiting. President Thomas H. Parzinger spoke of "a continuing need" in the council for leaders.

He noted one reason for council growth as "the dedicated men and women" working in it. One of those women was his wife (see other story).

It was an annual meeting featuring the talents of council members. The more than 100 present obviously enjoyed a group "sing" and "The Story of the Flag" presented by Horizon, Camp Fire and Blue Bird members. They listened intently as Mrs. J. E. Conn demonstrated, via an illustrated talk, the place of the individual in the organization.

Newly-appointed Camp Fire Regional Representative Dan Dimick announced the awarding of Camp Fire citations for service to radio stations KRNH, KRXL and KYES, the News-Review, Lockwood Motors, Fliegel Transfer & Storage Co. the Roseburg Kiwanis Club, Rural Electrification Administration and Oscar "Mr. Camp Fire" Amundson.

Financially, the council ended the year with a surplus of \$38.37. It had allowed for operating expenses of \$9,793.05. And, operation of the Camp Fire summer program showed a surplus of \$236.43. A self-paying program, the camp brought in an operating income of \$5,063.39 and paid out \$4,826.96. Major help came from camp fees which totalled \$4,891.

Harbor Facilities Topic For Reedport Meeting

A joint meeting of the Port of Umpqua and Umpqua Improvement Assn. is scheduled Feb. 7 at 10 a. m. at the Reedport City Hall, reports Ernest Seaton, secretary of the association.

Chief feature of the meeting will be a report to the Port of Umpqua Commission on the feasibility of development of the Reedport Harbor facilities. Seaton said he had seen the report and feels that it "really demonstrates such feasibility."

If Highway 28 is still blocked by a slide at the east end of Reedport, the 9:30 a. m. ferry should be taken to Reedport from the eastern terminus, Seaton said.

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Dry, delicate, and aromatic herbs

The selection and preservation of drugs are among the chief responsibilities of the pharmacist. For proper storage of pharmaceuticals in the sixteenth century, it was specified that moist drugs must be kept in silver, glass, or horn jugs and that eye unguents must be preserved in china, whereas marrow, lard, and crude matter of like character could be kept in zinc boxes. Twentieth-century medicines, many of which are extremely delicate in composition, require scientific processing and painstaking care for proper preservation and storage. Development of suitable methods for packaging and preserving drugs is one of pharmacy's many contributions to modern science, through which world-wide distribution of important pharmaceutical and biological products has been made possible.

Drain Boys Too Busy With Sports To Carry Papers

Evening newspapers are being handicapped in the city of Drain by too much civic spirit.

The News-Review has found it extremely difficult in recent years to maintain satisfactory newspaper service for the Drain community, because the town's enthusiasm for athletics keeps eligible youngsters busy. For many months a girl carrier has been delivering the paper to Drain readers—the only girl carrier on The News-Review's distribution system.

During the past few days arrangements have been made with the Drain City Council to permit motorized delivery of The News-Review throughout the city of Drain, and service is scheduled to start the first of March, according to an announcement by A. Fuller Johnson, circulation manager.

Melvin Kauffman, Yoncalla, has been employed as carrier and will serve Oakland, Yoncalla and Drain.

News-Review boxes will be erected throughout Drain's residential area, and papers will be delivered by Kauffman from his car.

Motorized service has been operated by The News-Review in the Sutherlin community for the past two years, and throughout the fringe area of Roseburg.

Boxes will be erected in Drain during the month of February in preparation for the start of the new service, Johnson reports.

William Stinson, Former Resident Dies; Service Set

Funeral services for William H. Stinson, 58, of Fall Creek, Calif., and formerly of Roseburg, who died Saturday, will be held in the Conger-Morris Chapel at Medford Wednesday at 2:30 p. m., with Central Point Lodge 135, AF&M, officiating. Committal will be in the IOOF cemetery.

Stinson was born May 7, 1897, in Medford, near Rocky Ann. He was the son of the late Edward and Rose Stinson who came to Medford in 1891. He first went to work for Copco at its first dam site on the Klamath River in 1915. He was attending Oregon State College when he enlisted in the Army.

After his discharge in 1918 he worked for a time in the Prospect area, then moved to Grants Pass. From 1928 until 1934, when he returned to Medford he lived in Crescent City. In 1947 he moved to Roseburg where he was superintendent for Copco until October 1954 when he was moved to Fall Creek, Calif., as chief operator, because of illness.

He was a member of Central Point Lodge 135, AF&M; Medford Scottish Rite, Hillah Temple, AAONMS, Ashland, and Douglas Court 18, Order of Amaranth, Roseburg.

Jim Bond Film Enthusiastically Received Monday

Jim Bond's newest films received an enthusiastic reception from a capacity audience at the Roseburg High School auditorium Monday night.

A native of Douglas County, Bond now a resident at Portland, has for several years been making adventure pictures in all parts of the world, and has shown pictures of his previous experiences in Roseburg.

His current show, which is to be repeated tonight, is in three parts. One film deals with fishing in Canadian waters, and ranges from tuna fishing off the East Coast, through pike and trout fishing in inland lakes, to Salmon fishing off the British Columbia coast.

The second picture, highly educational but somewhat gruesome, concerns the whaling industry in Canadian offshore waters.

The third film deals with India, and is unique in its presentation of the architecture, people and activities in that country, coupled with thrilling adventure on tiger and leopard hunts.

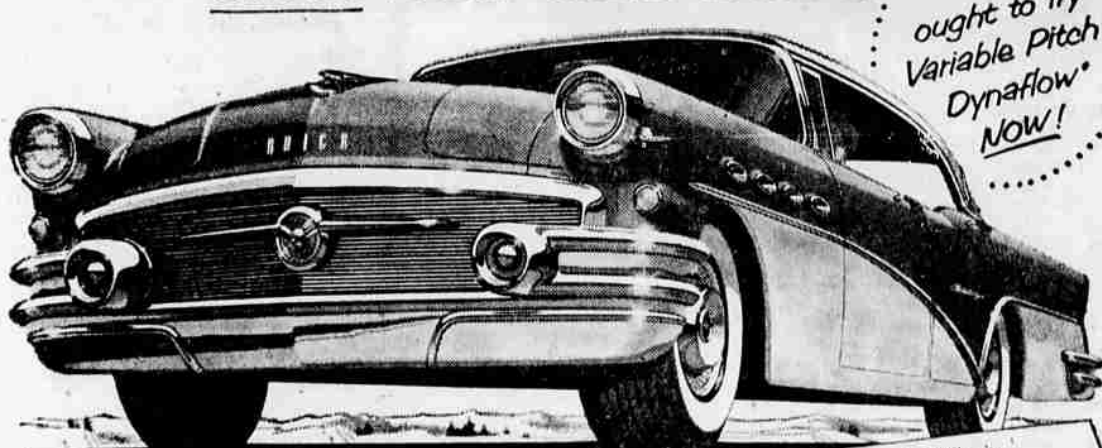
