Leave It To Judge, Say Court Photo Issue Speakers

DENVER, (AP) — Two witnesses, one a judge, said Monday they believe the decision should be left to the individual judge as to whether photographs may be made during a trial.

Dist. Judge James M. Noland of Durango, Colo., and David Rosner of Denver, representing the Colorado Bar Assn., gave their views at the opening of a hearing before Justice O. Otto Moore of Colorado Supreme Court.

The hearing was called to hear arguments by newspaper, radio and television officials that the present ban on photographs and broadcasting during a trial should be scrapped.

Campbell in a statement affirmed his belief in the American Bar Assn.'s Canon 35 of judicial ethics that court proceedings should be "conducted with fitting dignity and decorum."

"But the absolute prohibition of the canon against taking photographs during court sessions or recesses, even though it can be done by a press photographer with present-day equipment which permits the taking of pictures without
