Sec. Benson Plugs McKay For Senate

SPOKANE, Wash. — Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson militantly defended administration farm policies and put in a plug for a Cabinet colleague as a possible senatorial candidate during a flying stopover here last night. Benson said Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay, former Oregon governor, was the Republican party's best hope of capturing the seat now held by Sen. Morse (D-Ore.).

"Next to the election of Eisenhower, the defeat of Wayne Morse is the most important task before the Republicans," he said. Benson, who will address the National Assn. of Grain Growers at Portland today and fund-raising luncheons in eastern Washington Friday, called the Administration's proposed farm measure, a "billion-dollar-plus program."

Government May Broaden Aid In Polio Inoculation

WASHINGTON — The prospect of more Salk polio vaccine has prompted the House Commerce Committee to consider possible eventual broadening of the government-aided inoculation program to include some groups above age 20.

The committee view was outlined in a report accompanying its bill to extend from Feb. 15 until June 30, 1957, the present program of federal aid for vaccinating persons up to age 20 and pregnant women.

The bill was cleared Wednesday for a House vote. Both the House and the Senate are expected to approve the measure.

The House committee reported a new estimate from Surgeon General Leonard A. Scheele that by the end of this year there will be more than enough vaccine on hand for the 65 million children and women coming under the present program.

In its report, the committee recommended no change in the present 20-year age limit and noted that, throughout the country as a whole, paralytic polio strikes that group most often.

More Young Men May Be Called For Short Terms

WASHINGTON — More young men may be drafted to serve for shorter periods in a temporary move to bolster the lagging ready reserve program.

Secretary of Defense Wilson disclosed the tentative plan at a news conference Wednesday. Still under discussion, it would cut from 24 to 18 months the required active service of as many as 100,000 present draftees who agree to remain in the ready reserve for at least 2½ years.

To provide replacements for them and keep up the military strength, draft calls would be increased—perhaps doubled. Wilson emphasized that the program, if adopted, would be temporary and would extend no later than June 1957.

No special legislation would be required. By 1959, Wilson said, the workings of last year's Reserve Forces Act will automatically build up the ready reserve—the men who would be called to arms at or shortly after the outset of another war. Service in the reserves is required of men drafted since the new law became effective.

Snowstorm, Drifts Maroon 34 Persons

ALBUQUERQUE — A wind-whipped snowstorm which piled drifts 10 feet high forced 34 persons to spend the night Wednesday marooned in a school building here. They were dug out Thursday.

Snowdrifts which surrounded the Hawthorne Elementary School, located in northeast Albuquerque, failed to halt school operations Thursday however.

Paths were dug across the drifts, 10 to 15 feet deep, allowing other pupils and teachers to attend classes.

Cars were unable to approach closer than three blocks to the school after the blizzard closed in Wednesday night. Nearly three dozen teachers, parents and pupils remained at the school rather than try to buck the raging wind-driven snow which forced abandonment by motorists of dozens of automobiles.

There were no injuries. For the youngsters it was exciting. Seven-year-old Hugh Hayes said it was "a lot of fun. I would like to do this again sometime."

Winter Storm Hurls Snow, Rain In Eastern Half

A winter storm hurling snow and rain at the eastern half of the nation Thursday.

The Southwest also was pelted by snow.

A wave of cold that sent temperatures below the zero mark rolled into the Midwest.

The heaviest snowfalls of the season were reported in some of the storm centers.

The weather bureau reported considerable blowing and drifting snow in New Mexico and western Texas.

The precipitation east of the Mississippi was heavy, caused by warm, moist air streaming northward from the Gulf of Mexico over the top of a dome of cold air from the north.

Snow fell in the Great Lakes region, the upper and middle sections of the Mississippi Valley and the lower Missouri Valley.

Highways were hazardous in much of the storm belt.

Freezing rain peppered an area that stretched from eastern Texas to southeastern Missouri.

Thunderstorms rumbled from Louisiana to Tennessee. Monroe, La., was drenched by almost three inches of rain.

The Middle Atlantic region had rain or a drizzle.

City Manager George Farrell was also in accord.

Western Europe Death Toll 35

LONDON — The death toll rose to at least 35 Thursday in one of Western Europe's worst cold waves of the century. Howling sub-zero winds brought misery to millions.

Snow and ice stranded thousands of cars on highways and disrupted ship, rail and road traffic. Gas, electricity and water services were crippled in many cities. Emergency workers went to thousands of homes and factories to repair frozen and burst water and gas mains.

Vacationers on the French Riviera huddled under furs and overcoats as the first heavy snowfall in 15 years fell on the sunshine resort area.

The first snow in 10 years also coated the adjacent Italian Riviera playground and whitened storied Mt. Vesuvius near Naples.

Paul H. Hughes Perjury Case Goes To Jury Today

NEW YORK — The perjury case against Paul H. Hughes was given to a federal court jury at 10:50 a. m. Thursday.

Federal Judge Archie O. Dawson, in a 45-minute charge, emphasized to the jury that politics was not involved in the case. Hughes has claimed he was the tool in a political plot.

The six counts of perjury against Hughes, 35, World War II veteran, stemmed from testimony he gave before a federal grand jury investigating Harvey M. Matusow, former Communist and turn-about government witness.

Battle Lines Drawn In New Hampshire

CONCORD, N.H. — Final battle lines have been drawn for the first-in-the-nation New Hampshire presidential primary elections March 13.

On the popularity side of the ballot, President Eisenhower is unopposed as a Republican and Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) uncontested as a Democrat.

In the balloting for control of the state's delegation to the national conventions, however, both face opposition.

The Eisenhower slate will be pitted against one pledged to Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) who approved the move as a "standby" candidate.

Kefauver's pledged backers are confronted by a slate favorable to Adlai Stevenson, the 1952 Democratic nominee.

Deadline for filing in the preference poll phase passed at 5 p.m. yesterday. The preference poll is merely "advisory" for convention delegates.

Advertising Assn. Agrees Not To Fix Commissions

NEW YORK — The American Assn. of Advertising Agencies has agreed in federal court not to attempt to fix the amount of commissions paid to agencies for placing newspaper and magazine advertising.

The AAAA — one of six defendants in an antitrust action filed by the Department of Justice — also agreed to refrain from eight other specific practices.

A consent decree signed by the AAAA was filed in federal court here yesterday. With entry of the decree the government dropped civil antitrust proceedings against the association.
